

BILL WAS CIVIL DIRECTOR OF THE JEFFERSON COUNTY ATTORNEY'S OFFICE UNTIL HE RETIRED IN SEPTEMBER OF 2019.

HE WAS THE FIRST DIRECTOR UNDER MERGER AND WAS INSTRUMENTAL WITH OUR EARLY LEADERS IN CRAFTING AND INTERPRETING 67C AND WHAT WE NOW HAVE AS MERGE GOVERNMENT.

HE LOVED BEING THE MAIN LEGAL ADVISOR TO THIS BODY, LEGISLATIVE BODY.

SEPTEMBER 25TH, 2014 WAS DECLARED BILL O'BRIEN DAY, WHEN HE

RETIRED.

HE STOOD AT THIS PODIUM WITH FORMER PRESIDENT JIM KING AND FORMER LEADERS OF THE COMMUNITY IT.

TIME PREVENTS ME FROM EXPLAINING HOW THE COUNCIL AND GOVERNMENT
AGENCIES CAUSE THE EAST SHIFT IN POPULATION SUCH AS PLANNING AND
DESIGN KILLING A PROPOSAL ON SEVEN ACRES ZONED RESIDENTIAL AND
TELLING THE DISTRICT 21 PROPERTY OWNER TO CONSIDER ZONING AND

REFORM CHANGES.

I OBJECT TO THE POLITICAL PROCESS OF REDISTRICTING.

DISTRICT 21 CITIZENS CAME OUT IN FORCE TELLING THE RESTRICT COMMITTEE NOT TO SPLIT OUR NEIGHBORHOODS.

AS I REVIEW THE CURRENT REDISTRICTING MAP, I SEE MANY OTHER INAPPROPRIATELY DRAWN DISTRICTS.

DISTRICT 21 IS CERTAINLY NOT COMPACT AND CONTIGUOUS.

I DON'T BELIEVE THAT GERRYMANDERING WORKS.

IF IT WORKED, KENTUCKY WOULD NOT BE BLOOD RED.

BEFORE IT WAS A BLUE STATE AND GERRYMANDER EACH TIME NEW LINES WERE DRAWN.

FOR THE MAJORITY CAUCUS, UNDERSTAND I'M A DEMOCRAT.

BUT HAVE THE ORIGINAL PLAN BEEN APPROVED WITH ME NO LONGER RESIDING IN DISTRICT 21, I WOULD NOT HAVE VOTED FOR THE DEMOCRATIC INCUMBENT.

IF MY PARTY TREATED ME WITH DISDAIN TO DO THIS.

THIS DOES NOT PROHIBIT COUNCIL FROM ASKING THE GEOGRAPHIC
DEPARTMENT TO PREPARE AND PUBLISH A REDISTRICTING PROPOSAL.
METRO COUNCIL COULD MAKE CHANGES TO THE REDISTRICT PLAN.

I'LL TALK IN THE FUTURE.

EXPLAIN ANY CHANGES.

I'M ASKING METRO COUNCIL TO PASS ORDINANCE THAT UPON IMMEDIATELY
HAVING THE CENSUS, METRO COUNCIL HAS REPRESENTATIVES FROM THE
GEOGRAPHIC DEPARTMENT TO PREPARE A RESTRICT PROPOSAL WITHIN 30

DAYS OF HIRING.

NOW IS THE TIME TO PROPOSE AND PASS THIS ORDINANCE.

FOUR COUNCIL MEMBERS ANNOUNCED THEY WON'T RUN NEXT YEAR.

MANY OF YOU SITTING HERE NOW WILL NO LONGER BE COUNCIL MEMBERS BY THE NEXT CENSUS.

DON'T THINK REDISTRICT WON'T EFFECT YOU IN TEN YEARS.

MY UNDERSTANDING IS THAT AT LEAST TWO FORMAL COUNCIL MEMBERS OBJECTED TO THE ORIGINAL REDISTRICTING PROPOSAL.

PLEASE TAKE POLITICS OUT OF REDISTRICTING.

AND OUR LIVING SPACE, THE TIME IS NOW TO INVEST 89 MILLION

DOLLARS TO THE AMERICAN RESCUE PLAN FUNDS FOR HOUSING FOR OUR

HOUSING IS A HUMAN RIGHT.

THE SECOND IS INFORMAL COMPLAINTS VERSUS FORMAL COMPLAINTS AND WE HAD ROBUST CONVERSATION ABOUT THIS.

COULD I HAVE TALK TO GET THIS EARLIER OR SOONER IN MY HAND SO I CAN LOOK AT IT LINE ITEM BY LINE ITEM?

PERHAPS.

BUT I WAS TOLD AT 4:00 THAT IT WAS UPLOADED IN THE SYSTEM.

I'M NOT HAVING OPPORTUNITY TO LOOK AT IT AS CRITICALLY AS OTHER LEGISLATION.

I WANT TO BE A YES VOTE, THERE'S SO MANY UNANSWERED QUESTIONS.

WE'RE NOT ALONE IN THE EFFORT.

2020, THE COALITION FOR THE HOMELESS CHANGED THEIR PROCESS,

INCLUDING PUBLIC DISCLOSURE OF SPECIFIC HEALTH AND SAFETY

CONCERNS BEING ADDRESSED WHEN CLEAN-UPS ARE SCHEDULED AKA A RISK

ASSESSMENT.

IN 2020, THEY CHANGED THEIR PROCESS TO HAVE OFFICIALS CONDUCT A HEALTH AND SAFETY ASSESSMENT OF THE SITES.

IN 2018 OREGON PASSED A BILL ALLOWING THE CITY OF PORTLAND AND

THIS IT INSURES THAT IT WILL BE ASSESSED WITHIN TEN DAYS AND FROM THAT A DETERMINATION IS MADE.

>> THE DETERMINATION IS MADE.

ANY SCENARIO WHERE THE HEALTH AND SAFETY IS BEING DONE SO THE CAMP IS CLEARED THAT -- THAT THERE'S A BETTER COMPREHENSIVE UNDERSTANDING OF THOSE THERE.

AND GIVING THEM MORE, SAYING, THIS IS THE RESOURCE THAT IS YOU COULD EXACT US TO.

THIS TYPE OF THING.

IT HELPS WITH THE LOGISTICS AND TRANSITIONS.

QUESTION BEING IS THERE A SCENARIO WHERE THE HEALTH AND SAFETY
REVIEW WOULD STOP THE PROCESS OF CLEARING THAT CAMP THAT IS
ILLEGALLY ON PUBLIC LAND?

>> IT DEPENDS ON THE OUTCOME OF THE RISK ASSESSMENT AS FAR AS WHAT SERVICES ARE PROVIDED.

HOLLANDER MAY SPEAK TO HOW THE 21 DAYS ALLOWS FOR SERVICES TO BE PROVIDED.

IT DEPENDS ON THE SCENARIO.

I HAVE THE SURVEY IN FRONT OF ME WHICH YOU'LL SEE AMENDMENTS.

WE ALSO INTRODUCED THAT REQUIRE THAT RISK ASSESSMENT BE BROUGHT

TO A COUNCIL COMMITTEE FOR REVIEW EVERY YEAR.

IF YOU DISLIKE ANYTHING, THIS BODY HAS AN OPPORTUNITY TO -- TO ENGAGE DIRECTLY WITH RCS OR LIKE AGENCY TO HAVE A CONVERSATION ABOUT WHAT SHOULD BE ADDED.

I WILL PASS TO HOLLANDER.

- >> YES, SIR.

THANK YOU.

>> I DON'T BELIEVE THE CHANGE IN THE ORDINANCE WILL EXTEND

THE TIME THAT -- THAT -- THAT -- THAT -- THAT CAMPS WILL BE

ALLOWED TO -- TO BE PRESENT.

>> WHAT WE HAVE SEEN IS PEOPLE THAT WERE TALKED TO AND
OFFERED SERVICES AND DECIDED TO GO TO SHELTER OR SOME PLACE

ELSE.

THAT'S THE POINT OF THE ORDINANCE.

- I DON'T THINK THAT TIME WILL BE EXTENDED.

ACCURATE?

THE RISK ASSESSMENT IS GOING TO DETERMINE AGAIN WHAT WE WANT TO SEE IS A RATIONALE BEHIND WHEN DECISIONS ARE MADE AND -- AND WHAT THE SENSE OF URGENCY IS.

CURRENTLY AS IT EXISTS, AND I DON'T WANT TO SPEAK FOR RCS AND OTHERS.

THERE'S COMPETING PRIORITIES.

SOME RISE TO THE LEVEL TO BE RELOCATED WHEN OTHERS DON'T.

WHAT THIS WILL TO IS IT GIVES QUANTIFIABLE EXPECTATION AROUND OR JUSTIFICATION RATHER FOR WHY ONE CAMP IS BEING RELOCATED OVER ANOTHER.

>> I WANTED TO ADD, THERE'S SCENARIO WHERE YOU DON'T HAVE TO MOVE THE CAMP.

IT IS BASED ON THE SCORE.

I'M LOOKING AT THE QUESTIONS, DEBRIS CLOSE TO THE ROAD.

BIOHAZARDS.

IF THIS COMES BACK WITH A LOW SCORE, YOU WOULDN'T NEED TO MOVE IT OR CLEAN IT OR SOME SERVICE OVER THIS.

IT DEPENDS ON THE ACTUAL CAMP.

>> YOU GOT THE POINT.

THIS IS WHAT I'M CONCERNED ABOUT.

IF I START DOING ANYTHING ON PUBLIC LAND THAT IS NOT LEGAL.

I SET UP A HOUSING SCENARIO ON A PIECE OF PUBLIC LAND THAT I'M NOT ENTITLED TO OR GOT PERMITS, ET CETERA THAT IS STILL ILLEGAL. IT IS PUBLIC.

THIS IS APPLICABLE TO PUBLIC LAND, NOT PRIVATE LAND.

PUBLIC LAND IS FOR EVERYBODY.

RIGHT?

NOT JUST THE PERSON WHO IS THERE AT THAT MOMENT.

EVEN HORRIBLE CIRCUMSTANCES HAS NO OTHER CHOICE AT THAT MOMENT.

IT IS IMPORTANT THAT WE GET THEM INTO, EVEN AT LOW RISK, THEY'RE

STILL -- THEY'RE STILL LIVING HOMELESS IN A -- IN A MIDDLE OF NOWHERE.

I'M -- I'M VOTING FOR IT.

VOTING FOR MILLIONS OF DOLLARS THERE.

VOTING FOR MILLIONS OF DOLLARS IN THE BUDGET.

VOICED SUPPORT FOR A TEMPORARY SITUATION THAT WILL BE FOLLOWED FOR A PERMANENT SITUATION.

SUPPORTIVE HOUSING FOR THE HOMELESS.

I'M SUPPORTING THAT BECAUSE IT IS IT AN INFINITELY BETTER WAY TO GO ABOUT DEALING WITH THE PROBLEM DEALING WITH THE PROBLEM.

WE DON'T GIVE ALTERNATIVES.

WE MOVE FROM POINT A TO POINT B.

IF I VOTE FOR TAXPAYER DOLLARS TO STOP THAT, STOP MOVING
HOMELESS PEOPLE AROUND OUR COMMUNITY I WANT TO ESTABLISH THAT
THE POINT IS TO NOT ALLOW FOR THAT TO CONTINUE AND TO PROVIDE
WHEN THESE CAMPS ARE IDENTIFIED, PROVIDE PEOPLE WITH ACCESS TO
THE SERVICES AND HELP THEM GET TO THEM.

MAKE THEM ACCESSIBLE.

ALONG WITH WHATEVER WE CAN PROVIDE YEOMAN'S WORK TO EXPAND.

S AND THAT'S WHERE I'M CONCERNED.

THERE MAY BE LOW RISK, AND LET FOLKS STAY HERE.

I DON'T SEE HOW THERE'S ANY SCENARIO OF THE HOMELESS BEING IN A HOME SCENARIO WHERE WE DON'T CONNECT TO THE SERVICES AND NOT CONTINUE TO DO THAT.

I LIKE TO HEAR OTHER DEBATE.

>> JUMP IN.

I'M LOOKING AT CAMPING OR STORING PERSONAL PROPERTY ON CERTAIN PUBLIC PROPERTY PROHIBITED.

THERE'S EXAMPLES OF PEOPLE CAMPING OUTSIDE AND I WANT TO
REINFORCE THE FACT THAT WE'RE MISSING AFFORDABLE HOUSING IN THE
CITY OF LOUISVILLE.

WE WANT EVERYONE TO HAVE SERVICES.

PEOPLE CAMPING OUTSIDE, THERE'S NO PLACE TO GO.

I CAN'T EMPHASIZE THAT ENOUGH.

THERE'S NO PLACE FOR THEM TO GO.

NO HOUSING.

NO SHELTER SPACE.

ON AVERAGE THERE'S MAYBE 40 SHELTER BEDS AVAILABLE A NIGHT.

THERE'S OVER 260 PEOPLE WHO ARE SLEEPING IN OUR STREETS.

THERE'S NO WHERE FOR THEM TO GO.

I UNDERSTAND THE CONCERN WITH PEOPLE SLEEPING OUTSIDE, I DON'T WANT PEOPLE SLEEPING OUTSIDE JUST FOR THE HELL OF IT, THEY'RE SLEEPING OUTSIDE BECAUSE THERE'S LITERALLY NOWHERE FOR THEM TO GO.

THAT'S THE PEOPLE THAT UNFORTUNATELY DON'T HAVE A COUCH TO SLEEP ON OR DON'T HAVE SHELTER SPACE IF IT IS OUT OF COMMISSION.

THAT'S THE CITY.

OUR FUNDING WILL ALLEVIATE ABOUT HALF OF THAT.

WE GOT A LONG WAY TO GO.

TO CLOSE THE HOUSING GAP AT THE BOTTOM IS 5 BILLION DOLLAR JOB.
WE DON'T HAVE THAT MONEY.

WE'RE TAKING CARE OF FOLKS IN THAT SITUATION.

>> I THINK IT IS IMPORTANT TO UNDERSTAND WHAT THE CURRENT PRACTICES, EVEN IF WE DON'T PASS IT.

OFTENTIMES IF YOU SEE A CAMP AND YOU'RE CONCERNED AND WANT TO INSURE THAT AVERAGE GETS IN THE SERVICES.

MAKE THE REPORT.

THEY GO OUT.

SOMEBODY SHOULD MAKE CONTACT.

THAT DOESN'T INCLUDE 21-DAY ISSUE.

IN OUR ORDINANCE, THERE'S NOTHING THAT SAYS JUST BECAUSE WE REPORT A CAMP, IT IS GOING TO INSURE THERE'S A RELOCATION.

WHAT THEY DO IS PRIORITIZE.

THERE'S NO RISK, NO CONCERNS IN RELATION TO NEIGHBORS.

THEY'RE NOT GOING TO GO OUT AND ISSUE A 21-DAY NOTICE.

THAT'S NOT THE CURRENT PRACTICE.

I THINK THAT'S JUST REALLY IMPORTANT TO UNDERSTAND.

IN FACT WHAT HAPPENS IS, CURRENTLY UNDER THE CURRENT PRACTICE.

IT IS REALLY DIFFICULT TO KNOW HOW THAT CAMP WAS ASSESSED, WHAT FACTORS WERE USED AND WHERE IT IS IN THE QUEUE.

IF IT IS ON THE CUSP, THERE'S NO WAY TO HAVE IT WITH THE

PARTNER.

I THINK THAT'S AN IMPORTANT DISTINCTION.

WE DIDN'T PASS THIS, IT DOESN'T CHANGE THE FACT THAT NOT EVERY CAMP GETS YOU 40 AND IS ELEVATING.

>> THANK YOU.

>> FOX.

I'M TORN ON THIS ONE.

YOU TALK HOMELESSNESS AND YOU CITE CALIFORNIA AND OREGON.

THEY HAVEN'T DONE A GREAT JOB.

IT SEEMS TO ME THAT THE MORE MONEY WE PUT INTO HOMELESSNESS, THE MORE LEGISLATION WE PASS, THE MORE HOMELESS WE HAVE.

CODIFIED RIGHTS ON PUBLIC LANDS, TRY SETTING UP A BUSINESS ON PUBLIC LAND AND SEE HOW WELL THE GOVERNMENT TAKES TO GET THERE AND REGULATE YOU.

IT LOOKS TO ME LIKE.

I READ IT VERBATIM IF I HAVE THE CORRECT TEXT.

THIS IS THE QUESTION TO THE SPONSORS.

I'M READING, SECTION 1A AND STARTS ON THE TOP OF PAGE 2 SAYS
RISK ASSESSMENT WILL BE CONDUCT WITHIN TEN DAYS OF THE
DEPARTMENT OF RESILIENCE AND SUCCESSOR AGENCY REVEAL
NOTIFICATION OF AN ENCAMPMENT.

THE NEXT SAYS ROCKIES MAY TAKE PLACE BY LOUISVILLE METRO WITHIN 21 DAYS OF THE NOTICE, FROM THE DATE OF THE NOTICE EXPIRING.

OTHERWISE A NOW 21 DAY NOTICE MUST BE GIVEN.

MY COLLEAGUE ASKED IF IT WAS 21, IF YOU COUNT THAT IN 21 DAYS, YOUR AT 52 DAYS.

WHY THIS IS CONCERNING, I HEAR FROM RESIDENTS THAT HAVE TO DEAL WITH THESE CAMPS, IN CLOSE PROXIMITY.

THEY'RE OUT.

I HAVE AN E-MAIL I SAVED FROM A LADY.

SHE HAS THREE SONS AND WORKS TWO JOBS TO SUPPORT THOSE SONS AND SHE HAS TO COME HOME AND PARK HER CAR IN THE STREET AND IT IS ON APPLE DRIVE.

SHE WALKS PAST THIS CAMP AND SHE'S TERRIFIED GETTING TO HER HOUSE.

TO EXTEND WHAT WE ARE, I HAVE CAUSE FOR CONCERN.

MY QUESTION DO I READ THAT CORRECTLY.

TEN DAYS AND 21 DAYS, IF IT IS NOT MERGED.

- >> COUNCIL MEMBER GEORGE.
- >> I THINK WHAT IS MISSING IS THE ACTUAL CONTEST OF PRACTICE.

 I CAN ASSURE YOU I ALSO LIVE IN CLOSE PROXIMITY TO THOSE IN NEED

 AND CRISIS AND HAVE A FULL UNDERSTANDING OF WHAT THAT MEANS TO

 BOTH IN CAMPS AND THOSE THAT LIVE AROUND CAMPS.
- I'M CONCERNED ABOUT THE EQUITY ISSUES OF NEIGHBORS WHO ALREADY SHOULDER A TREMENDOUS AMOUNT OF ENVIRONMENTAL INJUSTICE ISSUES BECAUSE THEY LIVE NEXT TO EXPRESSWAY.

THEY DEAL WITH THE TRANSIENT BEHAVIOR THAT COMES IN GENERAL WITH TRAFFIC.

AND THEN FOLKS IN CRISIS CAMPS AND HIGH CONCENTRATION.

I'M AWARE OF WHAT THAT IS.

I THINK WHAT IS MISSING, YOU'RE ACCURATELY READING THE LANGUAGE IN THE PROPOSAL.

WHAT IS MISSING IS WHAT HAPPENS IN REPORTING A CAMP.

CAMPS THAT CERTAINLY REPORT FREQUENTLY AND CAN TELL YOU IN THREE YEARS HAVE NEVER REPORTED A CAMP.

THE DAY I REPORTED SOMEONE FROM OUTREACH GOES OUT AND POSTS IT.

THAT'S UP HEARD OF.

THAT'S UNHEARD OF, SOMEBODY HAS A DIFFERENT EXPERIENCE.

I HAD A BRIDGE AND IMMEDIATE RESPONSE.

I WANT TO BE CLEAR, WHEN WE TALK ABOUT ADDING EXTRA TEN DAYS.

I NEVER REPORTED A CAMP IN THAT -- IN THAT EXACT DAY OR TWO DAYS FRANKLY SOMEONE HAS GONE OUT.

THERE'S A PROCESS TO DRIVE OUTREACH.

THANK YOU.

>> THAT WAS A YES.

IF THE RELOCATION DOESN'T OCCUR IN 21 DAYS, A NEW NOTICE STARTS AND WE START ALL OVER AGAIN.

BY MY TALLY, JUST THAT, IF IT DOESN'T GET EXTENDED THROUGH NORMAL DAYS, IT IS 52 DAYS.

AM I READING IT RIGHT OR WRONG?

I DON'T KNOW OF A POSTING AND THERE WAS SERVICES AND RELOCATION.

SO THIS IDEA THAT IT MIGHT BE 50, 60, HOWEVER MANY DAYS HAS NOT

HAPPENED.

I WOULDN'T EXPECT IT TO HAPPEN IF WE PASS THIS.

IS THE CAMP, IS EVERY CAMP ASSESSED WHEN IDENTIFIED IN

- >> YES, IF THERE'S A REQUEST FILED?
- >> YES.
- >> AND THERE HAS TO BE A REQUEST.

THAT REQUEST ASSUMING IS IN THE FORM OF A COMPLAINT.

IS THAT CORRECT.

EMERGENCY CLEARINGS COULD HAPPEN.

I'M LOOKING AT LETTER A.

FAILURE TO CAN'T AN IMMEDIATELY TO LEAD TO SERIOUS HARM FOR PUBLIC HEALTH AND SAFETY.

IF THERE'S AN EMERGENCY SITUATION LIKE FOX ALLUDED TO EARLIER WHEN HE TALKED ABOUT CONCERNS.

NOT WHETHER LMPD WILL LOCK SOMEBODY UP.

>> WHAT IF THERE IS LIKE -- LIKE ABUSIVE TYPE OF HARASSMENT TYPE BEHAVIOR.

MAYBE COUNCIL MEMBER.

THIS SOUNDS LIKE AN LMPD ISSUE.

NOT A PROVIDER ISSUE.

>> THANK YOU.

I CONTEND THEY FEEL SAFE AROUND.

I PASS TO THIRD AND WATTERSON HERE.

AND LOCKING UP YOUR CARS AND TRASH.

A SITUATION.

THE CAMP IS NOT ON -- ON -- ON PUBLIC PROPERTY.

THE FOLKS HAVE FELT VERY THREATENED.

THEY CALL PEOPLE OUT TO DEAL WITH IT.

THAT PUTS THEM AT RISK TOO.

I DON'T KNOW.

IT IS JUST ALL A LITTLE CONCERNING.

>> I THINK THERE'S CONFUSION AROUND WHAT THE POLICE DO AND THIS ORDINANCE DOES.

IF SOMEONE IS UNSAFE, THAT'S DIFFERENT THAN SOMEONE FEELING UNSAFE.

I TOTALLY REFUTE SOME OF THE LANGUAGE BEING THROWN OUT ABOUT ENCAMPMENTS AND THE CONSTITUENTS THAT HAVE THE LEAST OF THE

LEAST.

THAT'S INAPPROPRIATE.

WE TALK ABOUT PEOPLE THAT DON'T HAVE HOUSING.

THEY'RE NOT THE SAME.

SOME STRUGGLING WITH MENTAL ILLNESS.

SOME ARE NOT.

SOME STRUGGLING WITH ALL SORTS OF ISSUES.

WE CANNOT ASSUME WHAT SOMEONE IS GOING THROUGH BECAUSE THEY'RE THE POOREST AND LIVING OUTSIDE.

THAT'S SLOWLY WHAT THIS CONVERSATION IS ABOUT.

>> WHAT I'M SUGGESTING THEN -- AND SAY TO THAT -- TO THAT COMMENT.

>> IT HAS.

>> THERE'S MENTAL ILLNESS.

>> COUNCILWOMAN.

COUNCILWOMAN.

ALL RIGHT.

WE'RE GOING TO DO THIS THE RIGHT WAY.

[LAUGHTER].

YOU CAN ASK A QUESTION.

IF YOU HAVE A DIRECT QUESTION, ASK ME.

ALL RIGHT?

I KNOW THERE'S MENTAL ILLNESS.

SOMETIMES THAT MAKES PEOPLE UNCOMFORTABLE BECAUSE DIFFERENT

PERSONALITIES, DISORDERS CAN BE AGGRESSIVE.

PEOPLE PASSING BY.

WHAT HAPPENS THEN DO NOT DO THEY HAVE RECOURSE OTHER THAN TO WAIT TEN DAYS FOR ASSESSMENT.

THAT ASSESSMENT DOESN'T COME THROUGH.

WHAT ALTERNATIVES DO THEY HAVE?

THIS ORDINANCE IS SIMPLY ADDING TRANSPARENCY AND OVERSIGHT TO THE PROCESS FOR WHICH WE CLEAN OR CLEAR CAMPS.

THAT'S IT.

NOTHING MORE OR NOTHING ELSE.

- >> DOES THAT ANSWER YOUR OUESTION IN
- >> SOMEWHAT BUT I'LL LET THE OTHER PERSON GO.
- >> KRAMER.
- >> THANK YOU.
- >> I REMEMBER WE WERE HORRIFIED IN THE BODY.

THERE WAS ARE A FAIRLY LARGE ENCAMPMENT OF FOLKS OF ALL OF THE BELONGINGS AS THEY HAD, WERE TREATED WITH HORRIBLE DISRESPECT.

THAT'S A REFLECTION ON AN ATTITUDE TOWARDS THE PERSON THAT OWNS

THE PROPERTIES.

FOLKS WERE HORRIFIED.

AND THIS WAS A PRODUCT OF THAT.

- I REMEMBER BEING HORRIFIED.
- I REMEMBER BEING A SUPPORTIVE OF THE ORDINANCE.
- I REMEMBER HAVING AN IDEA WHAT AN ENCAMPMENT WAS AND WHAT THAT WOULD MEAN AND LOOK LIKE.
- >> ONLY AFTER WE PASSED THE ORDINANCE IN FOLLOW-UP
 CONVERSATIONS WITH FOLKS FROM RESILIENCE THAT I CAME TO
 UNDERSTAND THE WAY THAT RESILIENCE TREATS CAMPS.
- I WAS SURPRISED TO FIND THAT ORDINANCE WE PASSED MADE IT SUCH THAT TWO OR MORE PERSONS TEMPORARY WOULD BE A SHELTER.

THEY TEMPORARILY ESTABLISHED A PLACE TO STAY THAT THOSE TWO PEOPLE ESTABLISHED A CAMP.

IT WASN'T -- IT WASN'T AT THAT POINT THEN -- IT TOOK OVER A MONTH.

TO ASK THEM TO MOVE.

IF YOU'RE A PROPERTY OWNER OR BUSINESS OWNER OR A POLICE OFFICER
AND YOU ON YOUR BEAT AT THE BEGINNING OF YOUR EVENING, YOU DROVE

TO GO IN AND WHOLESALE MOVE SOMEONE WITH ALL OF THEIR

POSSESSIONS AFTER A CAMP HAS BEEN ESTABLISHED.

MY STRUGGLE IS HOW DOES THAT MEAN A CAMP IS ESTABLISHED?

THERE'S PLACES IT DOESN'T MAKE SENSE THAT YOU ALLOW PEOPLE DECIDE TO STAY.

WE ASK THEM TO MOVE ON.

A CAMP IS SET UP.

IT REQUIRES MORE SENSITIVITY.

I STRUGGLE TO UNDERSTAND JUST HOW -- HOW -- HOW FINDING A PLACE

TO -- TO PUT UP A TEMPORARY SHELTER IMMEDIATELY MAKES THAT A

CAMP AND GUARANTEES, GUARANTEES AND -- AND BY PRACTICE AND NOW

IT WILL BE CODIFIED THAT THAT PERSON WILL BE ON THAT PUBLIC

PROPERTY FOR A MINIMUM OF A MONTH.

IN ALL LIKELIHOOD MUCH LONGER THAN THAT.

REGARDLESS OF THE FACT IT IS PUBLIC PROPERTY AND THE FACT THAT
THERE ARE OTHER FOLKS THAT WANT TO USE THAT PROPERTY THE WAY IT
WAS DESIGNED TO BE USED IN A CAMP.

REGARDLESS OF -- OF HOW MANY YOU HAVE.

I'M STRUGGLING WITH THAT.

THAT'S NOT THE ORDINANCE.

IT WILL BASE DECISIONS ON THE RISK ASSESSMENT.

TO ADD CLARIFICATION, THE CODE OF ORDINANCES PRIOR TO THIS IT,

REGARDLESS OF THIS CAMP IS DEFINED AS SOMETHING THAT -- WHERE

THERE IS AN ESTABLISHED GROUP OF PEOPLE PAST 48 HOURS.

THE CAMP ORDINANCE IS NOT IN FRONT OF US TODAY.

THE ONLY THING IN FRONT OF US CREATES A PROCESS THAT -- THAT

EVALUATES THE CAMP CLEARING BASED ON AN OBJECT EVERY CRITERIA,

VERSUS THE WAY IT IS DONE TODAY WHICH IS WHOEVER CALLS RCS THE

MOST OFTEN AND EXERTS ENOUGH PRESSURE ON SOMEONE AT RCS TO DO

SOMETHING.

THAT'S WHO THEY RESPOND TO.
