RE: Justification for Locating a Residential AODE Program Within the Community Most Impacted by Substance Use Disorders

The placement of a Residential Alcohol and Other Drug Education (AODE) treatment program within the heart of a community heavily impacted by substance use is not only appropriate, but essential to effective recovery, community restoration, and public health improvement. Communities experiencing high rates of addiction, overdose, homelessness, unemployment, trauma, and mental health challenges require direct and immediate access to comprehensive treatment services. Locating residential treatment services in these areas removes barriers to care and increases the likelihood that individuals will seek and remain engaged in treatment.

Many individuals suffering from substance use disorders face significant transportation limitations, financial hardship, unstable housing, and limited family support. When treatment facilities are located far from the communities where addiction is most prevalent, individuals are less likely to access services consistently. Establishing a residential AODE program in the center of the affected community allows treatment providers to meet individuals where they are physically, emotionally, and socially. Additionally, recovery is strengthened when treatment occurs within the environment where individuals must ultimately learn to maintain sobriety. A community-based residential program provides opportunities for clients to develop healthy coping mechanisms, relapse prevention strategies, vocational skills, and community reintegration supports while still connected to real-life surroundings and resources. Programs located in impacted neighborhoods can more effectively collaborate with hospitals, probation and parole offices, social service agencies, housing providers, workforce development programs, and peer support networks.

The presence of a professionally operated residential AODE facility also contributes positively to neighborhood stabilization. Rather than increasing crime or disorder, properly licensed and regulated treatment programs help reduce overdose deaths, decrease emergency room utilization, lower incarceration rates, and improve public safety by providing individuals with structured treatment, accountability, and support. These programs create pathways to recovery that benefit not only the individual, but also families, businesses, schools, and the community as a whole.

Substance use disorder is a public health crisis that requires visible, accessible, and compassionate treatment solutions. Locating a residential AODE program within the communities most affected by addiction demonstrates a commitment to equity, accessibility, and meaningful recovery outcomes. Treatment should not be hidden away from the communities that need it most; it should be integrated into the very areas where healing, restoration, and transformation are urgently needed.

For these reasons, the establishment of a residential AODE treatment program within the heart of an impacted community is both justified and necessary.
