REQUESTS

- **Change in zoning** from R-4 Single Family Residential and OR-1 Office Residential to R-6 Multi-Family Residential and OR-1 Office Residential
- **Variance** from LDC Table 5.3.1 to allow a building height of 38' to exceed the maximum of 35' (19-VARIANCE-0072)
- **Alternative Plan for Connectivity**
- **Detailed District Development Plan** with Binding Elements

CASE SUMMARY/BACKGROUND

The subject site is located near the intersection of Blue Lick Road and South Park Road and consists of three contiguous parcels. One parcel is developed with a single-family residence while the other two are undeveloped. The applicant proposes to rezone the R-4 portion of the site to R-6, leaving the OR-1 portion as it is, in order to construct a new 312 unit multi-family development.

Multi-family and commercial uses are located at the intersection of Blue Lick Road and South Park Road. An existing quarry is located across South Park Road. Fishpool Creek runs through an adjacent parcel to the east of the site.

The site plan proposed by the applicant depicts gated access to the development with no connectivity to Blue Lick Road, South Park Road, or Delee Way.

STAFF FINDING

Staff finds that the rezoning proposal generally meets the guidelines of the Comprehensive Plan. The proposed development plan does not meet the requirements of the Land Development Code. Staff finds that the requested variance is adequately justified and meets the standard of review.

TECHNICAL REVIEW

Plan 2040

Land Development Code (Louisville Metro)

MSD and Transportation Planning have provided preliminary approval of the proposal. The site plan does not provide connectivity to any roadway. The applicant has proposed an alternative plan for connectivity in accordance with 5.9.2.A.1.a.i for legislative consideration. The alternative plan for connectivity is to provide no connectivity to any roadway.

INTERESTED PARTY COMMENTS

Three interested party emails were received in opposition to the request. Several neighbors spoke in opposition at the Land Development and Transportation Committee meeting.

STANDARD OF REVIEW FOR REZONING

Criteria for granting the proposed form district change/rezoning: KRS Chapter 100.213

1. The proposed form district/rezoning change complies with the applicable guidelines and policies Plan 2040; OR
2. The existing form district/zoning classification is inappropriate and the proposed classification is appropriate; OR
3. There have been major changes of an economic, physical, or social nature within the area involved which were not anticipated in Plan 2040 which have substantially altered the basic character of the area.

STAFF ANALYSIS FOR CHANGE IN ZONING

The site is located in the Neighborhood Form District

The Neighborhood Form is characterized by predominantly residential uses that vary from low to high density and that blend compatibly into the existing landscape and neighborhood areas. High-density uses will be limited in scope to minor or major arterials and to areas that have limited impact on the low to moderate density residential areas.

The Neighborhood Form will contain diverse housing types in order to provide housing choice for differing ages, incomes and abilities. New neighborhoods are encouraged to incorporate these different housing types within a neighborhood as long as the different types are designed to be compatible with nearby land uses. These types may include, but not be limited to, large lot single family developments with cul-de-sacs, traditional neighborhoods with short blocks or walkways in the middle of long blocks to connect with other streets, villages and zero-lot line neighborhoods with open space, and high density multi-family housing.

The Neighborhood Form may contain open space and, at appropriate locations, civic uses and neighborhood centers with a mixture of uses such as offices, retail shops, restaurants and services. These neighborhood centers should be at a scale that is appropriate for nearby neighborhoods. The Neighborhood Form should provide for accessibility and connectivity between adjacent uses and neighborhoods by automobile, pedestrian, bicycle and transit.

Neighborhood streets may be either curvilinear, rectilinear or in a grid pattern and should be designed to support physical activity for all users and invite human interaction. Streets are connected and easily accessible to each other, using design elements such as short blocks or bike/walkways in the middle of long blocks to connect with other streets. Examples of design elements that encourage this interaction include narrow street widths, street trees, sidewalks, shaded seating/gathering areas and bus stops. Placement of utilities should permit the planting of shade trees along both sides of the streets.

Following is staff's analysis of the proposed rezoning against the Goals, Objectives and Policies of Plan 2040.

The proposed R-6 zoning district would provide an appropriate transition between the commercial development at the intersection and the lower-intensity residential development to the east and to the north of the intersection. The lack of connectivity is problematic. The applicant has proposed an alternative plan for connectivity which provides no connectivity to any roadway. The site is adjacent to an existing activity center, and is within ½ mile of Preston Highway, a major commercial and transit corridor.

The proposed zoning district is generally in compliance with the plan elements of Plan 2040, and with the CHASE principles in the Comprehensive Plan.

All other agency comments should be addressed to demonstrate compliance with the remaining Goals, Objectives and Policies of Plan 2040.

A checklist is attached to the end of this staff report with a more detailed analysis. The Louisville Metro Planning Commission is charged with making a recommendation to the Louisville Metro Council regarding the appropriateness of this zoning map amendment. The Louisville Metro Council has zoning authority over the property in question.

STANDARD OF REVIEW AND STAFF ANALYSIS FOR VARIANCE FROM TABLE 5.3.1

- (a) The requested variance will not adversely affect the public health, safety or welfare.

STAFF: The requested variance will not adversely affect public health, safety or welfare as the increase in building height will not affect sight lines or provide any other public health, safety or welfare issues.

- (b) The requested variance will not alter the essential character of the general vicinity.

STAFF: The requested variance will not alter the essential character of the general vicinity as the variance requested is relatively small and unlikely to be apparent to the public.

- (c) The requested variance will not cause a hazard or nuisance to the public.

STAFF: The requested variance will not cause a hazard or nuisance to the public as the increase in height is relatively small and unlikely to be visible to the public.

- (d) The requested variance will not allow an unreasonable circumvention of the zoning regulations.

STAFF: The requested variance will not allow an unreasonable circumvention of zoning regulations as the requested variance is relatively small and is needed to provide an extra foot of interior height for each floor to provide higher ceilings.

ADDITIONAL CONSIDERATIONS:

1. The requested variance arises from special circumstances which do not generally apply to land in the general vicinity or the same zone.

STAFF: The requested variance does not arise from special circumstances which do not generally apply to land in the general vicinity or the same zone because the variance is needed for a design choice on the part of the developer and not due to unique characteristics of the lot.

2. The strict application of the provisions of the regulation would deprive the applicant of the reasonable use of the land or create an unnecessary hardship on the applicant.

STAFF: The strict application of the provisions of the regulation would not deprive the applicant of the reasonable use of the land or create an unnecessary hardship on the applicant because the building height is a design choice to improve the look of the interior rooms and the buildings could be shorter with more standard ceiling heights without depriving the applicant of the use of the land or creating an unnecessary hardship.

3. The circumstances not are the result of actions of the applicant taken subsequent to the adoption of the zoning regulation from which relief is sought.

STAFF: The circumstances not are the result of actions of the applicant taken subsequent to the adoption of the zoning regulation from which relief is sought as no construction has yet taken place and the variance is being sought at this time.

STANDARD OF REVIEW AND STAFF ANALYSIS FOR DDDP

- (a) The conservation of natural resources on the property proposed for development, including: trees and other living vegetation, steep slopes, water courses, flood plains, soils, air quality, scenic views, and historic sites;

STAFF: No steep slopes, water courses, flood plains, soils, air quality, scenic views or historic sites are evident on the subject site. The tree canopy is not proposed to be preserved but tree canopy requirements will be met on the site.

- (b) The provisions for safe and efficient vehicular and pedestrian transportation both within the development and the community;

STAFF: Metro Public Works has approved the preliminary development plan. However, provisions for safe and efficient vehicular and pedestrian transportation have not been provided, as there is no connectivity proposed between the development and the surrounding community.

- (c) The provision of sufficient open space (scenic and recreational) to meet the needs of the proposed development;

STAFF: Sufficient open space as required by the Land Development Code is being provided to meet the needs of the proposed development.

- (d) The provision of adequate drainage facilities on the subject site in order to prevent drainage problems from occurring on the subject site or within the community;

STAFF: The Metropolitan Sewer District has approved the preliminary development plan and will ensure the provision of adequate drainage facilities on the subject site in order to prevent drainage problems from occurring on the subject site or within the community.

- (e) The compatibility of the overall site design (location of buildings, parking lots, screening, landscaping) and land use or uses with the existing and projected future development of the area;

STAFF: The overall site design is not compatible with the existing and future development of the area. The proposal provides no connectivity with the surrounding neighborhood.

- (f) Conformance of the development plan with the Comprehensive Plan and Land Development Code. Revised plan certain development plans shall be evaluated for conformance with the non-residential and mixed-use intent of the form districts and comprehensive plan.

STAFF: The development plan does not conform to applicable guidelines and policies of the Land Development Code, as the site design provides no connectivity and the applicant is requesting an alternative plan for connectivity which provides no connections to any roadway.

REQUIRED ACTIONS

- **RECOMMEND** that Metro Council **APPROVE** or **DENY** the **Change-in-Zoning** from R-4 to R-6
- **APPROVE** or **DENY** the **Variance**
- **RECOMMEND** that Metro Council **APPROVE** or **DENY** the **Alternative Plan for Connectivity**
- **APPROVE** or **DENY** the **Detailed District Development Plan with Binding Elements**

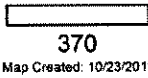

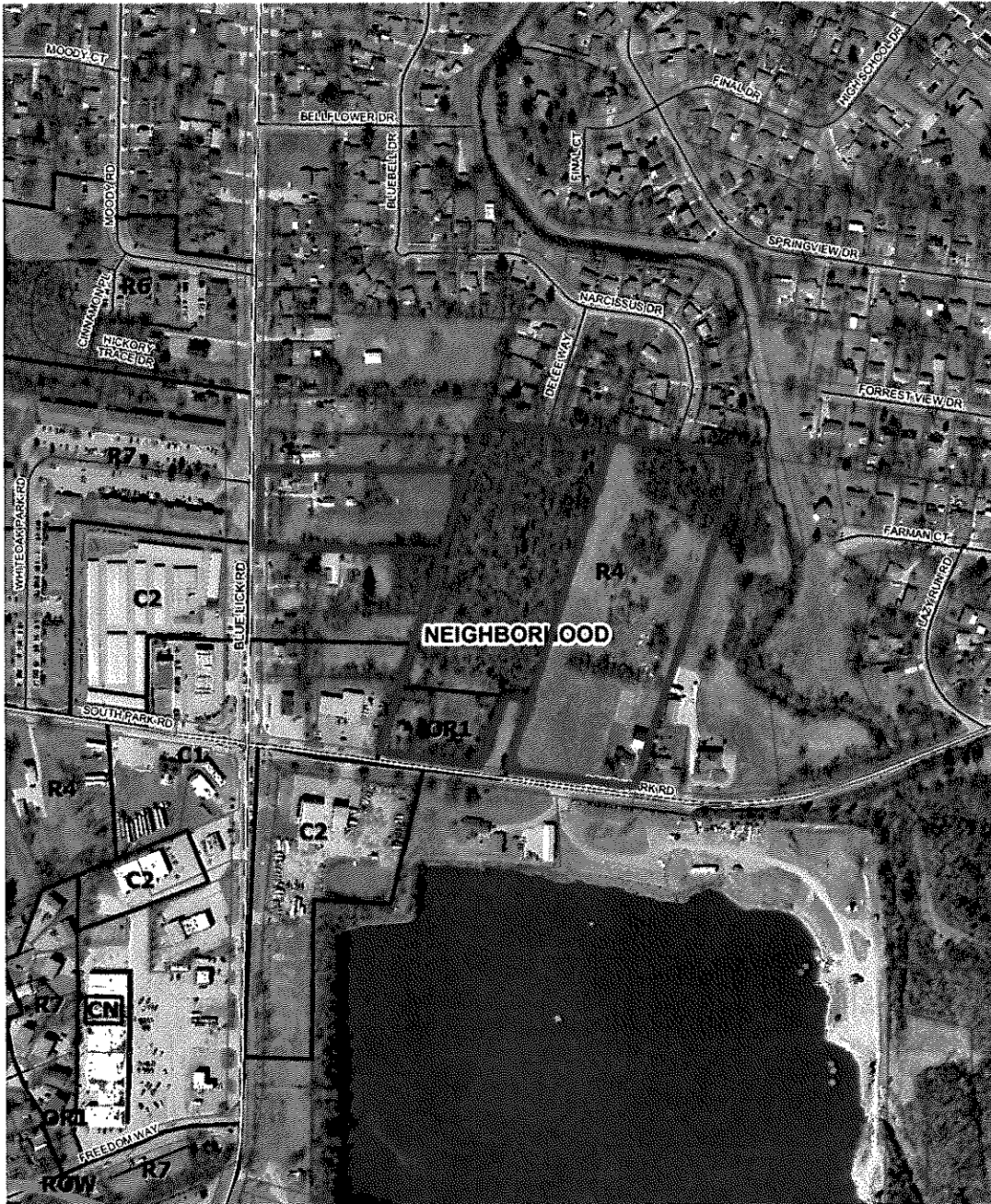

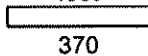

1. The development shall be in accordance with the approved district development plan, all applicable sections of the Land Development Code (LDC) and agreed upon binding elements unless amended pursuant to the Land Development Code. Any changes/additions/alterations of any binding element(s) shall be submitted to the Planning Commission or the Planning Commission's designee for review and approval; any changes/additions/alterations not so referred shall not be valid.
2. No outdoor advertising signs, small freestanding signs, pennants, balloons, or banners shall be permitted on the site.
3. Construction fencing shall be erected when off-site trees or tree canopy exists within 3' of a common property line. Fencing shall be in place prior to any grading or construction to protect the existing root systems from compaction. The fencing shall enclose the entire area beneath the tree canopy and shall remain in place until all construction is completed. No parking, material storage or construction activities are permitted within the protected area.
4. Before any permit (including but not limited to building, parking lot, change of use, site disturbance, alteration permit or demolition permit) is requested:
 - a. The development plan must receive full construction approval from Construction Review, Louisville Metro Public Works and the Metropolitan Sewer District.
 - b. The property owner/developer must obtain approval of a detailed plan for screening (buffering/landscaping) as described in Chapter 10 prior to requesting a certificate of occupancy. Such plan shall be implemented prior to occupancy of the site and shall be maintained thereafter.
 - c. A Tree Preservation Plan in accordance with Chapter 10 of the LDC shall be reviewed and approved prior to obtaining approval for site disturbance.
 - d. A minor plat or legal instrument shall be recorded consolidating the property into one lot. A copy of the recorded instrument shall be submitted to the Division of Planning and Design Services; transmittal of the approved plans to the office responsible for permit issuance will occur only after receipt of said instrument.
 - e. The materials and design of proposed structures shall be substantially the same as depicted in the rendering as presented at the July 30, 2020 Planning Commission hearing. A copy of the approved rendering is available in the case file on record in the offices of the Louisville Metro Planning Commission.
5. A certificate of occupancy must be received from the appropriate code enforcement department prior to occupancy of the structure or land for the proposed use. All binding elements requiring action and approval must be implemented prior to requesting issuance of the certificate of occupancy, unless specifically waived by the Planning Commission.
6. The applicant, developer, or property owner shall provide copies of these binding elements to tenants, purchasers, contractors, subcontractors and other parties engaged in development of this site and shall advise them of the content of these binding elements. These binding elements shall run with the land and the owner of the property and occupant of the property shall at all times be responsible for compliance with these binding elements. At all times during development of the site, the applicant and developer, their heirs, successors; and assignees, contractors, subcontractors, and other parties engaged in development of the site, shall be responsible for compliance with these binding elements.

The proposal is not ready for a public hearing date to be set as all MSD issues are not addressed.

MSD has not provided preliminary approval of the proposal. Transportation Planning and Public Works require connectivity between the site and the abutting and connecting streets.

One interested party comment has been received by staff in opposition to the request. Several neighbors spoke at the March 12, 2020 Land Development and Transportation Committee meeting in opposition to the request.

Examples of design elements that encourage this interaction include narrow street widths, street trees, sidewalks, shaded seating/gathering areas and bus stops. Placement of utilities should permit the planting of shade trees along both sides of the streets.

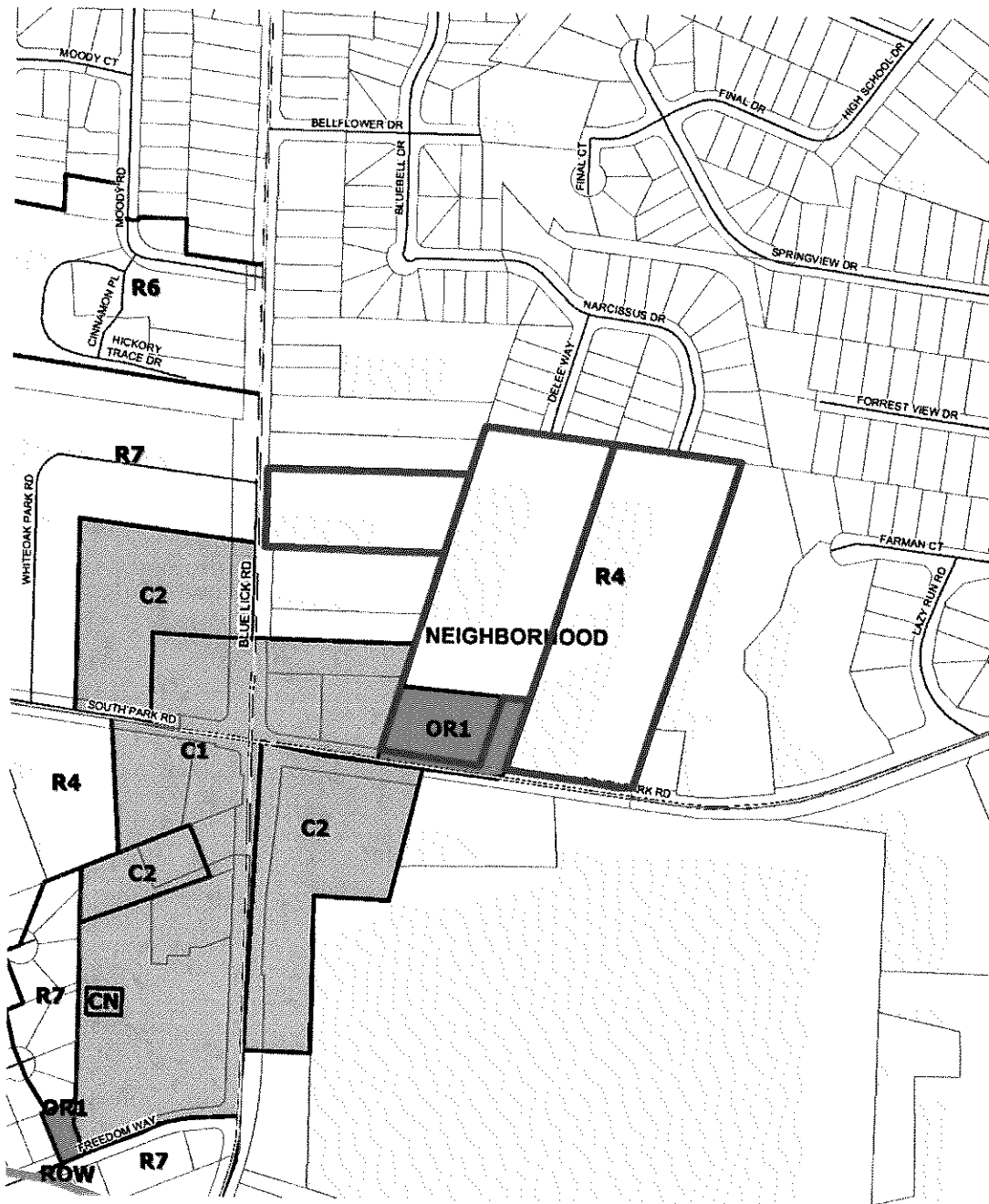

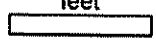

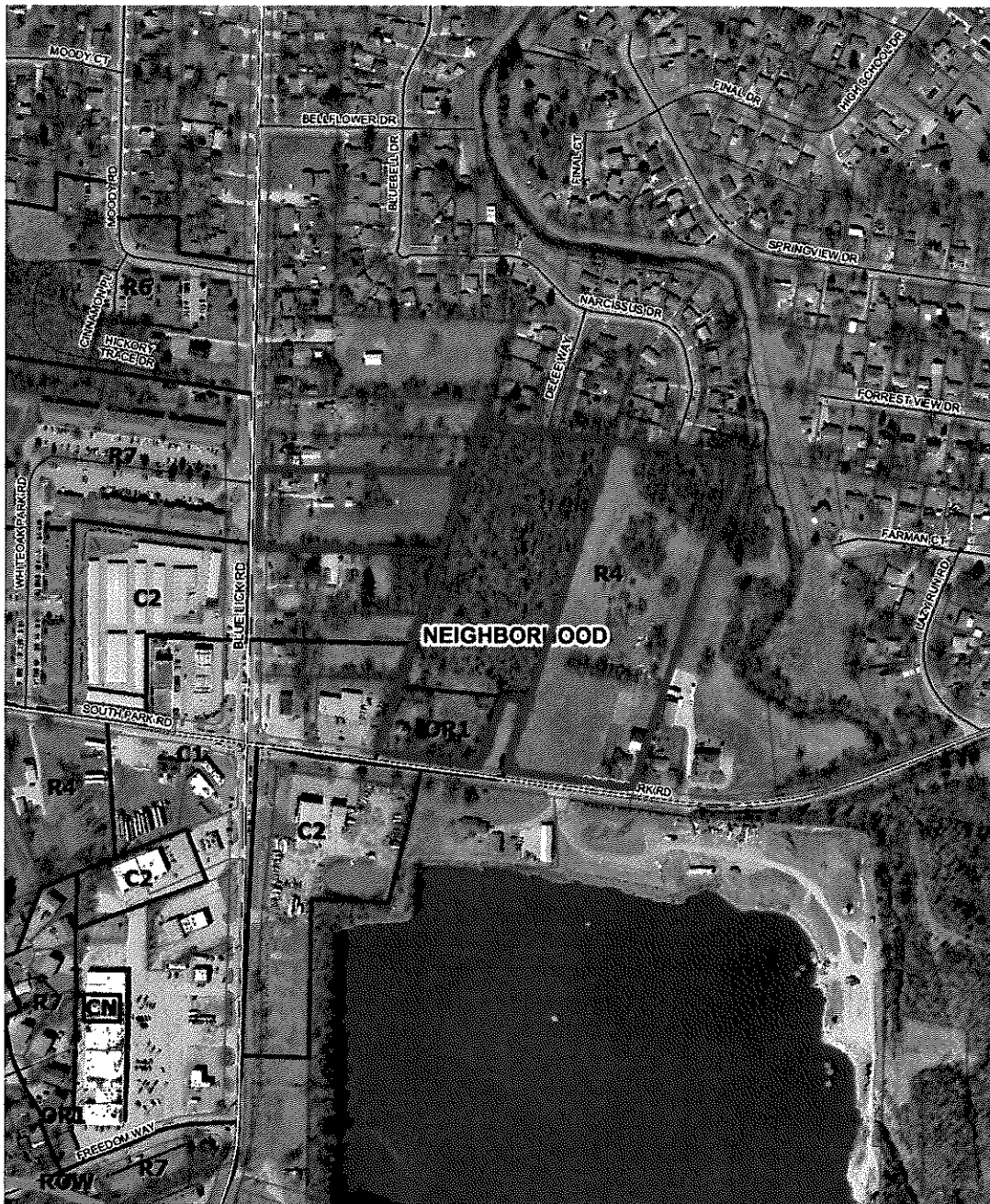

CASE SUMMARY/BACKGROUND

The subject site is located near the intersection of Blue Lick Road and South Park Road and consists of three contiguous parcels. One parcel is developed with a single-family residence while the other two are undeveloped. The applicant proposes to rezone the R-4 portion of the site to R-6, leaving the OR-1 portion as it is, in order to construct a new 312 unit multi-family development.

Multi-family and commercial uses are located at the intersection of Blue Lick Road and South Park Road. An existing quarry is located across South Park Road. Fishpool Creek runs through an adjacent parcel to the east of the site.

The site plan proposed by the applicant depicts gated access to the development with no connectivity to Blue Lick Road, South Park Road, or Delee Way.

STAFF FINDING

The proposal is not ready for a public hearing date to be set as all MSD issues are not addressed.

TECHNICAL REVIEW

MSD has not provided preliminary approval of the proposal. Transportation Planning and Public Works require connectivity between the site and the abutting and connecting streets.

INTERESTED PARTY COMMENTS

One interested party comment has been received by staff in opposition to the request.

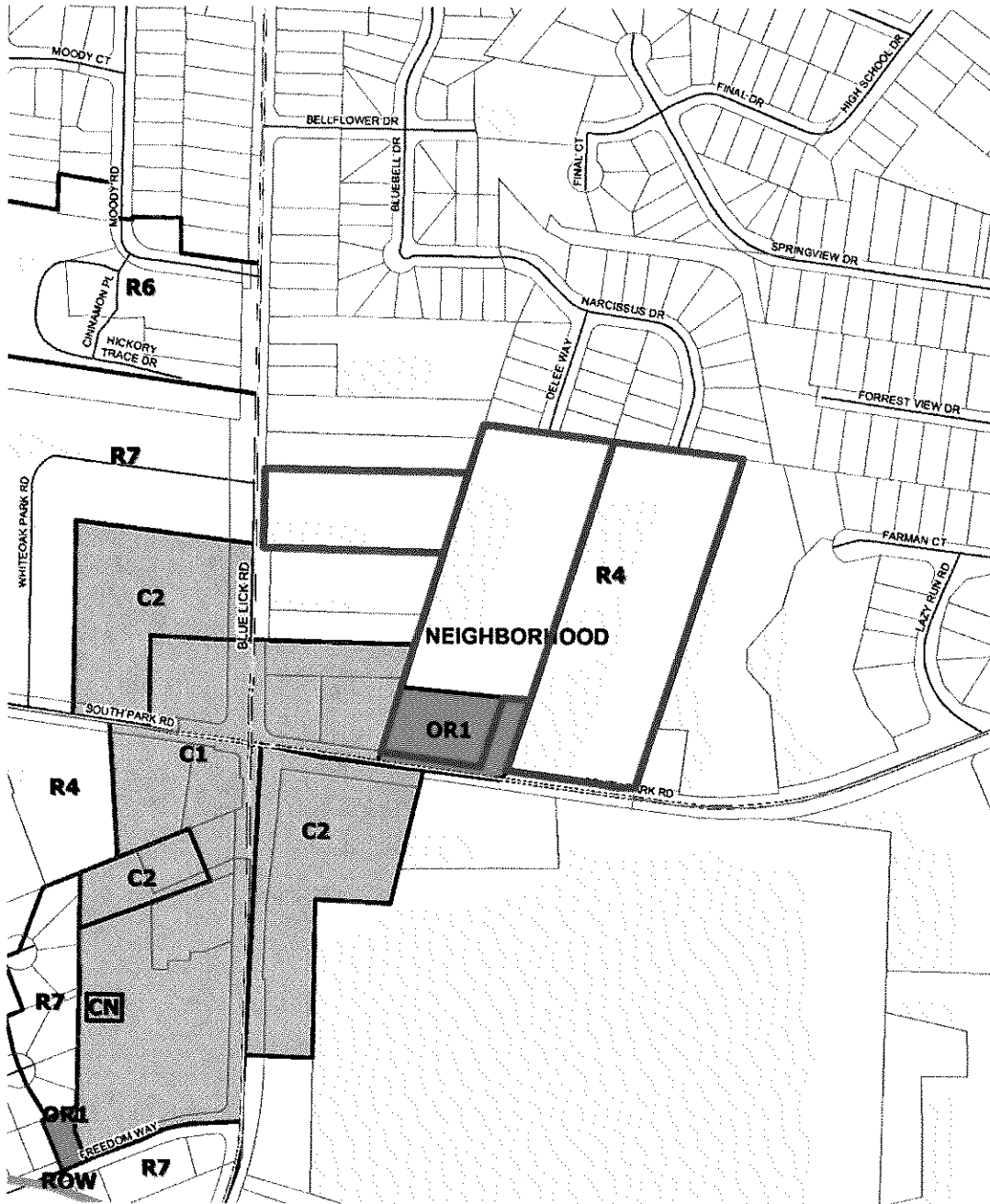

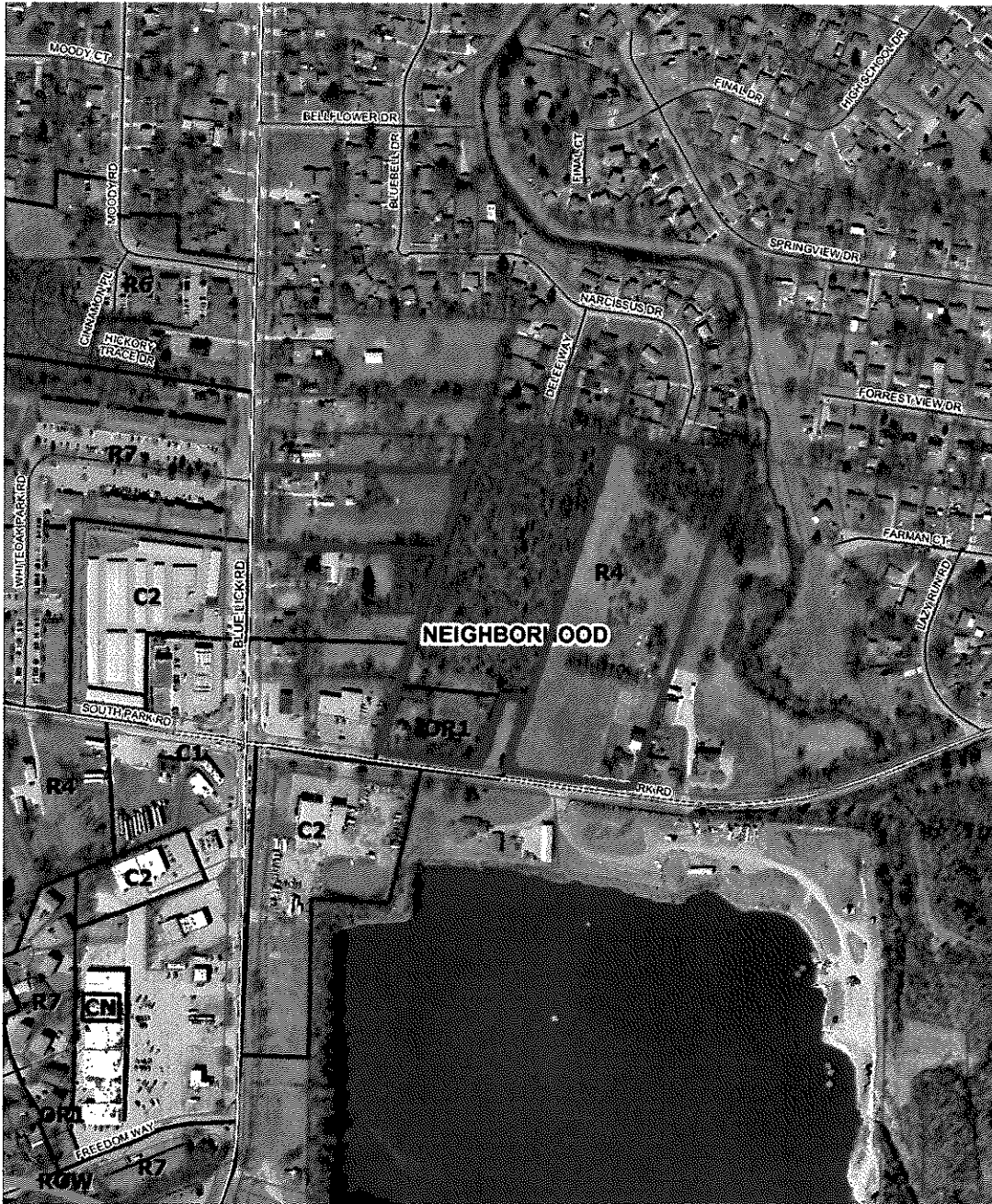

information regarding these structures is needed to determine if they are distinctive cultural features. The existing structures on the lots are eligible for the National Register of Historic Places and are not proposed to be preserved.

A checklist is attached to the end of this staff report with a more detailed analysis. The Louisville Metro Planning Commission is charged with making a recommendation to the Louisville Metro Council regarding the appropriateness of this zoning map amendment. The Louisville Metro Council has zoning authority over the property in question.

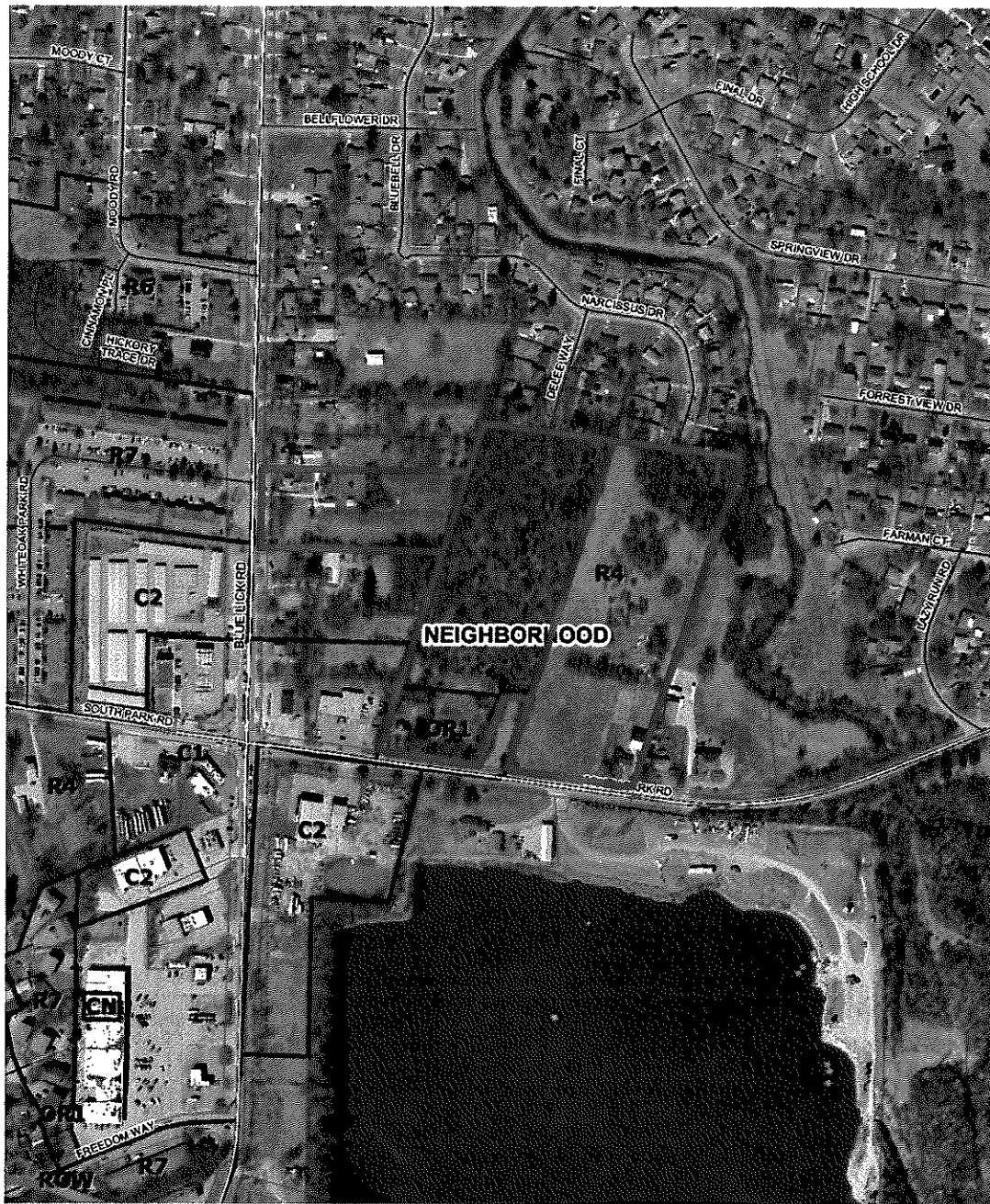
