EMPLOYEE OF THE COALITION FOR THE HOMELESS HERE IN LOUISVILLE
AND SPEAKING TO YOU TODAY, AND YOU HAVE THE RESPONSIBILITY OF
HELPING US SPEND HUNDREDS OF MILLIONS IN OUR CITY.

YOU'RE FACED WITH A ONCE IN A LIFE-TIME OPPORTUNITY TO ADDRESS
THE ROOT CAUSES OF OUR CITY'S PROBLEMS BY INVESTING IN WHAT
MATTERS THE MOST.

THIS IS AT THE ROOT OF SO MANY OTHER ISSUES.

A HOME IS NOT ONLY A PLACE TO SLEEP.

IT IS A PLACE TO WORK, TO TEACH OUR CHILDREN, TO STAY HEALTHY,
TO REST AND CELEBRATE.

HOUSING IS PUBLIC HEALTH, AND IT IS PUBLIC SAFETY.

SO WE HAVE A CHANCE FOR AFFORDABLE HOUSING.

THIS WILL KEEP PEOPLE SAFELY HOUSED FOR DECADES.

WHEN THE PUBLIC HAS TO FIGHT FOR INCREMENTAL CHANGES FOR NEFARIOUS POLICE MISCONDUCT.

THERE COULD BE EXPERTISE WORKING ON SOLUTIONS OR LOSS.

I DON'T WANT ANOTHER DECADE TO BE MADE.

WE MUST MAKE SURE THAT PUBLIC HEALTH IS INSURED IN ORDER TO HAVE HEALTH EQUALITY.

SOME THINGS TO CONSIDER ARE ADDING TO THE NEGOTIATION TEAM.

THIS IS BECAUSE IT IS IMPORTANT TO HAVE COMMUNITY INVOLVEMENT AND INPUT.

I HOPE THAT YOU WOULD RENEGOTIATE THE CONTRACT IN ORDER FOR OHS

TO BE A PART OF THE CONTRACT NEGOTIATION BECAUSE TRANSPARENCY IS REALLY IMPORTANT.

I WORKED DOWNTOWN LIKE I SAID.

I HAVE PEOPLE THAT STAY CLOSE TO MY OFFICE.

I SEE EVERY DAY THEY HAVE INTERACTIONS WITH THE POLICE.

I CAN SEE THEIR LIVES AREN'T BENEFITING FROM THE WAY THE POLICE REACT.

I DON'T FEEL CONFIDENT THAT OUR CURRENT CONTRACT WITH THE FOP ALLOWS FOR WHEN THERE'S POLICE MISCONDUCT AND WE HAVE AN APPROPRIATE PROCESS TO DISCIPLINE OFFICERS THAT DON'T FOLLOW PROTOCOL OR TO REMOVE OFFICERS WHEN THERE'S LIKE GROSS NEGLIGENCE.

WE NEED TO CLARIFY DISCIPLINE AND IN FRONT OF THE POLICE MERIT BOARD AND THE COURTS AND WHAT HAPPENS WHEN OFFICERS ENGAGE IN THIS CONTACT.

MOREOVER THE CONDUCT RECORDS ARE NOT THE SAME.

COMPLAINTS ARE DESTROYED AFTER TWO YEARS.

THEY'RE IN THE CARRIED IN THE DISCIPLINARY RECORDS.

WE NEED TO SEE WHEN COMPLAINTS ARE CONNECTED TO PARTICULAR OFFICERS FILES AND BE ABLE TO TRACK WHEN AN OFFICER ENGAGES IN MISCONDUCT.

WE ALSO WANT THERE TO BE AN END TO RESTRICTING OR DELAYING INTERROGATIONS AND JUST GIVE OFFICERS TIME TO WORK WITH A UNION REPRESENTATIVE OR UPWARDS TO CORROBORATE A STORY AND DOESN'T

ALLOW FOR INVESTIGATORS TO GATHER ALL THE INFORMATION IN A
TIMELY MANNER.

ALSO THE NEED FOR YEAR ROUND SERVICES.

I WANT TO FOCUS ON THAT.

THE PEOPLE IN THE COMMUNITY WHETHER THEY'RE FACING EVICTION OR GOING THROUGH A NUMBER OF AREAS OF THE PROCESS.

THOSE INDIVIDUALS NEED LOTS OF SUPPORT.

WE HAVE TO DO THE BEST THAT WE CAN TO INSURE THOSE ARE IMPACTFUL FOR A LONG PERIOD OF TIME.

THE URBAN LEAGUE ALONG WITH THE MINISTRY AND MANY OTHERS WHO ARE DOING THIS WORK AND PROVIDING RESOURCES EVERY SINGLE DAY AS WELL AS OUR PARTNERS.

WE WANT TO MAKE SURE THOSE THINGS ARE PRIORITIZED AND FUNDING REQUEST, NOT THROUGH ARP BUT OTHER SOURCES.
