

### "We are the communities that we serve" "We do make dreams come true"

Mary Alyce Sweeney lived her life by two simple rules: Give back to the community and be a bridge over troubled waters to those in need. Following the example set by her Mother, Nancy Johnson-a foster grandmother, she provided food, shelter and advice to dozens of individuals. No matter how late the hour of need, you were always treated as the most important person in the world and whatever was told in confidence, to Mary Alyce, remained with her.

During a violent domestic incident, she suffered a tragic loss of her daughter, Cyndi Sweeney Brown, which sparked her to become an energetic crusader, for women, against domestic abuse. She and members of her family joined the Kentucky Voices for Crime Victims (KVCV) and she continued to work with KVCV until her health failed.

Mary Alyce built a family of strong self-sufficient adults, who have become community leaders and activists; and, continue her legacy through the establishment of the Mary Alyce Sweeney Foundation , Inc.

In addition to continuing the spirit of giving and making dreams come true by touching the lives of others through community service, care packages, domestic abuse services and outreach, the Foundation works to support our ethnically diverse community in educational and social needs.

Some of the Foundation's 2017 accomplishments were:

- "Making Dreams Come True" Provided prom dresses and accessories; and, assisted in procuring tuxedos for graduating seniors and juniors attending the prom
- Provided Mother's Day Care packages to a shelter for women and children

- Raised funds to assist in providing blankets for Hurricane Harvey victims
- Provided care packages to homeless persons living on our streets and under bridges
- Provided Christmas Care packages to homeless, which included personal care items, hats, gloves, blankets, socks and snack items.

Donations and monies raised are essential to the Foundation's mission of supporting our young adults attending college, assisting homeless children and families; and, addressing domestic violence and drug abuse.
