

In their very first Junior Achievement experience, students have the opportunity to speak with respected business leaders in the classroom setting with materials and curriculum provided to the volunteers. The volunteers are trained by our JA team to teach students how to save money, open bank accounts, and other basic financial responsibilities.

JA BIZTOWN®

Fifth-grade students run the show at Sam Swope JA BizTown! On the very first day of their very first jobs, students experience applying and interviewing for jobs, keeping a work schedule, managing personal budgets, and opening a business. With the ultimate objective of securing and paying off a business loan, JA BizTown is an invaluable opportunity that prepares children to participate successfully and responsibly in finance and business as an adult. Chances are that your kids, your grandkids, and your neighbor kids are experiencing this memorable program.

JA FINANCE ®

In JA Finance Park, middle and high school students are placed into ordinary real-life situations and equipped with the guidance and resources to establish and run a successful household. Students are assigned a profile which includes details about their family, job, and background, then will create and adhere to a personal financial budget. The classroom curriculum culminates in a hands-on tablet based budgeting simulation at Chase JA Finance Park.

JA INSPIRE ®

Taking the program to scale from 970 to 12,710 students in a span of seven years, JA of Kentuckiana's locally developed JA Inspire career exploration curriculum and interactive career exploration event continues to introduce students to the vast variety of regional career opportunities. Attracting the attention of JA leaders throughout the U.S., JA Inspire is now a national program of Junior Achievement USA.

JA VOLUNTEER IN HIGH SCHOOL CLASSROOMS

As high school students begin to position themselves for their future, there are many unanswered questions about what lies ahead. JA's high school programs, led by a volunteer, help students make informed, intelligent decisions about their future, and foster skills that will be highly useful in the business world.

3DE POWERED BY JUNIOR ACHIEVEMENT

3DE, an innovative high school model proven to accelerate student engagement and academic outcomes in traditional public high schools, is re-engineering high school education to be more relevant, experiential, and authentically connected to the complexities of the real world. Louisville has been selected as one of 6 geographic areas to participate in the 3DE Phase II National Pilot. This past fall, the pilot kicked off at Valley High School and The Academies of Shawnee. We are excited to bring on Jeffersontown High School as our third 3DE school with the first freshman class inducted in Fall of 2023.





*3DE Program Implementation at Jeffersontown High School 2022


