- Question and response regarding the changes due to the pandemic regarding where people are physically located for work and how it can help attract talent to Louisville
- Reference to a report Louisville Forward released last year (attached hereto) regarding impacts of automation
- Question and response about whether there would be an opportunity to even the playing field regarding the disparities in the amount Black workers earn compared to their White counterparts
- Question and response regarding how much of a disadvantage there is in Louisville because of not having WiFi that meets a certain upload speed or the right hardware
- Question and response about how the pandemic may have advanced automation replacing jobs, especially of Black men, before the previously estimated year of 2030 (provided in research by McKinsey & Company)
- Legislative suggestions to protect working families

Eric Burnette, Louisville Forward, stated that he had been working on this for the last few years in order to be proactive after seeing a similar report by Brookings listing Louisville as one of the top ten cities at risk for automation. He stated that this led to the creation of the Future Work Initiative, which has three areas of focus: Workforce and Talent Pipeline, Industry Development, and Regional Hub.
