Essential Elements

- Violence prevention is rooted in a Public Health Approach
- Investments made now are long term investments that must be sustained over time
- Part of a broad strategy that acknowledges policing alone does not make a city safer
- Complex problems require complex and adaptive solutions



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OSHN by the numbers

- 50 citizens have become One Love Louisville Ambassadors since March 2017
 - 89% reported increase in knowledge of violence prevention
 - 51% increase in likelihood to act towards reducing violence
- We have engaged 667 youth since December 2016
- 25 community garden participants
- Over 400 contacts via presentations and trainings re: violence prevention and community engagement
- \$131,600 in External Agency Funds distributed since February to impact Zones of Hope neighborhoods
- REImage participants demonstrate less than 2% recidivism rate

Big Brothers Big Sisters: Allan Houston Mentoring Initiative

- 20 participants ages 12 to 17 enrolled
- Anticipated end of program outcomes:
 - 90% of participants have high educational expectations
 - 100% improvement in attitudes related to risk factors
 - 70% improvement in the area of truancy
 - 100% avoided involvement in juvenile justice



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

YMCA Safe Place: Street Outreach

- 162 youth reached and referred to supportive services: California, Russell, Parkland, Shawnee
- Participated in Parkhill resource fair touching over 100 residents
- Supported a Peace Walk at Western Middle School
- Participated in “Black Girl Magic” event at Shawnee Library, about inspiring and influential black women

Family & Children's Place



Family & Children's Place: PAL Coalition

- 19 youth participants
- Increased knowledge and skills related to health, career readiness, academic achievement, community engagement, relationships, and planning for success
- Peer mentoring process:
 - *“I want to help younger kids succeed in school.”*
 - *“I hope to help someone prosper in not only some areas I struggled, but to be better than me.”*
 - *“To change children’s mindset for the better, to brighten their future”*



Cure Violence - Louisville

- Cure Violence is an evidence based and proven violence reduction strategy
- Uses 3 key elements:
 - Interrupting conflicts
 - Treating individuals at highest risk
 - Changing community norms
- Model has been implemented in 50 cities globally
- Independently evaluated, produces reductions in violence between 40% and 70% at targeted sites



Cure Violence - Louisville

- Pre-Implementation Site Visit occurred in February to analyze current situation and make recommendations
 - Report Findings:
 - Louisville has the capacity and will for successful implementation
 - Louisville tracks the appropriate data to implement
 - Louisville has other systems in place to serve as implementation partners (e.g., Pivot to Peace)
 - Louisville has adequate support services in place to treat the highest risk (e.g., REImage)



FY 18 Proposed Org Chart




