>> YOU HAVE 24 PRESENT AND QUORUM.

>> COLLEAGUES, DAILY WE CONTINUE TO SEE OUR FRIENDS AND FAMILY MEMBERS AND NEIGHBORS BEING DIAGNOSED WITH COVID, EVEN WITH THE VACCINE, WE HAVE TO STAY VIGILANT. AS OF THIS MORNING, 856 LOUISVILLIANS HAVE DIED AND OTHERS HAVE BEEN DIAGNOSED WITH COVID-19.

WE REMAIN IN THE CRITICAL STAGE OF THIS PANDEMIC.

AT THIS TIME I LIKE TO RECOGNIZE AN INDIVIDUAL WHO WE LOST TO COVID.

MANY OF YOU KNEW COACH SCROGGIN.

HE DIED YESTERDAY DUE TO COMPLICATIONS FROM COVID.

AT THIS TIME I LIKE TO RECOGNIZE COUNCILWOMAN JESSICA GREEN.

IT IS MY HONOR TO RECOGNIZE THE LEGACY OF COACH SCROGGIN, A LARGER THAN LIFE MAN WHO MENTORED HUNDREDS IF NOT THOUSANDS OF YOUNG PEOPLE AS A COACH AND EDUCATOR.

HE POSTED A 101-33 RECORD IN TEN SEASONS REACHING SEVEN CLASS 3A CHAMPIONSHIP GAMES AND WINNING FIVE TITLES.

2007, 2008, 2010, 2011 AND 2012.

AS A GRADUATE MYSELF OF THE LOUISVILLE CENTRAL HIGH SCHOOL, I WAS SO EXCITED TO SEE HIM COACH MY OWN LITTLE BROTHERS TO CHAMPIONSHIP WINS DURING THEIR TIME ON CENTRAL'S FOOTBALL TEAM. HE WAS THE FIRST AFRICAN-AMERICAN HEAD COACH TO WIN A STATE FOOTBALL CHAMPIONSHIP IN KENTUCKY.

A GRADUATE OF FAIR VIEW HIGH SCHOOL, HE WAS A MEMBER OF THE CHAMPIONSHIP 1990 BASKETBALL TEAM.

AFTER PLAYING LINEBACKER AT THE UNIVERSITY OF LOUISVILLE, THE COACH GOT HIS START IN COACHING AT DALE HIGH SCHOOL.

HE WAS ASSISTANT FOR FOUR SEASONS BEFORE BEING NAMED HEAD COACH AND COMPILED A 22-30 RECORD OVER FIVE SEASONS.

MOST RECENTLY HE COACHED THE LAST FOUR YEARS, COACHING HIS SON JAMES AND A SENIOR CURRENTLY.

WHILE HE DEVOTED HIS LIFE TO COACHING YOUNG PEOPLE IN THE CITY, HIS GREATEST JOB WAS AS A FATHER.

IN ADDITION TO JADEN, COACH SCROGGINS LEAVES BEHIND A TWIN STAR AND CHILDREN.

HE SERVED AS A COACH BUT HE WAS GOOD TO ALL KID.

MY YOUNGEST BROTHER TODD WAS CENTRAL HIGH SCHOOL WHO WAS MENTALLY HANDICAPPED AND COULD NOT SPEAK YET COACHED AND MADE ROOM FOR TODD.

TODD LOVED HIM AND HIS SMILE WOULD LIGHT UP THE ROOM WHEN HE SAW THE COACH.

RECENTLY IN THE SUMMER OF 2020, COACH FOUNDED MINORITY COACHES OF KENTUCKY.

IN ADDITION TO CHILDREN A HOST OF FAMILY MEMBERS HE ALSO MET THE LOVE OF HIS LIFE WHO WAS A LONG-TERM EDUCATOR AND CENTRAL HIGH SCHOOL.

HE WAS RECENTLY NAMED PRINCIPAL OF PRP HIGH SCHOOL.

THERE'S A FAMILY THAT FEELS THE LOSS OF THEIR FOURTH, BROTHER
SON.

THERE'S THOSE THAT MOURN THE LOSS OF COACH, ROLE MODEL, ADVOCATE
AND FRIEND.

THIS IS A REAL THREAT IN OUR COMMUNITY.

THIS VIRUS COMES TO KILL AND DESTROY.

PLEASE CONTINUE TO PROTECT YOURSELF ACCORDINGLY.

THE BIG DOG AS HE WAS AFFECTIONATELY KNOWN HAD A TEAM HUDDLE
BEFORE THE GAME.

MR. JOSH KUZLY HAS GIVEN ME INFORMATION ABOUT A LIFE THREATENING
DISEASE.

SEVERAL OF OUR CITIZENS MAY BE SUFFERING THE CITIZENS AND COULD

BE UNAWARE OF THE NAME OF THE DISEASE OR HAVE BEEN MISDIAGNOSED AS MR. TUZLY WAS FOR THE LAST FIVE YEARS.

THE CLINIC ESTIMATES 4 PERCENT OF THE POPULATION SUFFER FROM THIS AND MILLIONS MORE GO UNDETECTED DUE TO THE SIMILARITIES OF SYMPTOMS AMONG OTHER KNOWN DIGESTIVE DISEASES SUCH AS DIVE PIETZ, SQUARE DERMA, HYPOTHYROIDISM, PARKINSON'S DISEASE, MULTIPLE SCLEROSIS AND EATING DISORDERS AND MORE.

TO BRING AWARENESS TO THIS DISEASE, THIS VALENTINE'S DAY IS WEAR GREEN FOR AWARENESS.

TODAY I'M HERE BECAUSE OF IN TUZLY'S DESIRE TO SPREAD AWARENESS TO OTHER CITIZENS SO THEY DON'T HAVE TO SUFFER UNDIAGNOSED AS MR. TUZLY HAS.

WITH THAT, I PRESENT THIS PROCLAMATION TO IN TUZLY AND ASK FOR YOUR SUPPORT TO SPREAD THE WORD.

THE PROCLAMATION READS, TO ALL WHOM THESE LETTERS SHALL COME GREETINGS, KNOW YEE THAT THE METRO COUNCIL HERE BY CLAIMS FEBRUARY 14TH AS WEAR GREEN FOR GASTROPARESIS DAY.

THEY EXPERIENCE SLOWED MOBILITY IN ONE STOMACH AND CAUSES IT FROM EMPTYING PROPERLY AND WHEREAS THE CAUSE OR CAUSES OF GASTROPARESIS ARE NOT KNOWN AND COULD BE CONSIDERED IDIOPATHIC. IT COULD BE CAUSED BY DIABETES OR SIDE EFFECTS OF SURGERY.

WHEREAS GASTROPARESIS CAN LEAD TO DISABLING CONDITIONS WHICH COULD INCLUDE SEVERE NAUSEA, MOATING, PAIN AND FULLNESS AFTER EATING SMALL AMOUNTS, ACID REFLUX AND CHANGES IN BLOOD SUGAR

I'M MEMBER OF RENEWABLE ALLIANCE OF LOUISVILLE, A GROUP THAT IS
WORKING TO ACHIEVE 100 PERCENT RENEWABLE ENERGY FOR ALL OF
JEFFERSON COUNTY.

LAST YEAR THIS COUNCIL MADE A DECISION TO JOIN 160 OTHER CITIES
IN THE U.S. BY PASSING THAT RESOLUTION.

I ANT TO IT THANK YOU, NOT ONLY FOR THAT BUT FOR ALL OF THE WORK

THAT YOU DO.

EACH OF YOU WERE SENT A BOOKLET CALLED LOUISVILLE'S ENERGY FUTURE.

IT LIGHTS THE WAY TOWARD THE FIRST OF THREE GOALS IN THE RESOLUTION.

100 PERCENT CLEAN RENEWABLE ENERGY FOR METRO GOVERNMENT BY 2030.

ONE OF THOSE WAYS IS SWITCHING TO LED STREETLIGHTS.

THE REDUCED ENERGY USAGE AND COST AND ALSO PROVIDE THE BETTER QUALITY OF LIFE.

IN 2019, METRO LOUISVILLE USED ELECTRICITY THAT IS EQUIVALENT USED IN 9,352 JEFFERSON COUNTY HOMES.

SWITCHING TO LED STREETLIGHTS WOULD REDUCE THAT BY 20 PERCENT.

IT WILL ALSO SAVE THE CITY ROUGHLY 1 1/2 MILLION DOLLARS A YEAR.

METRO GOVERNMENT HAS ADOPTED A PROCESS FOR LED TO FOLLOW TO REPLACE SOME OF THE MOST ABUNDANTLY USED STREETLIGHT TYPES.

THE HIGHEST STREETLIGHT BOTH IN QUANTITY AND KILOWAT HOURS USED, WOULD REDUCE KILOWAT HOURS 70 PERCENT BY PER LIGHT.

USING THE CURRENT RATE SCHEDULE IT WOULD ALSO SAVE 7.30 DOLLARS PERCENT PER LIGHT PER MONTH.

THESE ARE BEING INSTALLED IN SOME NEIGHBORHOODS.

OTHER ADVANTAGES OF LEDS ARE THEY LAST LONGER, THEY'RE BRIGHTER AND THEY HAVE A BETTER COLOR RENDERING INDEX, WHICH MEANS WHATEVER THE LED LIGHT SHINES ON, THE SURFACE WILL MORE CLOSELY RESEMBLE THE TRUE COLOR ARE THAN THE STREETLIGHTS CURRENTLY

USED.

IN CLOSING, I WANT TO SAY AGAIN, STREETLIGHTS ARE NOT THE ONLY RECOMMENDATIONS IN THE LOUISVILLE ENERGY FUTURE BOOKLET THAT SAVE ENERGY AND COSTS.

SOLAR PANELS AND ENERGY CONSERVATION OR OTHERS.

IF YOU HAVEN'T ALREADY, I ENCOURAGE YOU TO BECOME FAMILIAR WITH AND SUPPORT THESE EFFORTS WHEN THE TIME COMES FOR THEIR IMPLEMENTATION.

I'M FALLING IN BECAUSE I WANT TO VOICE MY OPINION REGARDING THE
RACIAL EQUITY ORDINANCE PROPOSED BY METRO COUNCILPERSON TISHA
DORSEY.

I THINK IT IS AN EXCELLENT PROPOSAL, I THINK IT WOULD SOLVE A
LOT OF PROBLEMS THAT HAVE ACCUMULATE OVER THE LAST CENTURY.
CONSIDERING THE -- CONSIDERING THE RELATIONSHIP THAT THE METRO
COUNCIL OR THE FORMER CITY OF LOUISVILLE HAS HAD WITH THE BLACK

COMMUNITY, I THINK THIS IS A STEP FORWARD IN TRYING TO GET DEPARTMENT HEADS TO THINK OF WAYS TO BALANCE THE SCALE BASED ON INEQUITIES THAT HAVE TAKEN PLACE OVER THE PAST 100 YEARS.

I REALLY HAVE A PROBLEM WITH THE -- I HAVE A PROBLEM WITH DANGEROUS DOGS.

I THINK WE NEED TO REVIEW THE DANGEROUS DOG LAW.

I LIVE NEAR SHAUNY PARK.

RECENTLY THERE WAS AN INCIDENT WHERE A GENTLEMAN WAS JOGGING THROUGH THE PARK AND WAS NEARLY KILLED BY THREE PIT BULLS.

I LOOK FORWARD TO WORKING WITH THE -- WITH THE NEW COUNCIL PEOPLE.

I THINK THAT THE COUNCIL IS MOVING IN THE RIGHT DIRECTION.

FIRST ASK FOR THE RACIAL, BECAUSE BLACK PEOPLE HAVE TO LIVE SOMEWHERE.

THANK YOU, APPRECIATE YOUR SUPPORT.

>> THANK YOU.

COUNCILMAN KRAMER.

>> I WAS ON THIS ORDINANCE ORIGINALLY AS A CO-SPONSOR.

IN THE CONVERSATIONS THAT THOSE OF US SPONSORING THIS HAD HAD, I

THOUGHT CONSENTED THAT -- THAT GIVEN THE -- THE FACT THAT THE 26 MILLION DOLLARS WAS -- WAS MONEY THAT CAME BACK INTO A PREVIOUS BUDGET, IT MADE SENSE TO FIRST DO THAT -- TO GET THAT MONEY TO DO THE THINGS THAT WERE EXPECTED FOR THE BUDGET, ESPECIALLY THE GOLF ONE.

THE EXPECTATION OF THE ORDINANCE, IT WAS IN -- IN EXCESS IT WOULD GO INTO DEFERRED MAINTENANCE AND THAT WAS OVERLOOKED. PUTTING THAT MONEY BACK MAKES PERFECT SENSE.

THIS IS 2.7 MILLION HAS BEEN TAKEN FROM THE PENSION RESERVE FUNDS SPECIFICALLY BECAUSE WE WEREN'T SURE EXACTLY HOW THE FEDERAL GOVERNMENT MIGHT STEP IN AND HELP AS FAR AS HOUSING. WE'VE BEEN GRATEFUL ABOUT THAT AND IT WORKED OUT.

AND WE AGREED THAT PUTTING THE 2.7 MILLION BACK THIS MAKES SENSE.

AND I BELIEVE WE HAD CONSENSUS AROUND THE IDEA THAT THIS IS ONE-TIME REVENUE THAT THIS IS IN THE YEAR OVER YEAR.

IT MADE SENSE TO REDUCE OUR -- OUR DEBT.

I OFFER THIS TONIGHT BY WAY OF SAYING THAT OVER THE WEEK, HAVING A CHANCE TO LOOK AT WHAT THE ORDINANCE DOES AND WHAT IS TRUE SO MANY TIMES FOR THOSE ON COUNCIL, YOU HAVE ORDINANCE THAT YOU THINK DOES REALLY REALLY GOOD THINGS AND THEN YOU FIND OUT IT DOES GOOD THINGS.

I DON'T WANT TO VOTE AGAINST SOMETHING THAT HAS GOOD THINGS JUST BECAUSE I DON'T THINK IT DOES REALLY REALLY GOOD THINGS.

BESIDE MY NO VOTE, I'LL BE VOTING YES AND ENCOURAGE MY COLLEAGUES TO DO THE SAME.

I THINK THIS MOVES US IN THE RIGHT DIRECTION.

THIS IS FAR ENOUGH.

I THINK IT MOVES US IN THE RIGHT DIRECTION.

AGAIN, I ASK MY COLLEAGUES IF -- FOR A YES VOTE.

>> SIMILAR TO THE FINAL THOUGHTS THERE, I -- I DIDN'T KNOW IN COMMITTEE -- BUT BECAUSE I PREFERRED THE ORIGINAL MOTION.

THAT'S WHAT IT WAS.

WITH THAT SAID, THIS IS A VERY GOOD BILL AND NO COMPLIMENT COUNCILMAN FOWLER AND FOR THE CONTINUED ADVOCACY OF WHAT IS

REALLY WITH HER LEADERSHIP HAS BECOME A SHINING EXAMPLE OF HOW WE CAN IMPROVE CITY SERVICES AND IMPROVE THE BUDGET WITHOUT -- JUST THROUGH IMPROVING HOW WE MANAGE THEM AND IMPROVING POLICY.

OVERALL, I'LL VOTE YES TODAY.

AGAIN, JUST BECAUSE I MAY BE -- IT MAY BE A DIFFERENT LINE HERE.

AND SHANKLIN?

>> I WAS JUST WONDERING WOULD SHAUNY GOLF COURSE BE IN THIS FUNDING?

I HAVE BEEN AT THE GOLF COURSE AND THIS IS IN REALLY BAD SHAPE. I LIKE TO SEE THAT MONEY GO TO [INDISCERNIBLE] OF SHAUNY GOLF COURSE.

SO WOULD SOME GO TOWARDS THE MAINTENANCE THERE?

OR ALL GOLF COURSE.

>> COUNCILMAN FOWLER, COULD YOU ADDRESS THAT?

>> YES, THANK YOU MR. PRESIDENT.

WE NEED A BETTER PRODUCT AND JUSTIFY THAT INCREASE COST.

I AGREE WITH DR. SHANKLIN 100 PERCENT.

THERE'S A LOT OF WORK THAT NEEDS TO OCCUR.

SO AGAIN, THANK YOU TO -- TO COUNCILWOMAN FOWLER AND I'LL BE SUPPORTING THIS.

>> MR. PRESIDENT, COULD I JUST INTERJECT?

>> YES.

>> THE -- WE'RE LIKE SIX MILLION DOLLARS OF DEFERRED MAINTENANCE IN THE GOLF SYSTEM.

WE'RE NOT GOING TO BE ABLE TO ADDRESS EVERYTHING IN ONE YEAR.

IT WILL TAKE US MULTIPLE YEARS TO EVEN MAKE A DENT.

SO I HOPE EVERYBODY UNDERSTANDS THAT.

IF THEY PLAY GOLF, THEY'RE PUBLIC COURSES.

THAT'S WHAT IS GOING TO MAKE A DIFFERENCE.

THANK YOU.

>> THANK YOU, COUNCILWOMAN.

ANY FURTHER DISCUSSION?

ACKERSON?

>> HEY, MR. PRESIDENT, I RECOGNIZE AS WE ARE AS FOWLER POINTED OUT WE'RE SIX MILLION IN DEFERRED MAINTENANCE ON GOLF.

LET'S NOT LOSE SIGHT OF THE FACT THAT WE'RE CLOSE TO 65 TO 70 MILLION DOLLARS OF DEFERRED MAINTENANCE ON SIDEWALKS AND 65 TO 70 MILLION ON DEFERRED MAINTENANCE ON SIDEWALKS AND WE STILL HAVE A TREMENDOUS DEFERRED MAINTENANCE ON ROADS, EVEN THOUGH WE'VE BEEN ADDRESSING IT, WE'VE BEEN BORROWING MONEY FOR IT BUT HELL DRIVING THROUGH THE SNOW IN THE LAST COUPLE OF DAYS, THE POTHOLES ARE HORRENDOUS OUT THERE.

THE DEFERRED ROAD MAINTENANCE IS STILL PROBABLY 20, 30 MILLION DOLLARS IN ROAD MAINTENANCE.

6 MILLION DOLLARS IN DEFERRED MAINTENANCE COMPARED TO THE HUNDREDS OF MILLIONS OF DEFERRED MAINTENANCE ON BUILDINGS.

YOU MAY RECALL BUILDING MAINTENANCE TO SIDEWALK MAINTENANCE TO STREET PAVING MAINTENANCE, WE PAY TAXES FOR THIS.

WE THROW OUT OUR ALIGNMENT.

THAT COST MONEY.

AND POOR PEOPLE DON'T HAVE THAT MONEY.

WHEN WE DON'T HAVE PROPER SIDEWALKS FOR DISABLED PEOPLE TO GET AROUND AND WE HAVE, YOU KNOW, PUBLIC INFRASTRUCTURE FALLING APART, THAT DEFERRED MAINTENANCE MATTERS ALSO.

SO THIS IS IMPORTANT BUT WE CAN'T LOSE SIGHT OF HOW BIG THIS

HOLE IS ELSEWHERE THAT YOU KNOW, LIKE ANYTHING ELSE, WE GOT TO MOVE MONEY AROUND.

I WANT TO POINT THAT OUT TO EVERYBODY.

I'LL BE A YES VOTE TONIGHT BUT AND MY HOPE IS WE GET GOLF COURSES TO THE POINT WHERE THEY START GIVING MONEY BACK TO THE COFFERS VERSUS BEING A NET SUM ZERO.

COUNCILMAN FOX?

>> THANK YOU, MR. PRESIDENT.

I DISAGREE I DON'T BELIEVE IT SHOULD BE INCOME GENERATOR.

THE SWING SETS NOR ARE THE WALKING PATHS OR POOLS.

THESE ARE AMENITIES WE OFFER TO OUR CITIZENS FOR THE USE AND THE BETTERMENT OF THE OVERALL COMMUNITY.

SO MY GOAL IN WORKING WITH -- WITH -- WITH COUNCILWOMAN FOWLER AND PEDEN AND KRAMER AND WE SAT DOWN TOGETHER ON THIS.

THESE AMENITIES THAT MAKE THE COMMUNITY BETTER AND THAT'S WHAT GOVERNMENT IS SUPPOSED TO DO.

I REALLY HOPE THAT WE SHOULD LOOKING TO GOLF OR ANY OF THOSE AMENITIES TO SUPPLANT OUR BUDGET.

I WOULD LIKE TO SEE THINGS PAY FOR THEMSELVES AND PUT MONEY BACK

IN THE COFFERS.

I DISAGREE ON GOLF AND REVENUE.

PLAY YARDS ARE DIFFERENT.

WE CAN'T CHARGE THEM.

BUT GOLF COURSES, COSTS A LOT FOR GOLF THAN A LOT OF AMENITIES THAT WE DO, IT HAS MOWING AND FERTILIZER AND STAFF AND ALSO SOME PEOPLE SWING A STICK AND HIT A BALL WHICH IS GREAT.

A TENNIS COURSE DOESN'T HAVE A LOT OF MAINTENANCE.

GOLF COURSE IS HUGE.

WHEN I HEAR WE'RE SIX MILLION IN THE RED INK ON GOLF COURSES, THAT'S A DROP IN THE BUCKET.

TO GET ON THE TEN-YEAR PLAN TO CATCH THINGS UP TO A REASONABLE PAR LEVEL.

SO IT IS ALL ABOUT WE AS A CITY MAKING CHOICES.
