





- **Improvements were recorded in ALL areas** (level of understanding of violence, likelihood to take action to help prevent violence, likelihood to engage in violence prevention work, skill level to develop a plan of action to prevent violence, knowledge levels in content areas) by participants and **this was statistically significant.**
- **Trainings have occurred throughout the community** at Neighborhood Places, churches, community centers, universities, business headquarters, and more
- **Zip code data was collected for 225 participants.** The five highest zip codes of where participants reside are: **40211, 40203, 40208, 40210, and 40218**

“As a Chicago native, my family and I moved to Louisville in 2015. I wanted to learn more about Louisville and how I could be more involved. In 2016, my first year of graduate school at Spalding University, I reached out to a professor who connected me with Rashaad Abdur-Rahman. I shared with Rashaad my background and desires to be a community organizer. Rashaad suggested I get involved in the One Love Louisville Ambassador Program. I gained knowledge and tools to eradicate youth violence through a community organizer approach. Since then I have met some amazing people and granted the opportunity to be an active and thriving member of Metro Louisville.”

“The OSHN-sponsored MHFA training by FCP's PAL Coalition last summer came in handy.

I dealt with a suicidal neighborhood friend last Thursday night. She was speaking after-the-fact, so wasn't an immediate threat.

But I was able to listen with compassion, give her a Bible (per her request via a mutual friend who has since moved to Boston, namely, the former president of our neighborhood association), etc. Thankfully, there was another neighbor present during the intense conversation; she also was helpful as a concerned listener even though it was her first time meeting her.

Long story, she seems to be doing better after some serious suicidal thoughts in recent weeks/months.



COMMUNITY OUTREACH & ENGAGEMENT



- OSHN conducts outreach in Louisville neighborhoods to raise awareness of violence prevention efforts through our office, help individuals and families connect to resources and supports that **reduce violence and promote peace**. This is done through the following activities: community walks, tabling at community events, meeting with citizens, responding to incidents of violence, and more.
- Results/Deliverables:
 - **774** people engaged
 - **52 referrals** made to employment, housing, education, and mental health services
 - Distributed **700 One Love Louisville Cards**; **700** One Love Louisville Youth Resource Cards; **700** Ambassador Brochures; **175** Kentucky Fund for the Arts Cultural Passes
 - **6 community walks**
 - **10 Community Responses** to shooting/homicide
 - Mental Health Catalogue Distributed
 - Survivor Support Group meeting held with the Mayor in March
 - **75 Community Meetings and Events Attended**
 - Shawnee Arts and Cultural Center hours **every Monday and Friday** held to build rapport with residents and connect to resources through OSHN partnerships

THRIVE FELLOWSHIP



- The THRIVE Fellowship is a privately funded **community leadership/civic engagement initiative** designed in partnership with Cities United, an organization created by mayors across the U.S. to stop the loss of life due to violence. It is funded by the William R. Kenan Jr. Charitable Trust, **\$1.2 million** over 3 years. THRIVE Fellowships will be **offered to men between the ages of 22 and 26** with misdemeanor convictions resulting from current or previous involvement with the criminal justice system.
- Results/Deliverables:
 - Fellows have completed **52 sessions of HEAT** program.
 - Fellows have attended **30 Leadership Sessions**.
 - **Over 20** community and volunteer events attended and participated in.
 - Successfully completed **4 month internships** in departments such as Public Health and Louisville Forward.

TRAUMA RESILIENT COMMUNITY INITIATIVE

SAMHSA funded 5 year initiative to promote resilience and equity for Louisville's youth and families disproportionately affected by trauma, systemic inequities, violence and civil unrest. **\$5 million** over 5 years

LOUISVILLE – THE EPICENTER OF BLACK MALE ACHIEVEMENT




Cities United: Cities United is a national coalition of cities and mayors who are working to develop comprehensive violence reduction strategies to reduce the number of black men and boys who are the victims of shootings and homicides.



Rumble Young Man Rumble: This is a national convening hosted in Louisville every year by the Campaign for Black Male Achievement (CBMA).



BMe Genius Fellows: BMe Community is a network of innovators, leaders, and champions who invest in aspiring communities.



My Brother's Keeper: President Obama launched My Brother's Keeper in February 2014 to address persistent opportunity gaps facing boys and young men of color and to ensure all youth can reach their full potential.



BMA Roundtable: Convened by Metro United Way, the BMA roundtable is a collective space where cross sector partners can identify key focus areas and strategize together to promote adoption of asset-based narratives and advance results for BYMOC through policy, practice, resources, etc
