Greetings, I write you as a distant cousin of U.S. Army General John Breckinridge Castleman; I write you for several purposes today:



1. To inform you that the Metro-Louisville Government, Jefferson County Properties, Jefferson County, and the former City of Louisville is not and has never been the owner of the cenotaph gravel marker otherwise known as "U.S. Army Brigadier General John Breckinridge Castleman Monument." You will see direct evidence from the Jefferson County Property Valuation Administration that they do not know the names of the owners of the monument or the land where it sits; but it is clearly not that of the previously named groups. Direct evidence of the owners will be included in this document.
2. Pursuant to <https://ag.ky.gov/government/opinions/Opinions%20New/OAG17-023.pdf>, The Kentucky Opinion of the Attorney General (OAG17-023) (see attachment) specifically enumerates that the Mayor of a combined city-county government has not authority over PROPERTY and that rests solely with the Metro-Counsel. This means that in 2016, Mayor Greg Fisher and his co-conspirators knowingly, wantonly, and willingly participated in a fraudulent conspiracy to defraud the Citizens of the Commonwealth of Kentucky, the United States of America, the University of Louisville, the University of Louisville Foundation, the students of the University of Louisville; but moreso the damage of disturbing the venerated object known as the "Confederate Monument" adjacent to the University of Louisville when Mayor Fischer and his conspirators, to include former University of Louisville President James Ramsey to embezzle the Confederate Monument to New Albany, Indiana, in interstate commerce; then again in interstate commerce back across the Ohio River where the Confederate Monument was exiled to Brandenburg, Kentucky where it now sits in peril at the bank of the Ohio River within the flood plain. Castleman Testimonial Fund. The statue represents Gen. Castleman in the most characteristic attitude possible, 'on' horseback. His favorite mare, Carolina, a famous, gaited, straight-bred Kentucky saddle horse, is traveling at the rate of twelve miles an hour under the saddle. As can be seen in the accompanying picture, Gen. Castleman is sitting his horse with perfect ease as though animal and rider are one. They are, in fact. In the statue, but the sculptor modeled true to life after three months' work, and it is said no "cir better reproduction in bronze ever has been made.

A contract for the pedestal, to be made of concrete and stone, will be let by the committee in charge, and in unveiling will take place - with appropriate ceremonies some time this spring. which caused dispute, because some Norwegians thought that others were going a bit too fast and would soon have no King Haakon left.

The greatest dispute has raged over the plan to deprive King Haakon of his right to veto changes in the Constitution. In July, 1910, this veto resolution was lost by only a few votes; and it was revived a year later. Being beaten in this matter, the Rads-Reds set out to deprive King Haakon of his merely ornamental right to open and close the Storting. Every monarch in Europe, without exception, has this right, but King Haakon must not have it.

"He is too young," said one Storting speaker. "He was born in 1872. The right to open and close the Storting should belong to the Prime Minister, who averages between 55 and 65."

And while Haakon was signing because he too is not between 55 and 65, pugnacious Gunnar Knudsen revived an old design of forbidding Haakon to decorate distinguished—and undistinguished—men.

This project arose because of another little plot against King Haakon's prerogatives as monarch. Other monarchs have a right to plant trees in their gardens; and even butchers and carpenters sometimes claim this right. But when Haakon planted some lime trees in the Slotsparken, within a catapult shot of his palace, democratic newspapers told him to take them away.

"Norway," they said, "is a free country; save us from opulent Caesarism." Thereupon expert gardener Herr Groener wrote an article to prove that Haakon was right; and grateful Haakon, with tears of joyful emotion at finding one champion, gave him the Order of the Lion. And this act incensed the jealous guardians of Northern liberty, who said that the King ought not to throw orders about. "We do not," they objected, "want Diocletians and Calligulas. This is the Twentieth century."

Hereafter there will be no more orders for authors from hapless King Haakon, and pugnacious Gunnar Knudsen has another project—"to regulate court ceremonies in a purely modern spirit."

Which means, of course, to regulate them out of existence.





It was a legal "dedication" of the land which was the permanent transfer of ownership when the land was put into a LEGAL TRUST, not just a temporary transfer for 121-years until an unlawful mayor wanted to violate state and federal laws.

CHAPTER 803.

AN ACT to amend the charter of the town of Hustonville, Lincoln county.

Be it enacted by the General Assembly of the Commonwealth of Kentucky:

§ 1. That the charter of the town of Hustonville be amended as follows: That the trustees of the said town of Hustonville, and their successors in office, be empowered, and are hereby authorized, to impose a license tax of not less than five hundred nor more than one thousand dollars upon tavern-keepers for the sale of spirituous, vinous and malt liquors, or for the sale of either of said liquors; but in no event shall they be empowered to license any one except tavern-keepers.

§ 2. This act shall take effect from and after its passage.

Approved April 16, 1890.

CHAPTER 804.

AN ACT to empower the trustees of Macedonia Church, near Hanson, in Hopkins county, to sell the church lot and building, and reinvest the proceeds in another house of worship.

Be it enacted by the General Assembly of the Commonwealth of Kentucky:

§ 1. That J. C. Wilson and A. W. Livingston, trustees of Macedonia Church, being a congregation of the United Baptist Church, near Hanson, Hopkins county, are hereby authorized and empowered to grant, bargain, sell and convey by deed, with covenant of general warranty, on such terms and for such sum as they may deem best, the church lot and buildings conveyed to them, and now held by them in trust. Said trustees will use the proceeds realized from said

sale in another house of worship at Hanson, or at some other place selected by them or the congregation for whom they act. The lot of ground referred to in this act is the same conveyed by Willis Barr and wife to J. C. Wilson, et cetera, by deed dated October twenty-fourth, one thousand eight-hundred and seventy-four, recorded in deed-book number thirty-five, page one hundred and thirty-three, in the clerk's office of the Hopkins County Court.

§ 2. This act shall take effect from its passage.

CHAPTER 805.

AN ACT to incorporate the Kentucky Woman's Confederate Monument Association.

Be it enacted by the General Assembly of the Commonwealth of Kentucky:

§ 1. That Susan P. Hepburn, Henrietta M. Duke, ^{Incorporation.} Lizzie H. Bruce, Virginia H. Semple, Julia D. Herndon and Sophie F. Sea, and their successors, be, and they are hereby, created a body-politic and corporate, to be known by the name and style of the Kentucky Woman's Confederate Monument Association, and by that name shall have perpetual succession and existence; may make and use a common seal, and break, alter or change the same at pleasure; and in their corporate capacity and name may contract and be contracted with, sue and be sued, plead and be impleaded; and shall have full power to hold by purchase, gift, grant, devise, or otherwise, any lands, tenements and hereditaments, all moneys, rents, goods, chattels, notes and closes in action, and any and all property and interest of every description which may be granted, given, or devised to or purchased by them, for the benefit of said association; and may sell, lease, grant, rent or otherwise dispose of the same, or any part thereof,

lars each, with the privilege to increase the same by a vote of the stockholders (those holding two-thirds of all the capital stock assenting thereto) at an annual or special meeting, to any sum not exceeding one hundred thousand dollars; and the corporators, or the majority of them named in the first section of this act, shall have power to open books for subscriptions at such times and places as they may deem expedient. The share-holders may elect a board of not less than nine directors, who may, at any time, be increased by a vote of the stockholders owning two-thirds in value of all the stock to any number not exceeding fifteen, the directors to serve until the next annual election, or until their successors shall be duly elected and qualified; and the directors so elected of said company, when it shall have been organized, may, and they are hereby, authorized and empowered to have and to exercise, in the name and in behalf of the company, all the rights and privileges which are hereby given; and should the capital stock at any time be increased, the stockholders, at the time of such increase, shall be entitled to a pro rata share of such increase upon the payment on the price fixed by the board of directors: *Provided*, Fifty per cent. of all the stock subscribed for shall be paid in before the bank commences business: *Provided, further*, The entire stock subscribed for shall be paid in full within twelve months after the date of the commencement of business by the bank: *And it is further provided*, That should the board of directors, at any time, increase the capital stock, as provided in section one, at least fifty per cent. of said additional stock shall be paid in at the time said subscription is made, and the remainder within twelve months from that date: *And it is further provided*, That in the event the stock is not paid in full at the expiration of twelve months from the date of commencement of business by the bank, or within twelve months from the date of subscription of increased stock,

as they may deem best for the association: *Provided, however*, That all moneys and property, of every description whatever, shall be used and appropriated for the sole purpose of erecting, in or near the city of Louisville, a monument to the memory of the soldiers in the army of the Confederate States of America.

§ 2. The officers of said association shall consist of a president, a vice-president, a secretary and a treasurer, who shall, together with an executive committee consisting of five members of the association, be elected annually on the first Monday in January in each year, and who shall manage and control the affairs of the corporation.

§ 3. This act shall take effect from and after its passage.

Approved April 18, 1890.

CHAPTER 806.

AN ACT to incorporate the Citizens' Vault and Trust Company, of Mount Sterling.

Be it enacted by the General Assembly of the Commonwealth of Kentucky:

§ 1. Caswell Prewitt, B. J. Peters, M. W. Anderson, A. A. Hazelrigg, H. Jones, Junior, W. T. Tyler, T. W. Priest, G. L. Kirkpatrick, M. S. Tyler, and all other persons who shall hereafter become stockholders in the company hereby incorporated, shall be a body-corporate, by the name of the Citizens' Vault and Trust Company, of Mount Sterling; and by that name have perpetual succession, and may contract and be contracted with, sue and be sued, and have all the powers hereinafter given; and may have and use a common seal, and alter the same at pleasure.

§ 2. The capital stock of said corporation shall consist of one thousand shares of the value of fifty dol-

The officers of said association shall consist of a president, a vice-president, a secretary and a treasurer, who shall, together with an executive committee consisting of five members of the association, be elected annually on the first Monday in January in each year, and who shall manage and control the affairs of the corporation.

§ 3. This act shall take effect from and after its passage.

Approved April 16, 1890.

On motion the following resolution was adopted.
Resolved by the Board of Public Works of the City of Louisville that a space 42 ft. in diameter be set aside in the center of 3rd St as shown on plans furnished by the Chief Engineer the space to be used by the Confederate Monument Ass'n to erect a monument and the Chief Engr was instructed to have the curb of the circle constructed as shown in plans and to send bill for same to Gen'l Jno. B. Castleman.

The Board adjourned until August 4th 1894 at 11 O'CLK a.m.

THE CONFEDERATE MONUMENT.

Board of Public Works Sets Aside a Space On Third Street.

The Committee Having In Charge All Preliminary Arrangements Will Report Shortly.

The ladies of the Confederate Monument Association scored a victory yesterday when the Board of Public Works approved the plans and specifications for the monument's site. A space forty-two feet in diameter has been set aside at the end of Third Street, and where it intersects Sixth Avenue. This will be dedicated to the use of the association as the site for the Confederate monument. The space will be curbed and graded ready for the laying of the corner-stone October 16.

The President of the association, Mrs. Susan Hepburn, appointed a committee late last week to make all preliminary arrangements for the laying of the corner-stone. The committee, consisting of Mayor Tyler, ex-Mayor Jacob, Col. Castleman, Capt. Leathers and others, will be ready to hand in its report to the President of the association shortly. The women of the association have \$10,000 in the treasury, which they propose to devote to a monument. They believe that in the present condition of things this sum is equivalent to at least half as much again, and that a monument and site worth \$15,000 can be dedicated to the Confederate dead.

The association is to be congratulated upon the selection of the site they have secured. There is probably no better one any place in the city. The site is on the way to Jacob Park, which is one of the most frequented in the city. It is a favorite drive not only with citizens, but with strangers who have a few hours to spend in Louisville. The monument will be one of the points of interest in the city.

4 August 1894-This *Louisville Courier-Journal* "The Confederate Monument" article twice uses the legal word "dedicated" as well as "set aside land" by the Board of Public Works. In research from the 1890s Louisville Ordinances, listed in another Judicial Notice, you will see that the Board of Public Works had legal authority and a responsibility for the "dedication" of land. They would not have "dedicated" the land just for the women to give it back.

This article caused Callan many hundreds of hours of research as it was clear that a meeting took place on 3 August 1894. In this Judicial Notice, you will see the meeting minutes. None of the defendants of this instant case or the case in the spring of 2016 had followed this newspaper article to the original Board of Public Works meeting minutes.

Judge Judith McDonald-Burkman failed in her duties to for the plaintiffs and defendants to do their due diligence and this Judicial Notice proves that she and all of those lawyers were incredibly lazy and irresponsible. No one pursued the absolute legal documents you will read in these Judicial Notices.

JEFFERSON COUNTY DEED ROOM

The following deed information is the legal authority that EVERYONE MUST RESPECT AND ABIDE BY NO MATTER THEIR POLITICAL / HISTORICAL VIEWS. The "Parcel ID" from the Property Value

The Property Valuation Administration (PVA) does not have any name as "property owner," while the research is easy enough to conduct in the deed room.
