June 1, 2020

For the group of Black leaders struggling with how to address the stress of the pandemic and outrage over the death of Breonna Taylor, everything changed on June 1. That was the day after David McAtee was killed.

We knew things went wrong in the killing of Breonna, but months later we were still fighting for information, trying to put all the pieces together. David McAtee was different. We knew instantly there was no reason for him not to be here. His death felt like a kick in the teeth to a community already on our knees.

That day, our rage and frustration became laser focused and 18 days later, A Path Forward for Louisville was delivered.

JUSTICE

Wrote 11 Suggestions for JCPS' ARP Funding including retired teachers returning which has been enacted.

- Advocated for stipends for CHOICE school staff.
- Working with organizations across the city and state to work on policy initiatives important to the community being served by the PATH like collaborating on the Amnesty Day initiatives being led by ACLU, BLM, Bail Project and others.
- Hosting forums to engage community like Mayoral Forum and JCPS Student Assignment Plan Kick-Off Meeting
- Worked with community partners to improve the eviction court process making it more equitable for renters







JUSTICE







- Created a policy office to conduct policy research and analyze local, state, and national policies
- In the last General Assembly, advocated for and received Governor's veto on SB163 which would have banned formerly incarcerated citizens from ever receiving state educational funding







EDUCATION

- Funded 10 education organizations with practices in place to close the achievement gap.
- Focusing support on Simmons College of KY and Evolve502
- Held first education retreat. Invited Evolve 502 and other education leaders across Louisville and special guest Geoffrey Canada.
- LUL is preparing to scale a model of combining local, culturally competent social-emotional programming with intensive tutoring provided through existing, proven national models.
- Funding raised will be used to fund PATH OST providers engaging in this intensive tutoring service with socioemotional support model.
- Currently piloting the approach of math and reading intensive tutoring while also accessing college tours, photojournalism, martial arts training, and more.







HEALTH

A Path Forward has partnered with Begin To Talk, LLC to focus on mental health to form an advisory board, led by Elishia Durrett Johnson, of professionals in the area tasked with planning reoccurring community-wide mental health events.

- Hosted multiple community mental health events targeted to various communities (youth, parents, LGBTQ, etc) and focused on healing from trauma

HOUSING

- We have partnered with organizations focused on building and renovating affordable housing. These organizations are providing affordable rentals and a pathway to homeownership.
- These properties are rented to households with incomes at or below 50% of Area Median Income (AMI), as determined annually by HUD. Rent for these properties is limited to 30% of the income of the tenant living in the property.
- We have partnered to purchase 12 apartments that will become affordable rentals.
- LUL has provided 156 families with housing stabilization funding
- LUL continues to provide financial coaching, credit repair, and homeownership counseling.

BLACK BUSINESS

CURRENT STATE

- Pre-pandemic, just 2.4% of Louisville employer businesses were Black-owned, compared to a population that is 24% Black.
- Nationally, 41% of Black-owned businesses closed in the first 3 months of the pandemic.
- Pre-pandemic in Louisville, average revenues for white-owned employer businesses were 300% higher than they were for Black-owned employer businesses.
- 80% of non-employer Black businesses have revenues less than \$25,000 (and 80% of all businesses in Jefferson County are non-employer businesses)
- Seven months into the pandemic, Black-owned businesses received 1.9% of PPP loans while white-owned businesses received 83%.

Front Door to the Ecosystem

167 clients enrolled in the Center for Entrepreneurship to date and receiving:

- 1-1 coaching with LUL staff with a focus on business fundamentals business plan development, LLC establishment, business registration, business banking, etc.
- 1-1 financial coaching with assistance in preparing revenue and expenses assumptions, establishing budgets, identifying total capital needs, etc.
- 1-1 credit repair counseling for those whose personal financial situations impede their ability to access business financing
- Free professional services (accounting, legal, marketing, etc.) coordinated by LUL



Early Successes



Sow Journey, LLC - Screen printing and sublimation printing. Received free equipment and ongoing mentorship from RTBI along with point-of-sale and business banking support from Urban League. Located in the Sports & Learning Campus. Revenues have grown 150% since opening there.



JoBé Products - Patent-pending invention of a backpack/desk (Besk). Seed capital provided. Product is nearing fabrication and pre-sale retail and wholesale orders are growing.



Early Successes



Black Mental Health Providers - Capacity building effort to help mental health firms accept health insurance thereby growing their businesses and serving more community members in need of services. Two insurance credentialing workshops, led by Black professionals, were created and offered covering 10 hours of training. 78 individuals attended and four are already actively applying for insurance credentials.



Julee's Mocha Coffee Shop - Grand opening of coffee shop, delivery, and catering service located in the west end. Accessed several organizations to prepare her business including the Small Business Development Center, Chef Space, and the Urban League. Has also benefited from League housing & education services to strengthen her family.
