**PETITION AGAINST EXPANSION OF COMMERCIAL BOUNDARIES AND USES INTO THE  
NEIGHBORHOOD GENERAL RESIDENTIAL AREA OF OLD LOUISVILLE / LIMERICK.**

We the undersigned moved to Old Louisville/Limerick because of its architectural and historical characteristics. We have invested much time and many resources in our homes. We are part of a decades-long national trend of urban revitalization and historic preservation. We believe the Traditional Neighborhood Zoning of Old Louisville /Limerick has added to the success of this revitalization and serves to protect the investment in our homes.

We the undersigned are *not opposed* to increasing the list of permitted commercial uses within the existing commercially mapped areas of our zoning district as approved by the Old Louisville Neighborhood Council after extensive discussion and debate. However, we *are opposed* to the newly proposed expansion of commercial boundaries and commercial uses into areas currently zoned residential. This proposed expansion has occurred without neighborhood input or discussion. It threatens the ongoing residential revitalization and preservation efforts, which is one of the primary successes of the Traditional Neighborhood Zoning.

Specifically we object to and call for the elimination of the following from the Area-Wide Re-Zoning as recommended by the Metro Planning Staff:

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2. The intrusion of offices into the Neighborhood General component by means of the Office Use Conditional, an area which is overwhelmingly composed of intact historic residential homes, an action which would threaten the preservation work done in the area over the past four decades.
3. The permitting of Live/Work units in the Neighborhood General component. This use allows as much as 50% of a residential building floor area to be used for an extensive list of commercial/office uses including retail sales; The only residential requirement is that at least one person shall live in the building; this person can be renter or owner. Such use subverts the Traditional Neighborhood Zoning.
