
6,909 total youth were employed at SummerWorks Champion Employers

### THE DATA SAYS SUMMERWORKS IS CRITICAL

New study confirms impact of Louisville's youth summer jobs program

In August 2019, the results of a new SummerWorks study commissioned by KentuckianaWorks and conducted by the Kentucky Center for Statistics (KYSTATS) were released.

The study was designed to measure the long-term impact of SummerWorks on youth who have been directly placed with the program's champion employers.

## **KEY FINDINGS**

- SummerWorks participants are more likely to graduate from high school than non-participants.
- SummerWorks participants are more likely to enroll and stay enrolled in post-secondary institutions than non-participants.
- SummerWorks participants are more likely to be employed and stay employed after high school graduation than non-participants.
- SummerWorks has been very effective in building ties with local area employers who overall, are very happy with the program.

We also know from a recent Brookings Institution study that **kids with summer jobs** had **35% fewer charges** for violent crimes, and **57% less** for property crimes.
