She was the longest ruling

This weekend marks 21 years@# since the 911 attacks.

Many lives were lost and changed forever.

As you MAY already know, scott harrington battled prostate cancer last year.

Scott's outcome was very successful due to early detection.

He is very open about his journey toward beating cancer, in order to help other men @#who might find themselves in a similar situation.

I don't know how many of you have had a chance to talk to scott at all.

But, he decided that as part of his recovery, he would take up bicycle riding to find some way to get back in shape, and take it up, he has.

He is now@# a member of the bicycle association, and if you see him carrying a bike out of here, wearing his writing close, I couldn't be more proud of him.

He is better shape now that he has been in the last five years.

So, not only did he
successfully beat cancer, but
he is actually very healthy and
he is very open about his
battle, and his being
successful. @#
SEPTEMBER is prostate cancer
awareness month.
Each of you received a blight
bright blue band.
It was on your table when you
sat down.
And then a ribbon.
The color for men's prostate
awareness.
You will notice a couple of us
tonight are wearing light blue
shirts in order to honor @#
prostate cancer awareness.
The city clock tower will be
lit in light blue tonight.
I encourage you to put prostate-
specific antigen tests for the
psa -- a simple blood test that
detects prostate antigens in
the bloodstream.
Most men do not @#have any
symptoms in the early stages of
prostate cancer, until this
simple test to catch it early.
1 in 6 men will be diagnosed
with prostate cancer in their
lifetime.
They should know their numbers
at age 50.
African-american men are,
unfortunately, at higher risk.
So, they should get tested @#at
age 45.
Men who have two or more
relatives who have had prostate
cancer -- likely a brother or
father -- should be tested at
40.
The five-year survival rate is
100%.

However, not all prostate cancer is slow growing. It is the second leading cause of death among men, @# behind skin cancer.

Like scott, I encourage all men to be having conversations with their physician.

If you are a male in this building and scott hasn't asked you what your psa number is, do not be surprised if he stops you in the hall to ask.

let's change these stats and talk about it.

I am here today to ask councilmembers to support a program given to real good news.

At this program, there will be speakers from Cincinnati to tell us how their citywide 100% renewable energy program has been implemented.

I am very, very eager to hear from their first-hand experience. the program is available on SEPTEMBER 28th by zoom, and each of you will receive an invitation to attend.

I am very proud of our city's pledge to reach 100% clean energy community wide by 2040.

I know that we will join hundreds of other cities in the United States, and more around the world.

Understandably, some of the leaders in this area are Houston, Phoenix, and New Orleans.

In each of these cities, climate related disasters have already taken a huge toll.

I am sure I don't need to remind any of you of the damage to our own city this year, by tornadoes and flooding. in FEBRUARY, 2020, Louisville followed Cincinnati's speed and setting clean energy goals.

Part of that plan includes a utility scale solar installation.

Something Louisville could also

do to provide 100% renewable energy for city @#operations.

It was a speaker from our sister city who helped us to get started.

Now, it is time for a progress report and to learn about all of their steps back and successes.

Speaking of successes, I'm very proud of the louisville sustainability program.

We know have solar renewable.@# zachary tyler, our energy manager, has helped our city fun hundreds of thousands of dollars in energy savings.

Thanks to you, the percentage of this will be used to create more energy savings in the future.

We have leed certified energy star and solar powered buildings, and many other important initiatives.

We need to coninue to spend this @#essential work and get an overview of cincinnati's progress will help us to do that.

My name is anthony minstein.

I'm PRESIDENT Of the louisville

federation of musicians.

Local 11 637 of the @#american
federation of musicians in
canada.

I'm here to talk about
community music partnership.
Many of you probably already
know a great deal about this.
Consider this a summer
refresher.

Or, you have been studying for
next semester.

To date, since JANUARY, we have
been able to @#perform live, 48
times across metro louisville.

This has been funded by you all.

The funding for this program is
granted by metro louisville,
and a piece of it is given to
each council member to spend, @#
based upon proposals for live
music in your district.

There were a couple of rules
around that.

That must be free and open to
the public.

An example is light up
bardstown road.

In DECEMBER, we are going to
have five different group
performing across bardstown
road. @#

it is just a way to add art and
music to the city, and help
promote a specific event.

Last week, I had my treo
playing some jazz down at paris
town.

Again, funded by community
music partnerships.

This is @#a program that allows
us to employ musicians and also
bring live music into the
community.

It is an important program, I
feel.

Why am I here?

Every few years, I think it is worthwhile, just warning you again, of the program, and your responsibility.

And I want to be clear about your responsibility. @# when I am teaching my musicians, we expect to do all of the work. We fill out the application, we fill out the cover letter, which then goes to your office for approval.

If there is no approval, then we have to cancel the occasion.@# and we have had to cover some life engagements that would have brought music into the community because we could not get a response from the district office.

And I am also going to tell you that each district gets a pot of money to spend on live music.

If you spend all your money,@# it is permissible to borrow some from your colleagues.

You MAY have extra money left over.

When I became PRESIDENT, I thought it was a shame that we went each year without spending all this money and bringing music into the community.

I am here to bring music to your community, with your help.

That is all I have.

>> thank you, @#very much.

>> I appreciate it.

>> honorable PRESIDENT James, and council members, my name is kathy strom, and I am the local representatives for ct @#

associates inc., a third-party manager of apartment communities for over 1200 families in louisville, kentucky.

These communities include cityview apartments located in neighborhoods.

Liberty green apartments located downtown.

Sheppard square apartments, located in so town. @#

ct has been doing business in kentucky, and managing apartment communities in louisville for over 25 years.

With the first community cityview acquired and renovated in 1996.

We have 25 hard-working employees in louisville, with an annual payroll of over 1.3 @# million -- contributing a significant amount in payroll and state taxes.

I would like to take a few minutes of your time today to introduce you to the work products of the 25 louisville people employed by ct who manage these communities.

Many of whom are here today, along with @#many community members.

Since the start of the pandemic, ct employees have secured \$1,045,510 in rent relief fundings for hundreds of louisville households.

And those efforts continue to this day.

We filled out @#a couple of applications today.

Between AUGUST 2020 and JULY of 2022, properties managed by ct associates did not evict a

single household due to nonpayment of rent.

Working to take the extra steps necessary to use all resources available for victim prevention.

Ct property manages @#a score consistently above hud, professionally.

Over the last five months, ct employees have facilitated seven hud reaction inspections, scoring a total of 86.5 points.

This score is 3.5 points higher than the average@# score in kentucky, and 14 points higher than the average score in louisville for the most recent published data on the hubs website.

Between MARCH 2020 and JUNE 2022, ct associates assisted in the owning, management, and reservation of 500 units @#in cityview, including the relocation of 300 city households.

This relocation project was financed in part by metro council louisville housing affordable trust fund.

This project allowed for 350 existing households and 140 new households to move to fully renovated, energy efficient units.

And we celebrate @#this success with you, for making it possible.

Ct associates have the support of hundreds of households in our community, despite a two year campaign of online campaigns, door to door campaigns, and social media outreach.

Sorry, I will make this really

quick.

Louisville tenants have failed
to @# --

>> ma'am, your time is up.

I am here with louisville
family justice advocates.

Please join me in respecting
the @#10 louisville people who
died last NOVEMBER.

Dennis hart, regina smith,
stephanie dunbar, kerry was
stopped, leslie stone, roman
anderson, barry williams senior,
norman check goes,@# bradshaw.

I'm here because of the
inhumane treatment of people
incarcerated implicated in
these deaths.

Please note that the louisville
government suicide crisis text
line is lou741741.

They rightly proclaimed @#the
need for a paradigm shift.

He added new protocols for drug
overdoses and increased
salaries for corrections
workers.

What is missing are the voices
and experiences of those
incarcerated inside.

There can be no systematic
paradigm shift without the
participation of those directly
impacted.@#

as underscored for the national
public radio program this
morning, lmdc has one of the
highest rates of jail suicides,
nationally.

My point here is not to
normalize any number of jail
deaths.

The only acceptable number is zero.

Preventing jail suicides@# must become a priority.

I am here to ask for your support for a thorough review of the current healthcare services in our jail that has failed to prevent these deaths.

Lmdc is currently paying between 8 million and \$10 million per year@# to well cast a highly questionable, for-profit, global corporation currently facing multiple suits for incompetence and unethical practices.

Welfare is not sufficiently identified in preventing suicides here.

Director collins says@# huge national changes in jails and prisons are necessary, and that is true.

But, we can't wait for that.

And so well established urban health center, in urban tremble has many organizations working every day to heal addictions and prevent suicides.

Many of these organizations@# are severely underfunded, but we are paying \$8 million-\$10 million per year to an incompetent global organization.

As metro, so to see all government funds and protect the health and safety of all members, residents of our community, I ask you@# to hold the new leadership of louisville accountable for the continued deaths and to begin challenging this paradigm by centering incarcerated people and their families and working

with amenity partners who care.

Ann ramser? @#

>> councilmembers, contrary to policy procedures in development code and the direction of metro council, such as the @#JULY electronic notice of a neighborhood meeting.

I notified the case manager

whose notice was not sent.

Asked if the developer would hold another virtual meeting.

Then I saw the case became a regular application.@#

the case manager responded, and I quote, the issue with the electronic notification without pdf oversight is that the applicant could face additional delays.

The case will not advance further until the second meeting has been held.

They made a mistake, but your constituents -- what input will your constituents @#have one running for the committee?

Pnd received an email that said they were not able to participate in the virtual meeting because of the language.

Pnd made a decision it was not necessary.

I noticed this, and the applicant said that anyone who wanted @#to participate could have phoned in.

One of the subdivisions surrounding the property would have an estimated 34 on the property, and the other neighborhood has a 26% poverty rate.

We offer internet access free of charge.

Again, decisions are being made that hurt @#your constituents.

Short-term rentals are not supposed to be within 600 feet of a non-occupied short-term rental.

Pnd is the map for the perimeter, but has not provided this information to the public.

When somebody sends an email objecting to the 60 foot rule, @# there's nothing in the staff report.

regarding the semi truck parking proposed ordinance, p and d should have received public comments regarding proposed change.

I previously forwarded you information that p and d staff had approval levels contrary to the ldc.

The ldc@# refers to the area to determine the maximum size that MAY be used but the data in the application only requests square footage, not growth of the pool area.

These were previously built with no indication that permits were issued or accepted.

This indicates environmental issues, @#but nothing is mentioned about that in the approval levels letters.

Issued, when the applicant's one from neither the principals nor the accessible unit.

Issued when the applicant indicates the principal unit is 1000 square feet greater than what it would be.

According to p and d staff, @# pva records MAY not be accurate

so the information on the application provided by the applicant is taken inside. Other issues against I request that metro council does the case.

Third times the charm.

I am shannon musselman, and I am the PRESIDENT Of parristown pointe neighborhood assosiation and head of the advisory panel @# for development.

And I have been following the lady that just went, and I have to say that planning and design is where we are at now, so that is the stage we are at now.

What I have learned, it has been very frustrating in the last year, because this @#last year it's negotiations have been very challenging and there is more to come.

We are trying to get this thing wrapped up before the end of the year.

I want to thank metro council for approving parristown pointe's funding and @#grant. We were abandoned by public works.

They said that this wasn't necessary for them to conduct a traffic study.

And I know it is probably not necessary because the building is not functioning.

But we are using the funds you approved to conduct our own traffic study.

And I have learned a great @#deal

about flying drones.

We are doing it all legally, we are applying through the faa, and we are learning a lot about our neighborhood.

I do want to commend the kentucky performing arts for a greatly executed traffic plan for this past weekend's good timers event that took place. Good @#timers visited parristown pointe before and raised absolute havoc and chaos on the neighborhood.

This weekend, we saw police officers, we saw cops with their flashing lights on, we saw blocked alleys, and on ground, we @#did see some chaos and some cruising, and some things that were going on that cause havoc and chaos to this neighborhood.

and the neighborhood deserves for metro council, as well as planning and zoning, to listen to our voices when we talk @# about the rearrangement that is being proposed on the urban government center campus.

They are proposing a hotel to be on the neighborhood side, and we have a petition that we are going to file, asking them to please exchange it for what, historically, we have been accustomed to -- which is an office building on @#the neighborhood side of the campus. It has been a frustrating process because we have had the challenges we have had.

The system seems to be a little bit disrupted, and I hope that it runs smooth, starting in 2023 when we switch

administration and office.

Leslie McCabe?

>> thank you for having me.@#

I am going to piggyback on what shannon was saying.

The proposing right now is a \$480 million project.

So what exactly does that mean?

I live on east breckenridge street.

This is not going to fundamentally change@# those that live over there, it is going to completely change.

Why is that?

This new property and what they are looking to do is going to bring 120 room hotels, and they are calling them boutique hotels.

450 apartments, and square footage of about 120,000 square feet, probably about @#140+ people.

That actually rounded up a little bit.

What does that mean for the neighborhood?

When they built this development, what you need to understand is that these people are not going to go to broadway, they are going to come to the neighborhood to get to the expressway.

They are going to cut through breckenridge street, christie, or highland.

It is going to fundamentally change @#ths neighborhood.

The highland, three or four years ago, was fantastic.

Right now, highland, on weekends, is not safe.

Come and visit between 11:00 and 2:00.

This is not going to add to this chaos.

So rather than this property assimilated to this neighborhood, we now have to change everything ourselves, because we are going to have to put speed bumps, more than likely, captain armstrong is going to submit for permit, permit parking.

And the question is, why is this?

Because you really shouldn't place money over people.

But that is exactly what is happening with this development.

Because the key leader of this development, MR. Smith, as he has said once, he said to me on three or four times when talking with him, I can't reduce this size.

I cannot reduce the size of the apartments from 452 to 250.

It is all about the money.

He got this project for one dollar.

one dollar!

And it is about the money. so, my question is, why is the neighborhood at the expense of us?

Why is I, as a resident, at the expense of that?

Let me say, I love development.

But we want the right time for development in this area.

This is the urban government center, again, I am sure you all are familiar.

This is bordered by residential people.

so, the previous developer, and even this developer that they could work with, this could be a place that you could walk in and do things.

If you have only a hotel and no other things to bring them, rather it is a grocery store, or something like @#that, nobody is going to be frequenting that.

The main purpose of that is to be speed for paris town, and that only.

There apartments are transient.

So, I ask, when this is going to be considered and finally signed, it is considered for the residence.

Randall webber? @#

>> thank you for allowing me to address metro's negotiations with parristown preservation trust, @# regarding community benefits from the proposed apartment government center.

I have two ethical obligations in this process.

First, I am metro @#executive branch appointee.

And on the other hand, the reason I was appointed was to address the needs and concerns of the parristown and original highlands residence ethical obligations.

One, to address the needs @#of those who I have been asked to represent, and two, to get the other side a level of fair play in the process.

My residents are concerned about a number of items, the most prominent of which, traffic

volume, density, and
gentrification, increasing
price ranges.

They do plan to do something
with the property.

It currently is deteriorating
and metro-own.

They are asking for tax
increment financing for that
zone.

We will not ask metro council to
micromanage the process.

But, we do have one request.

A community benefits agreement
generally is enforceable.

Its contract is binding, a
memorandum of agreement or
understanding is not inherently
enforceable but some items can
be written in such a way to be
enforceable.

The agreement with metro uses
the same terminology, and we
would ask that it be included
somewhere in the agreement,
regarding community benefits,
in order to make the agreement
strong and affordable.

Let's have strong and legal
remedies for both parties.

In short, let's negotiate, and
sign a community benefits
agreement, which encourages
both parties to consider
nonperformance in non-option.

because I contact my counsel
men and women when I am in the
district.

I feel lie as a member of
their community, it is their

job to step up.

I had spoken to MISS Barbara shankman about @housing issues.

In MS. Donna was on the phone with me when my to

>> the rules are, you are not going to address council members by name.

>> I'm sorry.

I didn't know that.

I have evidence of me being on the @phone with a council member when my flight rights were violated.

I'm just asking to be in contact in order to file the proper complaints.

These are my public servants.

You know the community wants to work with y'all, so you will have to work with the community.

Nobody @was around to be responsible with these kids.

Y'all say to pray, but, no, we need everybody to get up and stand up over and over again for families.

I am saying for my councilmembers to please stand up, do something about what is going on in these communities. When we are @having issues, I have reports of the department of corrections, those being recorded on my phone when I am being reaching out for help for problems.

So I'm asking whoever I am in contact with with my issues to please get it done.

Those are when you do get done.@ we see so much garbage in the west end.

You say all of these other

boards, what about the west end?
I had damage to my vehicle from
falling in potholes. @#
I called risk management,
nobody answers the phone.
I filed paperwork, nobody can
find it.
I work hard and I'm on
disability.
So I'm just asking my
councilmembers, whatever member
of this society pays for, would
you all please do something?
Do something.
Have kids, man, you have
homeless.
Man, @# y'all can feel for the
homeless but not give them the
help they want.
That's wrong.
We see all kinds of stuff out
there.
The police department has no
respect for the people.
And I want us to respect them.
They are in our neighborhoods,
they are our public servants.
The only thing we are asking
y'all to do, if you know y'all
are wrong, @# get help.
I think y'all.
But I really need to speak to
the people I need to speak to
for the problems I have had,
for the people that are
supposed to work for me.
Because if I am filing a
complaint against you, your
supervisors job is none.
I have been @# discriminated in my
own city by law enforcement
officials, government officials
before.
And I am just wanting to hold
these once accountable,
properly.

>> MR. PRESIDENT, can I bring an item to order, please?

>> yes, sir.

>> MADAM Clerk, there are actually two marked up there.

>> thank you.

>> and then there is one then cut off.

>> I @#see that.

I removed the h from his name and I didn't realize it created a duplicate.

>> thank you.

>> there are 24 "yes" votes. @# thank you.

>> thank you.

The consent calendar passes.

MADAM Clerk, a reading of item number 31, please?

>> an ordinance amending the metro land development code relating to truck parking requirements case @#number 21-ldc-0010.

>> do I have a motion?

The ordinance is enforced with any discussion.

>> thank you, MR. PRESIDENT.

I wanted to allow joe hagerman to answer any of the questions @# by councilmembers who have not had a chance to ask questions here and also to allow matt to be sent out to all 26 councilmembers so they could see and understand what was proposed, over what is existing now.

There were some limits to the ordinance,@# to allow the truck to have nonwaivable provisions put into that.

And there was also an element

of lifetime council meeting,
with the conditional use permit,
under section 9 that you all
probably already remember.

I don't really have anything to
add.@#

I don't know if the council
wishes to be recognized, or
not.

>> thank you, COUNCILWOMAN.

COUNCILWOMAN George?

>> thank you, PRESIDENT.

Thank you to chair flood for
all of her work.

This ordinance is not going to
solve every problem we have @#
related with heavy truck
parking.

What it does do, is provide
more options, and specifically
for our overnight, independent
drivers.

In many of the districts, these
are the trucks that we see
parked on our local roads, and
our vacant right of way, in our
walmart parking lot.@#

the legal truck parking is one
of the most commonly cited
violations.

And with the current
limitations that exist for
overnight parking, there need
to be fewer sites that
effectively allow the market to
drive up exorbitant rates for
drivers.

No level of enforcement is
going to fix that problem.

I've heard from @#many of my
colleagues about the concerns
with impact to commercial
properties, and the inclusion
of c2.

Several of our colleagues have
added protections, starting

with the cut process.

And there are over 15 different restrictions.

starting with the types of districts that can't be weighed, distance restrictions, travel connections, no idling, separation requirement, in addition to the prohibition on rezoning, c2 remotes lower intensity use from the data that we have. and a sub date with a review from planning and design to the council.

So, I want to think planning and design for creating that zoning area in the district.

I want to thank them because in doing that, it is easy to see any restrictions of c2, means that we would effectively be passing an ordinance tonight. Which would mostly go to one district, and that is district two.

Outside of the inclusion of m1, we would get a sub total of 34 acres and expanded options at c3.

To exclude c2 printers is largely ineffective, and this is what we have seen in the design.

So all that to say, I am excited to vote for the ordinance tonight, and I would not be supportive of any of the attempts to remove c2.

Thank you.

>> thank you, COUNCILWOMAN.

>> COUNCILMAN Winkler?

>> thank you, PRESIDENT James.

I don't think anything I say tonight is going to be a big surprise.

I said it four weeks ago, I said it two weeks ago, I will say it again tonight.

I agree that truck parking on our street is a problem. @# it is a problem we need to address.

But it is a problem of enforcement and fines, not necessarily a problem of access, right?

And I say that because as councilmember chamber and armstrong made the point several weeks ago, I think it is hard to argue that there is a material difference between a site being a couple miles away, and five, or six, or @#seven miles away.

So, the reason people park on the streets is because it is close and it is convenient.

So unless you are going to have a proliferation of truck parking where it is all over the place and readily accessible, I do not think this is the ultimate problem.

Because the problem is, how close is it?@#

unless I can walk there and it is a few blocks away, whether it is a mile or two, or five miles, they are essentially the same thing.

It is further away and it is hyper convenient for me to just park on the street.

For me, this @#is an issue of enforcement and making sure that you have adequate penalty. We talked about the exorbitant fees for truck parking.

But the examples that were being given is \$100 a month,

essentially three dollars per day.

I don't know how much more supply is going to drive that cost down.

And what is the cost level, where somebody would convert their lot, @#still make money, and do it?

So \$100 to month, to me, I -- three dollars per day, I do not know if you are going to push that price point is significantly lower.

And the price is not the issue, it is more the location.

And I would ask, and ask if we expand to see to that we are@# trading one for another.

I applaud the restrictions we have, but we can't use it for overnight parking, you can't idle your truck there.

What I ask, if you have an enforcement issue today of parking on the street, who are

-

these new enforcement officials that are going to be driving around to legal truck sites, and making sure it hasn't been turned into @#a truck stop, and people aren't using it to sleep overnight?

If there are illegal trucks there.

I think we are merely trading one problem for another.

If we have an eagle issue with illegal parking on the street, I think we need to address that issue.

Expanding to one, particularly in the areas that have been cited,@# there is lots of industrial access around the

examples that have been given.

I think there were 38 citations.

There is lots of industrial zoning in that area.

So one would ask if there are large amounts of demand, why has it not been created in @#that area?

And I think the answer, quite frankly, is unless it is right next door, I am still going to choose to park on the street because it is more convenient than parking a mile, two miles, four miles away.

I would suggest that we tackle the enforcement issue, right, that we expand access to m1, see @#what happens.

It does expand the amount of legal access, but stops short of pulling the process out and going all the way to c2.

I would also suggest that if you have a law that is c2 and you @#would like to turn it into truck parking, we have a process for that.

You could apply for rezoning, rezone the parcel to m1, we would have a say in that process versus turning it over, and to me, that is the better approach.

So, I am making an amendment that basically strikes c2 from this ordinance, and focuses on the expansion of m1, @# and would ask for your support.

I make that in the form of an amendment.

>> thank you.

just a point of order really quick, COUNCILMAN Bauer, can you please turn your camera on, please?

>> it's on, just in my pocket.

>> thank you.@#

we have a motion -- do we have
a second?

There is a second by COUNCILMAN
Reed.

Is there a discussion on the
motion?

>> MR. PRESIDENT, I'm sorry to
interrupt, can I jump in really
quick?

>> yes.

>> hi, county attorney.

Just so we are @#super clear,
there are specific parts of
this ordinance that are pre-
existing references to the c2
that are sort of collaterally
cited.

I think this only strikes me as
new instances of c2 that this
amendment would contain.

Not all references that are
currently as citations -- I
have an exact list of what
those would be.

I would like to @#read those
really quick, almost counselor
winkler said differently.

>> you are correct.

>> okay.

So there is a reference on
4.2.1 which references 4.2.6.6,
regarding c2.

I can list the page numbers, as
well, just for the committee's
benefit.

Give me just a second.

I have to scroll through while
I am @#doing this.

>> hang on one second.

>> I just want to clarify what
he is all about.

Is everything he is mentioning
going to be out because he
wrote references c2?

or is this for informational

purposes only?@#

or are we keeping it because it is pre-existing before this ordinance even came along?

>> yes, thank you.

I have identified the sections where c2, under the current version, would be a new zoning category in which @#truck parking would be allowed.

So I'm just eliminating those that we left with.

So, it doesn't make striking the c2 expansion -- and I am going to confront counselor winkler about that --

>> that is @#correct.

>> thank you, that answers your question.

You MAY continue, MR. Feaster.

>> section 4.2.1 identifies a section 4.2.6, striking the c2 reference right there.

In section 4.2.5.1.8, there is a substance@# sentence referencing c2, that entire sentence should be struck.

All references in section 4.2.6 six should be struck of note.

And those referred specifically to c2.

So those should be struck in its entirety.@#

and there is one additional matter, counselor winkler, that I guess you need to decide.

There was an amendment last

-

week, subsection nine deals with a span over two years with applications not being accepted, and the ordinance would come back before @#the council for a review.

That could be struck, in its entirety.

They could be kept under a certain degree, you can strike the portion where the permits are no longer issued while still under counsel review. You don't have to mess with that, but it seemed relevant to the c2.

So I want to make sure to bring that up, @#as well.

>> yeah, I think let's just remove the ct for now, and then we can look at that in a moment.

>> then I believe that is all of the relevant references.

>> thank you, MR. Feaster, thank you, councilmember. @#

I see three people in the queue -- are you all wanting to discuss on the amendment, or on the ordinances, in general?

>> general.

>> okay.

COUNCILMAN Armstrong?

>> I am happy to wait to discuss in general.

Thank you, MR. PRESIDENT.

>> thank you, COUNCILWOMAN Shank.

I think you are muted.

>> I am good with general.

>> okay, @#thank you.

All in favor of the amendment proposed by counselor winkler, please say I.

>> all those opposed?

>> we will have to do a roll call vote.

>> MR. PRESIDENT, you have 16 yeses, and eight nose.

>> thank you, the amendment passes.@#

>> I just wanted to make mention that I wated to see some improvement with the trucks and trailers parking illegally in residential areas. Typically, in the western areas. You find them all over the neighborhood, and @#parking is limited if you live on a pretty busy street.

So the fact that they come, and they pull up in front of a resident, and it takes up 3 to 4 parking spaces -- so, I really think that needs to be addressed, and I understand right now that the current fine is \$15.@#

I would like to, somehow, in the future, look to increasing that amount so that you just can't park here from wherever and park in residential areas.

>> COUNCILWOMAN Shanklin?

>> thank you, MR. PRESIDENT. @#

>> this morning, I got a phone call, and you are not going to believe this -- it matched on the street, riht next to big lots.

Nobody is in there, and they are there all the time because people live @#in there.

I have one truck that is parked

in community center parking lot.
It has been sitting there for
over three weeks.
I have one that is parked right
across the street.
And then right around the corner
by the park, there is three in @#
a row.
All three of them -- I have
talked to them -- they live
right there.
there is no enforcement.
It is just crowding my
neighborhood.
They are everywhere.
And if they go to m3, I am
still getting them.@#
and I am just seeing trucks
everywhere.
They are up the street.
I have potholes everywhere.
Just pave these streets.
I feel like there should be
more enforcement to get these
guys out of the neighborhoods.
I actually wrote down the law,@#
put it on a piece of paper, and
stuck it on these trucks, and a
couple of them didn't come
back.
I just wrote the ordinance on a
paper.
But there is something that has
to be done.
They tear up the whole
neighborhood.
So, something has to be done.
It won't be long before one of
them opens up.@#
so, that is in the
neighborhood.
Thank you.
>> thank you, COUNCILWOMAN.
Is there any further discussion?
>> MR. PRESIDENT, this is
COUNCILWOMAN Ballard, I'm sorry.

I just wanted to let
COUNCILWOMAN @#shanklin know that
the ordinance we did some
months ago required more zoning
officers to be hired.

And those had to be hired
because they say there @#is not
enough trucks -- I'm sorry, not
trucks -- cars -- for them to
drive around in.

That is two more than what we
have.

So I'm hopng that will help.

Thank you.

any further discussion?

>> this is an ordinance
requiring roll call vote.

MADAME Clerk, please call the

PRESIDENT James, you have 22
yes votes, and two no votes.

>> I wanted to ask, are we
voting on the amendment, or the
actual one?

>> this is for the ordinance,
itself.

>> oh, the ordinance, not the
amendment.

>> we voted on @#the amendment.

>> so, this is with the
amendment?

>> with the amendment, offered
by COUNCILMAN Winkler.

>> I'm sorry.

>> thank you.

>> MR. PRESIDENT, you have 23@#
yes votes, and one no vote.

>> thank you, the ordinance
passes.

>> an ordinance relating to the
zoning and form district of

properties located at 15009 and 150011 dixie highway, parcel I.D.

Number@# 113700060000 and associated unnamed alleys containing approximately 3.2 acres and being in louisville metro.

Case number 22z0 ne 0016.

>> there was a second by COUNCILMAN Winkler?

Is @#there any discussion, COUNCILMAN Flood?

>> yes, MR. PRESIDENT, at this time, the county attorney has been so diligently working on some new language, combining elements that will hopefully strengthen what we have done in the past, and to clarify that, it would be better @#to use these elements, and then send it back to the full council.

And COUNCILWOMAN Cindy fowler was in total agreement with this.

>> thank you.

We have a motion to send this back to committee.

We have a second by COUNCILMAN Triplett.@#

all those in favor, say aye.

>> aye.

>> all those opposed?

>> aye has it.

Go to item number 33.

>> an ordinance of the louisville metro council to approve the annexation by the city of saint matthews of the twin book subdivision.

>> thank you.

A motion by COUNCILMAN Winkler, and a second.

Is @#there any discussion?

>> thank you, MR. PRESIDENT.

This came up with accountability, as with all annexations and the controversy involved.

This is the annexation of 12 homes.

It will impact the insurance premium tax the city receives 240 200. @#

I would let my colleague advocate for it and I will respond.

Thank you.

>> thank you, COUNCILMAN Pitt

>> COUNCILWOMAN Granny?

>> thank you, MR. PRESIDENT, thank you, MR. CHAIRMAN.

I am the representative for district 7, and @#this is an annexation request for the city of saint matthews, and 12 homes to annex with the city of saint matthews.

these 12 homes are advocating for better services.

Particularly, in public service, and @# the way of streets, and paving, and snowplowing.

The \$4200 loss in insurance premium tax is a minuscule amount, compared to what the outlier would be @# for the metro to maintain these streets if, in fact, they do maintain them.

And I am asking for my counsel colleagues to approve this annexation because these 12 residents all agree that they would be willing to pay additional taxes in order to get the services that they @#so deserve.

So I am, again, asking for your support on this annexation.

Thank you.

>> thank you, COUNCILWOMAN.

>> thank you, MR. PRESIDENT.

I was a no voting committee,
and I am going to be a no vote
here.

The reason for that is, we have
health bills@# three through 14
pending.

We don't know the outcome or
the impact, how the metro
involving house bill 314 is
going to be.

We had a commission studying it.

And I think as a matter of
philosophy, it would be in @#our
best interest to hold these
future annexations until we
determine what impact this will
have on the city of Louisville.

While I respect my colleague
representing her district, that
is wealthy enough to be close
enough to a home rule city that
offers @#service to their
citizens.

I would also contend that they
offered that service with our
personnel.

Those are our police officers,
patrolling the streets in Saint
Matthews and Parkland.

Those are our firefighters.

In some cases, our paramedics, @#
and our EMT is riding in our
ambulances.

Our dispatchers, sending them
on calls.

And I represent an area that
doesn't have the benefit of
having a home rule city in
close proximity.

Doesn't have those same options.

And the oath I took when I sat
in this seat was to the people
of this community, Louisville
Metro,@# not to Saint Matthews,

not to anchorage.

So, I will be voting "no",
because I believe it is my
responsibility to look out for
people who don't have those
same opportunities.

It is not about the money, it
is not about the numbers, it is
about the @#point.

Thank you, MR. PRESIDENT.

>> thank you, COUNCILMAN.

>> I just wanted to comment
that I am not really in favor
of the city moving any type of
river dome.

But I have to support
COUNCILWOMAN Mccranie, because
I know what is like when you
are trying to fight for your
district@# -- I was a no vote in
the committee.

But tonight, I will be a "yes"
vote, because I am very
passionate about doing this for
our constituents.

>> thank you, COUNCILWOMAN.

>> hello, MR. PRESIDENT.

My no vote tonight is not
against COUNCILWOMAN Mccranie.@#
if what was good for district
26 was bad for the rest of the
city, I would still advocate
for it, because it is my
district and it is my job to
fight for district 26.

I'm not going to argue that the
world is flat.

That is what I'm going to do
for my people.

I am @#not viewing my "no" vote
as a negative.

I view this as a "no" vote
because you say it is not
about the money.

The last annexation cost of
just about \$42,000.

That was a little while back.
Not too long ago.
The argument there was, it is
only \$42,000.
And now it is only 4200.
At the end of the day, every
time we take dollars off of our
tax rules, there is
implications.
And those dollars will add up.
It is like the straw that broke
the camels back.
At some point, financially,
there is going to be a
reckoning for these simple
choices. \$
they are civil today.
But in the long haul, they will
have large ramifications.
We have dealt with this in the
past.
Argued over tax increases and
budget cuts.
We are living in good times
right now.
But, the forecast is not great,
and we will, in the very near \$
future, be faced with more cuts.
And the more we move tax
dollars off, those cuts are
going to come from other areas.
Let's face it.
The people who benefit from
annexation and house bill 314
live in the areas that can
afford to do this.
I represent both wealthy and
middle income.\$
I don't really represent a
whole lot of low income.
But, I know this -- the choice
that I make today about whether
I am a "yes" vote, the folks
that are hurt here will not be
the lower income areas.
Their services will be cut even

further.

Plain and simple.

\$4200 is \$4200, @#if you add in everything else that we cut.

How often do we say here, do we listen to them come in and say, I need \$10,000 more to get this social program going.

You know?

Everything to st. Joseph's children's home, @#to other places.

They come in and tell us how they need extra money.

We don't have it.

We divvy up what little amount that we carve out.

At the end of the day, this is \$4200 that we do not have.

The more we give away, there will be even less dollars we have to potentially help out those organizations, and less dollars we will have @#to provide the essential services that are needed.

And because of that tonight, there might be only 12 homes, at \$4200, but I am a "no" vote.

Thank you, MR. PRESIDENT

>> thank you, COUNCILMAN.

>> thank you, MR. PRESIDENT.

This is the rare occasion that I agree @#with bot COUNCILMAN Fox and COUNCILWOMAN Ackerman simultaneously.

I agree with COUNCILWOMAN McCrane all the time.

But I want to clarify some facts.

The council is meeting tomorrow, as a @#matter of fact, to talk about this.

During the debate and passage of that bill, it was not talked in place that we would freeze

all conversations on existing law annexation.

It did give@# a very long timeline to the new suburban city development because we wanted to have a full throated discussion and analysis.

So, to say that we should wait because of this bill, I think misinterprets the intention.@# the other thing is, this conversation about cost.

Unfortunately, over and over again, we are only looking at one side of the income.

That is the revenue side.

We are never looking at the expense side.

Ems, for louisville,@# almost never goes to this area.

That is awarded by an additional tax for the suburban fire district.

And, suburban fire ems, to go into the urban service district.

At multiple times, a frequency that louisville @#ems is going to.

So, they are, arguably, getting double taxed for it because the city is doing such a tremendous job.

These cities, @#even in the \$4200 a month, or whatever that dollar amount is, I don't know the precise dimensions.

What, if we are repaving these roads once every 20 years, there is a cost to that that we have been bearing.

That we will now no longer bear in the city of saint matthews.@# and also all risks pertaining to that.

good, right?

That is the part that they need to take on if they are going to

take on the burden.

So, this is not a "we are burdening poor communities", because we are also subtracting the cost that these people are now paying for in a different manner.

Except now, @#that cost, we can reallocate to other needed communities.

More analysis will be coming after that house bill 14.

So, there is -- and then finally, I will say, COUNCILMAN Fox, because you are in a unique situation.

You have no suburban @#city thing.

Because one area of the city's disadvantage, does not mean that we should then say, well, to heck with everybody else.

We should fix the disadvantaged part @#that you have.

And this is exactly what house bill 314 attempts to do, and part of the analysis will be, to see about giving to this district and what it means.

The opportunity to have this, right?

So if it is this advantageous for your district to not have it, I hope you will @#join us in the analysis for house bill 314, and depending on what the analysis does yield, if you believe that suburban cities are for the rich and famous and only the wealthy, and it is this advantageous for your district to have it, then you should apply that @#concept to all districts in this community.

And I will say in that regard that the argument makes a bit

of sets.

we don't have that legislation,
currently.

Right?

Just because area a is being
disadvantaged, doesn't mean we
should not @#fix those.

Thank you, MR. PRESIDENT.

>> just a moment.

Thank you, COUNCILMAN.

>> thank you, MR. PRESIDENT.

First, I say to you, @#about the
service, there are no -- they
are hiring people for police
department, ems units,
dispatchers.

The second thing, I do have a
home rule city in my district.

Will you know what?

It is holly villa.

They are not up and @#coming,
either.

>> thank you, COUNCILMAN Reed?

>> thank you, MR. PRESIDENT.

I have 14 suburban cities.

And it has always been my
opinion that if one of these
cities wants to pay more for
better service, they should
have that opportunity.

And I will say that until@#
rezoning, I had two areas that
I wouldn't consider upper
income at all that are part of
counselor winkler's district.

I served that for six years.

They would always choose to pay
more for what they considered
to be better service.

But, @#to COUNCILMAN Ackerson's
point, I think we should look
at these on a case basis when
they com to us.

And in this case, we are
talking about \$4200.

So, I would encourage my

colleagues to vote for this.

Thank you.

>> thank you, and COUNCILWOMAN

McCrane? @#

>> thank you, for that.

>> I want to be very clear.

I am advocating, and fighting
hard for district seven.

But, I am a little fun fact
about house bill 314.

I am looking forward to the
conversation and all of the
findings that come out of that
committee.

So, until that time, I
certainly agree that it does
not preclude @#us from moving
forward as these requests come
for us.

So, house bill 314, that is a
whole different subject.

I am putting it over to the
side, and I am waiting for the
outcome of very smart people
who are on that task force to
do what is right @#by this city.

But, I can tell you that doing
right by this city will also
include the fact that,
unfortunately, Louisville metro
is unable to do what is right
by every resident.

In annexing with a small city
that offers those services is
not a bad thing.

For that reason, again, @# I do
ask for your support, and let's
continue to look at house bill
314, along with the committee
that has been formed.

Because there is devil in the
details.

But there is a lot of work for
us to be done to move this city
forward.

And I @#don't think that I want

to sit here today and say that
I am a huge proponent of
annexation.

But when it makes sense, it
makes sense.

And this particular ordinance
makes sense.

Thank you.

>> thank you, COUNCILWOMAN.

>> MR. PRESIDENT, MAY I direct
my comments to COUNCILMAN @#
hankerson?

>> you can direct your comments
to me, and respond to him.

>> cannot respond to COUNCILMAN

I have the utmost respect for
you,@# and our discussion that we
had in committee, was one of
the ones that convinced me the
way that I voted.

So, I totally understand where
you are coming from.

But, I just -- I understand
that she is also very
passionate about this.@#
so I just wanted to explain it.

Thank you, sir.

points that I was going to
make, relative to the cost side

conflicting.

I personally lived in a small city, and I tried a lot of benefit of living in a small city.

I think those who do live in small cities recognize the value that they play, and the fact that there is a trade-off, right?

They take the burden @#off of metro, ems doesn't provide services in our area, metro ems does not provide services in our area, we don't have to pave those roads, all of the points that were made.

The point that I really think is important -- because it gets wrapped up a lot in annexation of small @#cities -- is I think you can support annexation of small cities, and still be a staunch supporter of the merger.

Because I am a staunch supporter of the merger.

I think what concerns me is, when we talk about small cities, a lot of times, what gets wrapped up in that @# discussion is, "I don't want anything to do with louisville metro", that is not my problem. And I think that is the wrong approach.

I came from a city where we had suburban government, and we had urban government, and the folks in suburbia were constantly at odds with what was happening in the metro.@#

the problem was, they didn't have any say on what was going on in the metro.

I think that is one of the major benefits that you have.

Regardless of where you live in this community, you have a say on what happens in this city.

And I think it is important for all of us to remember that without the city of Louisville, there is no anchorage, there is no @#saint Matthews.

Those communities exist because the economic engine that the city of Louisville is.

And I think the other thing that is important to remember is that none of us live, work, play, exclusively within the boundaries of our neighborhood or small city. @#

but rather, services across the metro, right?

You drive to the USD, you work in the USD.

I think sometimes this is a little bit shortsighted. @#

c1

>> @#it gives us all a voice. I would advocate for a more regional approach.

Shelby County doesn't grow without Louisville.

Thank you. @#

>> thank you, MR. PRESIDENT.

I would disagree with you, sir.

I would disagree in the sense that your argument earlier lacks actual basis. @#

we talk about the road paving costs, that is 12 homes, \$4200.

There is no proof before us of what it will cost to pave this road.

On average, maybe 42,000?

That is 10 years. @#

if the road last 20 years, we just financially cut ourselves in half of what we could be having.

There is a letter from jeff brown. AUGUST 8th, 2022, second paragraph. The last sentence of the paragraph, the conditions of the road is considered @#good to very good.

We have recently spent -- if you tell me the road looks like crap, that argument might stand.

If you were to present to me what it will cost to repave that road, then that might be a viable argument.@#

just to say there is a cost savings, that does not give me the numbers and math to back it up.

The conditions of the road tell me more likely than not that we have already paved this, now we are giving away after we put the dollars in value back out.

I @#invite you to look at the letter, AUGUST 8th, to confirm the road conditions.

When we talk about cost savings, that we actually get the numbers before us so we have the facts and not just -- thank you MR. PRESIDENT.

MAY think you, COUNCILMAN.@#

>> thank you, MR. PRESIDENT.

The points that I was is going to make, if you look at the letter, they are 84, 85, and 90.

Nobody will be@# repaying this very quickly.

I will vote for this, it really gets to why I don't think this is a vote on how scott 314, our future annexation.

What I hate about 314, 866 of the people @#say we needed this, we didn't have to have this discussion.

I remember being on an annexation committee when I first came here.

Kelly and I, we were chairs of that committee.

We should have this kind of review for every one of these.

That is why I said, let's get this information.

Let us know what it is going to be and let's look at the whole situation.

We also know in this case, there is not more land to be developed.

If there is an annexation that has potential for a lot more houses with a lot more insurance loss, we need to analyze that.

We should be allowed to do it in every case.

That is why the document that we voted for and called for, that is what house bill 314 takes away from us.

I hope that has changed. There is an opportunity for this commission to look at that and I hope they look at that very clearly.

It is important to know that we would not be having this discussion if 66% of the people wanted this annexation.

I think that is wrong.

Even a much larger annexation.

I will vote for this.

I voted for other annexations.

I hope that people take the issues with house bill 314 seriously.

I am convinced the commission will do that.
