COVID Response by the Numbers

17,985 HH received assistance with LIHEAP Crisis and Subsidy Low Income Home Energy Assistance Program
16,471 HH received assistance with Summer Cooling component



500 seniors were served through the Extended Senior Nutrition Program



120 households received Mortgage Assistance



11,784 HH received assistance with Louisville
Water/MSD bills.
10, 549 HH received assistance with LG&E via
Metro Utility Assistance Program



22,618 total stays of individuals utilizing Healthy Day Shelter.

16,193 total stays in Healthy Overnight Shelter at the Salvation Army.



401 residents-initiated contact to receive financial assistance and resources through the Financial Navigator Program



70 family HH received permanent housing with the "A Way Home" cohort. Maintaining zero families on the waiting list for permanent housing.

RCS Homeless Initiatives

Unsheltered Homeless Initiative:

- \$1 million Metro allocation in FY21 and FY20 to nine non-profits for the continuation of successful homeless initiatives (building on \$500,000 FY19 allocation for six months)
- Three options for low-barrier shelters beds; permanent storage location; expanded street outreach
- Program outcomes, demographics of persons served, etc.. found in Reports Section at Louisvilleky.gov/RCS

Homeless Task Force (formerly Homeless Encampment Task Force):

- Established three years ago and completed original goals (i.e.,21-Day Notice SOPs)
- Taking a deeper dive into issues. Seeking subcommittee members for: Community Outreach; Aging Unsheltered Homeless; Communications; Low Barrier Shelter; Mental Behavior and Substance Abuse; and Housing

New Homeless Services Division:

- \$250,000 Metro allocation in January 2021 for RCS to create a new Homeless Services Division.
- Four new positions (project manager; two program coordinators; and a homeless mental health and substance abuse coordinator). Three of four have been placed.
- Designated workforce to work on all these pieces listed above and build capacity.



Louisville Youth Network Launched

- \$1 million Metro allocation in FY21 to three grantees (Goodwill Industries of Kentucky, Coalition Supporting Young Adults) and Louisville Urban League)
- Connecting Louisville's
 Opportunity and Disconnected
 Youth between the ages of 16 24
 to local services that will address
 their needs in the areas of
 transportation, housing, mental &
 physical health, and many more.
- Led by our agency's Office of Youth Development (OYD)

• RCS serves as the Community Action Agency (CAA) for Jefferson County, part of the povertyfighting network of more than 1,000 community action agencies across the nation.


• CAAs – founded in 1964 as part of the civil rights movement – work to provide direct services and programs to low-income residents of all backgrounds including the historically underserved.
