11	Holder	40241	One of the early questions asks about appropriate size. I had to answer “no opinion” because “any of the above” was not available. I wonder if there isn’t a need for a combined metric. The footprint and architectural features are important but do not by themselves reflect the true measure of the data center’s impact on the community. I would have no problem with a building with 1 million square feet in the appropriate location (Ford, GE, industrial zone, etc.). If you intend to create a category unique to data centers, the most important distinguishing feature of a data center is the electricity consumption. Electricity consumption could also be used to distinguish one data center category (level 1 level 2, for example) from the other. It is likely that there is a fairly straightforward method for calculating load (number of CPU’s, CPU’s per square foot, electricity demand per cpu would get you started). The greater the electricity demand, the greater the noise, the greater need for noise mitigation. This relationship holds true for water consumption, water discharge impact, cooling, backup generation capacity and mitigation of air discharge of soot and other pollutants. I may have more to add later. Proximity to houses is also dependent on size and capacity combined. Conditional use permits would again be dependent upon size and capacity combined. Ultimately I think you should first find operating definitions that apply to data centers in particular. I’m highly confident that definitions already exist with particular attention to the context of zoning issues. After a quick scan of online data, there are likely somewhere in the neighborhood of 200 to 300 hyperscale data centers in the United States operating today and many more around the world. There should be ample information available in urban planning literature on lessons learned to set us on the right path.

13	Dries	40245	LDC regulations should address different sizes of Data Centers. However, vague terms (like "hyperscale") with changing definitions for different geographic areas and different years should be avoided. If noise is addressed, be careful not to define specific maximum dBA levels, when ambient noise levels in certain areas (for example adjacent to highways) may be 70 to 80+ dBA. Setback levels from residential structures might be similar to existing setbacks for specific Commercial or Industrial zoning categories or Workplace form districts. Building heights might be defined similar to building heights for specific Commercial or Industrial zoning categories, or Workplace form districts. Include provision for additional building height as a building steps back from a property line. Avoid specific technology requirements as good or bad, since technology is rapidly changing. For example, avoid a requirement for closed loop water systems. Avoid defining specific security requirements, such as "security cameras are restricted to property boundaries".
14	Nathan	40205	I'm worried that energy bills will spike as a result of data center power use. Since LG&E relies heavily on coal, the climate impacts of data centers in this area would be profound. Additionally, if data centers don't get built or cooling technology advances, the Louisville Water Company and Louisville MSD could be forced to pay infrastructure costs without reaping the benefits of the data centers' utility bills; they could then pass the costs onto customers. These facilities are fundamentally incompatible with the county's environmental resources, infrastructure limits, and community goals. Data centers are water-intensive industrial operations, not benign technology hubs. Studies show that a single large facility can consume 1–5 million gallons of water per day for cooling — comparable to the daily use of tens of thousands of households. In a region already managing seasonal drought and aging water systems, this level of consumption is irresponsible and unsustainable. They are also high-pollution energy users. Each site draws immense power, typically from fossil-fuel sources, producing heat, noise, and air pollution through backup generators and upstream electricity generation. These emissions directly contradict Louisville's own climate and sustainability commitments. Unlike advanced manufacturing or research facilities, data centers create very few permanent local jobs and provide minimal community benefit relative to their environmental footprint. They displace land that could otherwise support housing, parks, or clean industry and add no real cultural or economic value to residents. For these reasons, I urge the Metro Government to reject any zoning amendments, conditional-use permits, or tax incentives related to data-center development. Jefferson County should focus on industries that strengthen local resilience, conserve resources, and align with our long-term sustainability plans — not those that threaten our water, air, and quality of life. While I believe data centers categorically do not belong in Jefferson County, if Metro chooses to advance such projects despite public opposition, the following minimum conditions must be imposed to safeguard residents and resources: 1. Comprehensive Environmental Impact Study: Independent third-party assessment of cumulative water use, energy load, and emissions before any zoning or permit approval. 2. Closed-Loop or Air-Based Cooling: Ban on evaporative cooling systems that draw from municipal or groundwater supplies. 3. Renewable Energy Mandate: 100% on-site or contracted renewable power with no fossil-based peaker or generator reliance except in declared emergencies. 4. No Tax Incentives: Prohibit public subsidies, rebates, or tax abatements that externalize costs to residents.

			5. Transparent Public Reporting: Quarterly disclosure of water use, energy consumption, and emissions subject to public audit. 6. A holistic regulatory approach to managing data center nuance will be better if it considers both data center raw size (square feet) and power density (watts per square foot, or watts per cabinet). For a point of comparison, non-AI data centers tend to have power usages between 10-20kW per cabinet. AI data centers use 40-100kW per cabinet. This order-of-magnitude increase in power density is what drives modern data centers to cause so many negative social and economic externalities. Data centers have successfully coexisted in our urban fabric for decades, and generated jobs and profits for Louisvillians, but only at those lower power densities.

LG&E Mill Creek is pushing back retirement of their coal units solely to provide the power necessary for the data center, in addition to rate hikes to cover the massive energy costs. A similar sized data center in Virginia according to my research is somewhere around 500 Mega Watts of power, which is approximately the total output of a single generating unit at Mill Creek, which currently supplies power to most of the city. That is absurd in my humble opinion, and can only cause higher rates when LG&E will need to continue expanding to meet their demands. In addition to this, I am concerned about pollution impacts from the data center. I am concerned about water usage, but that is not my area of expertise so I have no concrete opinions to give other than voicing my concern. I will, however, speak to the air impacts. The data center will have a massive amount of emergency generators to ensure there is no loss of data. Due to the nature of the power draw from the computers (spiking upon startup and not having consistent draw throughout their processing time), the electricity usage will be unpredictable and they will need to operate their emergency generators in non-emergency situations. This will cause an increase on combustion pollutants such as NOx, CO, CO2, and many other HAPs from combustion. This negative impact to air quality will only serve to hurt the people of the city more. I am aware this is not an issue for zoning, and is a matter for the Air Pollution Control District, I only want to mention the additional impacts and why there should be a size limit on data centers. Lastly, the number for my size limit suggestion is not a serious number. 			Also, I have heard that larger-scale data centers don't create a significant number of local jobs considering the impact their physical facilities have on a community's resources. My biggest concern is the environmental impact. I worry that centers may compete with local wildlife, nearby farmers, and natural water features, harming or stressing each of these. No matter where the utilities would come from, I believe there are better uses for what would go to these centers.

We must limit the purposes of data and place constraints on energy use of the centers. If new data centers cannot power themselves with renewable energy, they should not be built. Two questions should always be asked: "Why is this data storage needed?" and "How will the data storage be powered?"

3477	Chandramouli	40242	I have worked in data center environments for 30+ years including in regions such as Northern Virginia with some of the largest data centers in the country, and especially at the moment the claimed benefits to the community from data center construction does *not* materialize as claimed, so if the companies wanting these to be built will not share the costs involved (or worse, are demanding incentives to build them), then they should build them elsewhere; the data is clear that the benefits to the community will be minimal at best, and the potential harms such as higher costs, environmental impact, etc are significant if those externalities are not properly allocated to the companies looking to profit from them. Additionally LGE should absolutely *not* be allowed to build new fossil fuel plants to support these centers. This will just further increase the externalities that the entire community will pay and is an inexcusable proposed solution. All additional power needs from these data centers MUST be supported via new renewable energy sources, including better aligning consumer incentives for solar installations rather than continuing to allow LG&E to capture the benefits of those installs and thus disincentivize those installs. Companies building new data centers should also be required to shoulder a reasonable portion of any upfront costs for new power generation infrastructure.

Because of the large water consumption, people in neighboring homes have seen significant reduction in their water pressure and access to clean water. This is not okay. Additionally, I'm deeply concerned about electricity/power consumption and the impacts that will have in a time when we're facing climate change – we should not allow nor do we need more traditional forms of energy like coal or natural gas, to power these data centers. If we do, we will face more climate instability (e.g., extreme weather that destroys homes). If data centers are added, it can overload the grid, and impact communities' access to power. We should not prioritize business over our people. Customers will be on the hook for additional infrastructure put in place to power these data centers – we are already facing high rates and shouldn't be responsible for these costs. More discussion should be had with communities about data centers and their negative impacts to the community before any are considered to be built. Let's take our time and not rush into something that has proven destructive impacts to our planet and people. One idea could be to put at least a temporary moratorium on new permitted data center construction.
3486	Coulter	40228	I see data centers as extremely more harmful than beneficial to communities.
