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
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PROGRAM OBJECTIVES

Project Title: Project Community Center Housing Program

Mission: Project Community Center Housing Program (P.C.C.H.P) decreases the percentage of homelessness in Louisville via community housing and supportive services.

Background: In the state of Kentucky, there is a significant increase in the number of residents who are experiencing homelessness. The demographics of these individuals include; veterans, individuals and families. Due to the current national health crisis, the number of resources available has decreased compared to when it first began.

The financial resources that were available at the start of the pandemic have dissipated over the last year. There is a need for more subsidy programs and transitional housing resources that can assist in the load of individuals and families who may have been struggling before the pandemic and now can not provide basic human needs such as water, food and shelter.

School and daycare closures have significantly impacted single family homes who do not have the support of extended family to assist with the care of dependents. This impacts job security which then decreases the amount of income single parents and individuals are bringing home. And Kentucky has been drastically impacted compared to surrounding states with larger populations.


Community Need

In the state of Kentucky, there is a significant increase in the number of residents who are experiencing homelessness. The Continuum of Care reports that, "as of January 2020, Kentucky had an estimated 4,011 residents experiencing homelessness on any given day. Of that, 277 were family households and 666 were individuals experiencing chronic homelessness"(United States Interagency (Council on Homelessness).

The number of homeless is disturbing compared to states that are adjacent to Kentucky. According to the world population review, in 2019 Kentucky's population was 617,790 and by January of 2020 4,011 of those residents are experiencing houselessness (World Population Review). In comparison to West Virginia who in 2019 had a population of 1.792 million people with only 1,341 residents. There are more people living in West Virginia yet Kentucky has a little over three times more residents experiencing homelessness.

Community Need

Homelessness is a significant issue for the youth living in Kentucky. "Public school data reported to the U.S. Department of Education during 2018-2019 that an estimated 24,177 public school students experienced homelessness over the course of a year" (United States Interagency Council on Homelessness).



Program Design/ Logic Model

Situation

In the state of Kentucky, there is a significant number of residents experiencing homelessness. The resources available now are limited and ineffective. There is a need for more effective resources that address the issue of long term stability for individuals and families.

Priorities

The Project Community Center (P.C.C.) The Housing Program offers a subsidy to individuals and families for up to 2 years.

Program Design/ Logic Model

Admission Process

- Residents apply online or in person for PCCHP.
- Applicants must show proof of earning \$25,000 or below/year.
- Partnerships with The Buttafly Center to assist residents in completing applications.
- Qualified residents participate in introductory interview
- Residents participate in subsidy program orientation & develop a housing plan.
- Residents register for program workshops.
- Residents meet all housing plan expectations and receive a certificate of promotion.
- Residents and families complete the PCC Housing Program and are ready to transition to permanent housing.
