## To Whom It May Concern:

I have been working in the field of addictions in Louisville for over fifteen years and have witnessed firsthand a high recidivism rate among patients at the inpatient and residential facilities in large part due to a lack of safe, sober and supportive environments in our community. Addiction is a chronic disease and must be treated with a long-term commitment of wraparound services beyond hospitalization and rehab. Addiction affects more than physical and mental health—it impacts legal status, finances, employment, housing and social relationships. Recovery Housing, like Driven Purpose addresses these issues with recovery support services and housing.

As a an administrator at a local recovery facility for men I hear from addicted individuals, their families, treatment providers and community leaders that there is not enough capacity to meet the need for recovery housing in the region, especially for women.

As a member of the Sober Housing Taskforce I field calls from our community from recovery house residents and referring agencies about fraudulent or unethical recovery housing operators and have never received a negative call from them about Amanda Scott's organization, Driven Purpose. On the contrary, Amanda Scott has been active in the Sober Housing Taskforce, the Recovery Housing Coalition, and has held neighborhood meetings to address concerns.

I am also an advocate of the National Alliance for Recovery Residences and have organized a coalition of local owners and operators of recovery houses to raise awareness of best practices and lend support for implementing NARR standards in our community. Driven Purpose would be considered a Level II Recovery House and her programming and operations are standard for the level of support she offers her residents (please see attached document). Level I, II, and III's do not offer treatment onsite and there are no national standards dictating licensed clinical treatment providers own or operate these types of recovery houses.

Our community should embrace recovery housing as an effective solution to the opioid epidemic. Studies have shown that relapse rates can be cut in half when individuals have access to recovery support services within the first year after treatment for Substance Use Disorder. Many recovery house operators are filling the gap that exists between treatment and independent living in long-term recovery and they should be given support and guidance.
