MISSION

Bridge Kids International, Inc, (BKI) is a Louisville-based global non-profit organization helping young people of Africa and the African Diaspora (African-Americans, Africans, Caribbeans, etc.), aged 13-30, unleash their social entrepreneurial spirits to solve economic development, education, environmental, girls' rights, and health challenges and build sustainable communities. BKI links young people for the purposes of friendship, cooperation, and individual and community empowerment and uses the power of African heritage culture to create communities that support the well-being of young people of the African Diaspora.

VISION

Bridge Kids International believes that young people of Africa and the African Diaspora have within them the genius and capacity to solve challenges in their lives and communities. We link young leaders from Africa and the African Diaspora, creating a dynamic global community based on real work, a sound understanding of the interconnectedness of issues and people, a genuine concern for and curiosity about each other, and a deep recognition that young people - when provided with resources and given the chance- have the ability to create lasting change.

Through Bridge Kids, young people from large urban centers to remote rural villages gain access to the world. They join a network of budding social entrepreneurs who tap into their own creativity to create smart solutions to real challenges. By helping young people improve their lives and home communities, learn about global issues, and travel internationally, the organization gives them a mechanism to exercise their leadership, access their human rights, and expand their worldview while making real friends across the globe. Bridge Kids has a multiplier effect; we impact young people and they impact others in their communities. As the small scale actions of many inspired people coalesce into a wave of transformation, the possibilities for change become limitless.

SERVICES

BKI operates from a belief that the interaction between culture, community, and connection leads to healing, restoration, and the evolution of individuals and communities. BKI organizes and supports BKI Groups comprised of young people ages 13-30 who design and implement projects to transform their lives and communities. There are currently BKI Groups in Congo, Ghana, Haiti, Malawi, Rwanda, Senegal and the USA (Louisville).

In Louisville, Bridge Kids International is establishing its global headquarters Our Place at Ben Washer Park (OPBWP) by turning a deteriorating building in Ben Washer Park into a unique community gathering place centered around youth social entrepreneurship, global citizenship, intergenerational relationships, and sustainable living. At the heart of Our Place at Ben Washer Park will be the Think Lab. Housed on the second floor, the ThinkLab will be a multifunctional workspace that will provide opportunities and resources for education and skill building. ThinkLab programs will inspire and activate young people to use their creativity and talents to solve challenges in their own lives and their community. Program areas include project development, entrepreneurial development, creative thinking, financial wellbeing, STEM and design & fabrication. BKI has already launched creative thinking, STEM and We Made It, a design & fabrication initiative.

Among BKI's initiatives in the city are the annual African Heritage Festival, YAMAH (Young Adult Mothers of African Heritage), The Gathering Table intergenerational program for women, Seven Generations African Heritage Culture Camp, and Mending the Bridge, an initiative to strengthen relationships between African-Americans and African nationals in the city. Additionally, Bridge Kids was one of the partner organizations that established Roots & Wings, a unique theatre project integrating art, poetry, dance, music and performance as catalysts for restoration of self and community. Also in Louisville, Finally, Bridge Kids Louisville, the youth group, has launched First Friends Louisville, a young people-to-young people project to welcome newly arrived refugees, aged 14-25, by visiting them at their homes and presenting them with a bag of fun and useful items. Bridge Kids Louisville is in the process of establishing new projects in the city.

Bridge Kids International is requesting funds to assist with Phase 1 of the Our Place at Ben Washer Park project. The funds would be used for structural engineering to determine the possibility for adding a basement storage area for the building.

Bridge Kids International is establishing its global headquarters in Louisville by turning a deteriorating building in Ben Washer Park into a unique community gathering place centered around youth social entrepreneurship, global citizenship, intergenerational relationships, and sustainable living. Young people are at the heart of Our Place at Ben Washer Park. The programs and activities of Bridge Kids and partners challenge youth and young adults to develop their own solutions to community problems that impact their lives.

Our Place at Ben Washer Park is designed to capture the imagination and be a physical manifestation of creative thinking. A green renovation will include a solar pavilion that powers the building and other smart approaches to energy and sustainable resource use. A global breakfast and lunch café, which will provide revenue to run the nonprofit, will feature traditional dishes and a weekly rotating menu of international cuisine prepared by chefs from Louisville's growing immigrant communities. The space will host community events, including those that connect young people to the senior citizens who live in the housing facilities in the area.

Bridge Kids International and partners have completed 80% of Phase 1. Abatement, roof repair and the majority of the design development process are complete. The advice of the structural engineer is needed to finalize design

NDF funding will be used for Phase 1 of the Ben Washer Park building renovation. In particular, funds will be used to engage a structural engineer to examine the foundation of the building, determine if it is possible to add a basement, prepare structural construction documents for the project.

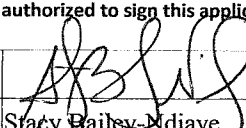

Our Place at Ben Washer Park



Bridge Kids International, Inc. in collaboration with Metro Parks, the Limerick Association for Neighborhood Development, Inc., West St. Catherine Neighborhood Association, Inc., CityThink, Inc., and YouthBuild Louisville is proposing to renovate the building in Ben Washer Park. In addition to serving as the U.S. headquarters of Bridge Kids International, the building will house programs related to social entrepreneurship for youth and young adults, intergenerational activities, and global citizenship. *Our Place* will also serve as a model sustainable, high performance, healthy building.

About *Our Place* at Ben Washer Park

Our Place at Ben Washer Park, Bridge Kids International’s global headquarters, transforms a deteriorating building in an underutilized pocket park into a unique community gathering place centered around youth social entrepreneurship, global citizenship, intergenerational relationships, and sustainable living. Young people are at the center of *Our Place* at Ben Washer Park and the project establishes a home for a Think Lab where youth and young adults develop their own solutions to challenges in their lives and communities. In keeping with Bridge Kids International’s values of self-sufficiency and sustainability, two social enterprises – *Our Place* Café and the *Our Place* Discovery Shop – will help fund the operations of the building and programs provided there. Bridge Kids is seeking platinum Well Building certification, fully embracing the standards that will guide the renovation and how we “live” and work in the building.

ThinkLab

At the heart of *Our Place* at Ben Washer Park will be the Think Lab. Housed on the second floor, the ThinkLab will be a multifunctional workspace that will provide opportunities and resources for education and skill building. ThinkLab programs will inspire and activate young people to use their creativity and talents to solve challenges in their own lives and their community.

Designed in partnership with CityThink (a local nonprofit that specializes in teaching the crafts of service leadership, financial literacy, and social entrepreneurship to urban youth), the lab will feature the equipment, technology and, human and material resources that youth and young adults need to flex their social entrepreneurial muscles. ThinkLab programming will help young people be better prepared for higher education, career and life. From creating their own products, to starting a business, to designing an innovative approach to a community problem, the ThinkLab will help young people develop and implement their projects. The ThinkLab will also connect senior citizens to technology, providing excellent opportunities for intergenerational activities with two-way learning. In addition, The ThinkLab will offer workshops and training sessions on financial health and community development to members of all ages. The Think Lab will serve as a hub of engagement for community members to learn, try, create, develop and seek guidance and resources to achieve transformational goals. Think Lab Program Areas include Project Development, Entrepreneurial Development, Creative Thinking, Financial Wellbeing, STEM and Design & Fabrication.

Our Place Cafe

Our Place Café will offer breakfast and lunch featuring a menu of familiar favorites with a twist, coffee, tea and healthy drinks. The café is committed to providing healthy food made with fresh and locally sourced ingredients. Daily specials prepared in partnership with chefs from Louisville’s growing immigrant communities will give the café its international theme. Partner chefs change weekly resulting in a rotating menu of international cuisine, i.e., Somali specials one week and Cuban dishes the next. These special partnerships give chefs who do not have their own restaurants a unique opportunity to showcase their talents.

BKI has deemed the certified kitchen supporting the cafe a “laboratory kitchen” where innovation will be the goal -trying new flavors and combinations and allowing customers to participate in regular taste tests and even create their own flavors. In keeping with the laboratory theme, Our Place Café will home to Nice Cream, a liquid nitrogen ice cream business owned by staff member and BKI alum Jerald Smith. Furthermore, our laboratory kitchen will feature an essential oil distillation system allowing us to make our own extracts from a wide variety of sources to serve the café and Nice Cream. Vertical, rooftop and deck gardens will provide herbs that will be used fresh and preserved.

Discovery Shop

Just as the café invites customers to expand their culinary horizons, the Our Place Discovery Shop will provide a taste of the wider world. The shop features items including jewelry, fabrics, handicrafts and products from countries where Bridge Kids operates and local Kentucky artisans of the African Diaspora. The Discovery Shop will also carry books by and about people of Africa and the African Diaspora, with a special focus on materials for children and youth.

Well Certification

In accordance with Bridge Kids International’s mission and values, *Our Place* will be renovated using advanced green building techniques. Under the leadership of sustainable designer/builder Sy Safi and architect Clive Pohl, the house will be revitalized as a model high performance, healthy building. The team has chosen the Well Building Standard as our goal and *Our Place* at Ben Washer Park will be one of the first buildings in Kentucky to achieve that certification. Well Building puts people at the center of design and has a rigorous set of features relating to air, water, light, nourishment, fitness, comfort and mind that impacts every area of *Our Place*, including the café menu. The holistic view of how space can relate to healthy lifestyles uniquely aligns with our vision for the project’s impact on individuals, families and the community. (<https://www.wellcertified.com/>). *Our Place* will be curated as an educational space allowing people to experience and interact with the Well Building features and green design. Well Building is compatible with LEED and Living Building Challenge and BKI could potentially seek either of those certifications in the future if resources are available.

The Renovation

Bridge Kids International has signed an option to lease the building at Ben Washer Park. The agreement is for a 10-year renewable lease for \$1 per year. Lead, asbestos, and mold abatement has been completed, and schematic designs are finished. Phase 1, which began November 2016, includes design, planning, and repairing the building's roof. Phase 2 includes renovations and occupancy of the building. Phase 3 will see the completion of our commercial kitchen and installation of the stair lift and Phase 4 will complete the solar pavilion. Bridge Kids' goal is to begin construction in the spring of 2018 and achieve occupancy by late 2018. Funding sources include Metro Council, foundations, in-kind contributions, and private donations. In keeping with our commitment to young people, YouthBuild Louisville will participate in the renovation of the building.

Background

Louisville's Ben Washer Park, located on North side of W Kentucky Street, between 5th and 6th Streets, has the potential to be a jewel in the Limerick neighborhood. The building, park, and playfield were gifted to the City of Louisville by noted attorney, judge, dean, civic leader, and philanthropist Ben F. Washer (1873-1963). Ben Washer Park was gifted to the City of Louisville to further the longstanding interest Washer held in youth and recreation. Today, with its vacant building, underutilized space, and uninspiring landscaping, the park is more often used as a place to loiter than a beacon for recreation. There is minimal playground equipment for children and seniors across the street at Christian Care Communities rarely use the park because it is perceived to be unsafe and unwelcoming. The building was built c. 1895 and was last used to serve the community in the form of a Metro Parks Better Home Service facility. Now having been vacant for more than 10 years, the structure is surprisingly sturdy. However, the façade is in disrepair and unless it is secured in the near future, has the potential to be a hazard to passersby. Like other vacant properties Louisville is struggling to address, if allowed to sit and further decline, the building in Ben Washer Park will become an eyesore and remain a blight to an otherwise rejuvenating area.

The Limerick neighborhood is rich in history, cultural diversity, and potential. Listed both on the National Register of Historic Places (NRHP: 1978, 1983) and made a Local Preservation District (1979), the neighborhood no doubt has historical significance. Interestingly, Limerick has had an impact on several diverse segments of Louisville's population -- from Irish, Jewish and African-American communities and beyond. In the late 1800s many Irish-Americans settled the area near the newly opened Louisville and Nashville (L&N) freight yard. Located within Limerick are two historic and significantly important African-American educational institutions. The Central Colored School, the first publically funded African-American school in the commonwealth of Kentucky (1873), is located just across the street from *Our Place* Ben Washer Park. Also, *Our Place* Ben Washer Park is just a block away from Simmons College of Kentucky (1879). Today, there are approximately 1,200 residents, of which about 65% are African American, 25% are White, and 2% are Hispanic (city-data.com). Bound by Park Hill, California, Old Louisville and the Central Business District (CBD), *Our Place* Ben Washer Park is within the SoBro (South of Broadway) district, a part of Louisville receiving much attention of late. With the impressive growth of both Spalding University and Simmons College figuratively hugging the neighborhood, Limerick is poised to become a unique cultural hub.

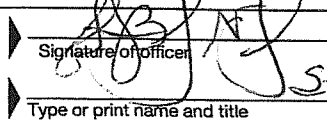

DESCRIPTION OF PROJECT (PHASE 1)

The project is a renovation/expansion (storage, new restaurant and café, and office space) consisting of existing multi-wythe masonry bearing walls with wood-framed floor and roof in Louisville, KY. Project is seeking to obtain “Well Certification”. Existing building is approximately 100 years old and has been abandoned for approximately 10 years. Foundations are assumed to be shallow foundations. If deep foundations are required, a re-negotiation of fees will be required. Per client request, eliminate underpinning in basement due to storage room.
