

Cost Estimates - Revising NDF Application & Other Documents

Per my discussion with OMB Grant Compliance relating to questionable receipts: 1. Renewable Properties Cost Estimate

OMB Grants Compliance will not accept the Renewable Properties cost estimate price of \$60,000 since it is determined by contingencies which could go either way. OMB Grants Compliance will disburse for the initial estimate and if unknown expenses or services occur then those would be handled as an reimbursement. Therefore, the Renewable Properties \$47,785.00 Total Cash Price recorded on the cost estimate will be acceptable for this quote and the \$60,000 contingencies note will be disregard. The NDF applicant does not need to obtain another cost estimate. However, the amounts and totals throughout the NDF Application and Packet will need to be revised to reflect the Renewable Properties cost estimate as \$47,785.00.

SECTION 3 + AGENCY DETAILS

Describe Agency's Vision, Mission and Services:

VISION: A connected, well-maintained equine trail system that supports recreational and competitive trail riding in Louisville and surrounding counties.

MISSION: To protect and expand equine trails that enrich the health of people, horses, land and the economy of Louisville and surrounding counties.

SERVICES: Equine Trail Advocates (ETA) is a nonprofit, all volunteer group that organizes equine clinics, workshops, youth programs and competitions each year that are open to the public and benefit the community. Services include 1) educating equestrians and the public on topics such as sustainable trail use and management, trail etiquette for shared use trails and equine safety and health topics; 2) providing youth an opportunity to experience horses, teaching them safety, how to groom and care for horses and how to ride; and 3) conducting fun, family-oriented equestrian events and competitions to give equestrians of all ages and experience levels an opportunity to improve their fitness, meet new friends and develop their equestrian skills.

In coordination with Louisville Parks and Recreation, Olmsted Parks Conservancy and other land managers, ETA organizes several volunteer workdays each year to clear, maintain and improve equestrian/hiking trails, and repair equestrian facilities. In 2021 ETA volunteers worked 287 hours valued at \$10,990 (per Independent Sector) in Louisville's Metro Parks. We also raised and donated \$5,800 to improve equestrian facilities in Iroquois. Most of the volunteer work was in Iroquois, but volunteers also worked on equestrian/hiking trails in McNeely Lake Park and Jefferson Memorial Forest. Work included trail maintenance at all three parks and at Iroquois work included replacing a dangerous cable fence with a board fence along the trail at the golf course, installation of a french drain at the round pen to improve drainage, repairs to fencing and gates, spreading gravel and filling holes on the access road, dragging the arena, clearing a clogged culvert near the golf course, repairing and painting the stable bathrooms, picking up trash, lopping and weed-eating.

In 2021 ETA also conducted a Youth Horse program in conjunction with the Backside Learning Center (resource program for track workers and families at Churchill Downs) and the Buffalo Soldiers Youth Academy (which teaches youth about the history of Black horsemanship and increases opportunities for Black youth to experience horses). ETA volunteers provided horses and taught horsemanship skills to give these young people an opportunity to meet, learn about and ride horses in a safe and fun setting at Iroquois Park. ETA plans to hold several fundraising events over the next couple of years to show our commitment to improving, using and promoting the Iroquois equestrian facilities. The first of these events was held in September 2022 and involved 165 hours of volunteer time valued at \$5,164. Forty-three of those hours consisted of bush-hogging tall weeds behind the arena, mowing the grass around the arena and stable, trimming and hand-pulling weeds in the arena, weed-eating aroud fence lines and bollards, dragging the arena, cleaning stable bathrooms, picking up trash and other tasks. This event netted \$534 which is part of ETA's contribution to this project.

A: Describe the program/project start and end dates, a description of the program/project and applicable data with regards to specific client population the program will address (attach related flyers, planning minutes, designs, event permits, proposals for services/goods, etc.):

The Equestrian Area and facilities at Iroquos Park have suffered from deferred maintenance for many years. As a result, major repairs are needed and are at a critical point where, if not completed in the near future some of the facilities will be beyond repair. For example, roof replacment estimates for the stable from 2021 were in the \$40,000 range. Estimates by the same contractors in 2022 are in the \$50,000 range. Prices for materials and labor will only increase and, if left unrepaired, will likely increase exponentially as damage spreads from the roof to the supporting structure itself. We believe the current roof is likely the original roof and, if so, it is nearly 50 years old.

FUNDING REQUESTED FOR THE FOLLOWING IMPROVEMENTS:

- Stable roof replacment \$60,000
- Arena and round pen fencing replacement \$17,579
- Construction of mounting blocks \$705
- Construction of training bridge \$237
- Purchase and installation of Bleachers \$2,181

B: Describe specifically how the funding will be spent including identification of funding to sub grantee(s): ETA is willing to manage the NDF funds for any of the improvements in order to pay contractors/vendors for work performed or items purchased, and/or to purchase materials for volunteers to use to execute work for this project.

ETA has informed Louisville Parks and Recreation and Olmsted Parks Conservancy of the proposed work contained in this project. We will continue to work closely with them on all aspects of the project and will ensure the work is done in a timely way and in a manner that is acceptable to Louisville Parks and Recreation, Olmsted Parks Conservancy and Equine Trail Advocates. There will be no sub-grantees, but we will be working with contractors who will need to be paid.

Proposed Improvements:

- 1) Stable roof replacment, new gutters and gutter board as well as replacement of any rotten wood or support structures found when shingles are removed. The roof has a large hole and several other leaks. Gutters and gutterboards are detached from the building and in poor shape.
- 2) Arena and round pen fencing replacement and paint. Although ETA volunteers have made many temporary repa amd replaced missing and warped boards in recent years, the wood is rotting and in poor shape. It is time for a full replacement and paint job to extend the life of the new fencing.
- 3) Mounting blocks are needed for safety and accessibility. Many equestrians need or prefer to use a mounting block to safely mount their horses. A permanent mounting block is needed at the arena and two smaller, more portable blocks are needed along the trail for the safety of riders who must dismount to adjust equipment, retrieve a dropped item or assist another rider. ETA will work with Parks to site the permanent block so it works with

E: Describe the program's benefits to those being served (measurable outcomes). Include the program's process for collecting data and the indicators that will be tracked to measure the benefits to those being served:

Funding will be used primarily to correct the deferred maintenance of the facilities in the Equestrian Area and to improve safety of riders, horses and the community members who use the area. If repairs are not made in the near future, these facilities will continue to deteriorate and the assets will be lost to the equestrian community, park users and taxpayers. The area will continue to decline and become more attractive to people involved in criminal and unsafe behaviors.

If the stable roof and other repairs are made, the whole Equestrian Area could have a new life as a facility for short-term, one to three-day events such as organized trail rides, clinics and competitions. Louisville Parks and Recreation could charge a reasonable fee for use of the stable and arena for special events that would help pay for expenses such as utilities and reoutine maintenance. The stable has restrooms, shade and shelter which are all important amenities for such events.

ETA conducts trail competitons and similar events that help raise money to fund improvements to the area. The use of the stable makes those events more successful. We believe that other orgaizations such as 4-H, Scouts working on Horsemanship badges, and other equestrian groups that have used the facilities in the past would return and welcome the equestrian facilities for their short-term programs as well. In addition to weekend events, the stable eould prove a home base for programs such as youth day camps, similar to the one ETA held there in 2021, as well as riding instruction programs that could be on-going throughout the year.

ETA is an Iroquois Park Adoption Partner with the Olmsted Parks Conservancy and Louisville Parks and Recreation (agreement signed in February 2021). ETA collaborates with the LPR and the Conservancy on all trail work days hosted by ETA and all projects proposed by ETA in the park, including the projects defined in this document. ETA also works with Louisville Parks and Recreation staff in various ways including communication about maintenance issues, permitting for events, and community relations.

ETA also collaborates with the Buffalo Soldiers Youth Academy on programming with Black youth and teaching history and horsemanship at Iroquois Park and elsewhere. The Buffalo Soldiers group has used Iroquois Park equestrian facilities and other parks for their programming and has expressed interest in holding programming in Iroquois Park again in the future.

ETA members also attend meetings of the Friends of Iroquois Park to coordinate with other park users on safety and park stewardship issues.

Section 3 – Agency Details

Describe Agency's Vision, Mission and Services:

VISION: A connected, well-maintained equine trail system that supports recreational and competitive trail riding in Louisville and surrounding counties.

MISSION: To protect and expand equine trails that enrich the health of people, horses, land and the economy of Louisville and surrounding counties.

SERVICES: Equine Trail Advocates (ETA) is a nonprofit, all-volunteer group that organizes equine clinics, workshops, youth programs and competitions each year that are open to the public and benefit the community. The purpose of these services range from 1) educating equestrians and the public on topics such as sustainable trail use and management (e.g., Leave No Trace), trail etiquette for use of shared trails, and equine safety & health topics; 2) providing youth an opportunity to experience horses, teaching them safety, how to groom and care for horses and how to ride; and 3) conducting fun, family-oriented equestrian events and competitions to give equestrians of all ages and experience levels an opportunity to improve their fitness, meet new friends and develop their equestrian skills.

In coordination with Louisville Parks and Recreation, Olmsted Parks Conservancy and other land managers, ETA also organizes multiple volunteer workdays each year to clear, maintain and improve multi-use trails; repair equestrian facilities; and improve equestrian trailheads to provide safe, accessible trails and facilities for public use. In 2021, ETA's contribution to Louisville's Metro Parks was valued at \$16,853 41.

-ETA volunteers worked 287.5 hours in Louisville's Metro Parks, valued at \$10,990 (per Independent Sector). Nearly 80 percent of those hours were worked at Iroquois Park where volunteers brought in heavy equipment and skilled equipment operators to make significant repairs to the Main Trail (a shared equestrian and hiking trail); and the access road, arena, and round pen at the Equestrian Trailhead Area as well as repairing and painting the bathrooms inside the stable. (In addition to Iroquois Park, ETA also conducts trail workdays to improve the equestrian trails in McNeely Lake Park and Jefferson Memorial Forest.)

-In 2021 ETA also fully funded and managed the replacement of the old and dangerous cable fence in Iroquois Park between the Main Trail and Iroquois Golf Course, which cost \$5,643. The new board fence makes that area safer and more attractive for trail users and golfers alike.

-ETA also funded miscellaneous supplies such as \$220 for materials to clean, repair and paint the bathrooms in the stable, making them usable for special events. Other donations from ETA volunteers included materials for and installation of a french drain at the round pen to correct the ponding that had rendered it unusable, as well as hardware and tools for replacing missing and warped fence boards, rehanging fallen gates, regularly using a drag for the arena so the sand surface is smooth and safe for horses and riders.

ETA conducted a Youth Horse program in 2021 in conjunction with the Backside Learning Center (resource program for track workers and families at Churchill Downs) and the Buffalo Soldiers Youth Academy (which teaches youth about the history of Black horsemanship and increases opportunities for Black youth to experience horses). ETA volunteers provided horses and taught horsemanship skills as part of an educational program to give young people an opportunity to meet, learn about and ride horses in a safe and fun setting. The program was funded with a grant from the Davis Peace Foundation (For more about the Youth Program cut and paste this link: https://www.equinetrailadvocates.org/upcoming-events-1)

We would like to continue to support additional youth equestrian programming at Iroquois as there is a huge demand for free or low cost horse-related programs for those youth who don't have resources to take private lessons at stables that are often located many miles from their homes. Iroquois is an ideal location as it is centrally located and accessible for most residents of Louisville. The current condition of the stable is not, however, safe or really usable for most programming until repairs and basic improvements are made. The structure itself appears to be sound, however, a large hole (and several smaller holes) in the roof threatens the integrity of the whole building if not addressed soon.

If the stable roof is replaced and other repairs are made, the stable could have a new life as a facility to support short-term, one to three- day events such as organized trail rides, clinics, and competitions. Louisville Parks and Recreation could charge a reasonable fee for use of the facility and that would help pay for expenses such as utilities and routine maintenance. The facility has restrooms, shade and shelter which are important amenities for such events.

ETA conducts trail competitions, fundraisers and similar events that raise money to help fund the improvements like those described above. Access to the stable makes those events more successful. We believe other organizations such as 4-H, Scouts working on Horsemanship badges, and other equestrian groups that have used the Iroquois Equestrian facilities in the past would return and welcome the equestrian facilities for their short-term programs as well. In addition to weekend events, the stable could provide a home base for somewhat longer-term programs such as youth day camps, similar to the one held there in 2021, and regular riding instruction programs.

ETA plans to hold several fundraisers over the next couple of years to show our commitment to improving, using and promoting the Iroquois equestrian facilities. The first event of this fundraising series, a Scavenger Hunt, was held in early September 2022 and raised nearly \$535 and involved 165 hours of volunteer time valued at \$6,164. Forty-three of those hours consisted of volunteers who bush hogged and mowed the grass, trimmed and hand pulled weeds from the arena, lopped saplings, trimmed around bollards and fencing, used a drag to prepare the arena, cleaned the stable bathrooms, picked up trash and other tasks to ensure that the area looked neat and inviting for participants of the event.

ETA has a list of repairs/improvements badly needed in the Equestrian Area of Iroquois Park, which has suffered from deferred maintenance for years. That list includes replacing the roof on the stable; rebuilding the arena and round pen which are not cost effective to repair; painting the fence around the arena and round pen to extend the life of the new fencing; adding bleachers, replacing the rocking bridge in the arena that is no longer repairable; and procuring or constructing equestrian mounting blocks to be placed at the trailhead and a few along the Main Trail. Based on estimates gathered,

funding needed for these repairs and improvements totals \$80,702. This NDF grant is requested to execute this major repair project.

One additional note: The Iroquois Park Stable was designed by Jasper Ward who is considered by many to be the architect who introduced Modernism to Louisville. His catalog of works in Louisville is huge, and he made a significant mark on our city's built environment and history. He designed the stable in 1973, and it was built about a year later. We are approaching its 50th Birthday. What a great time for our city to commit to renewing this unique and significant resource and ensuring that it continues as a useful and celebrated part of our community's life!

Section 5 – PROGRAM/PROJECT NARRATIVE

A: Describe the program/project start and end dates, a description of the program/project and applicable data with regards to specific client population the program will address (attach related flyers, planning minutes, designs, event permits, proposals for services/goods, etc.)

The Equestrian Area and facilities at Iroquois Park have suffered from deferred maintenance for many years. As a result, major repairs are needed and are at a critical point were, if not done in the near future, facilities will be beyond repair. For example, roof replacement estimates from 2021 were in the \$40,000 range. Estimates by the same contractors in 2022 are in the \$50,000 range. Prices for materials and labor will only increase and, if left unrepaired, will likely increase exponentially as damage spreads from the roof to the supporting structure itself. We believe the current roof is likely the original roof and, if so, it is nearly 50 years old.

CLIENT POPULATION THE PROJECT WILL ADDRESS: The groups that will benefit from this project include the neighborhoods around the park, hikers, dog-walkers, joggers, local high school cross-country teams, law enforcement officers who use the area for training exercises, and equestrians who live near and/or use the Main Trail and Equestrian Area as well as equestrians who come from throughout Louisville and surrounding counties to use the arena, ride on the trails and participate in organized events including ETA competitions and fundraisers. In addition, repair and improvements to the facilities will allow additional programming for youth and all citizens from throughout Louisville to experience and learn about horses and horsemanship. Louisville has a long and rich history with horses that needs to be celebrated and protected.

ETA has been approached by multiple people from these groups who have said they no longer feel safe using these park areas. They voiced concern that the deterioration of the facilities and run-down appearance make the Equestrian Area look abandoned, which they fear will attract drug users/dealers and vandals and generally cause an increase in crime in the area. Their concerns are being validated. Hikers and riders have observed drug use on the trails. Discarded drug paraphernalia has been seen in the area. A homeless man has been sleeping in the area which has frightened park users and equestrians. Several ammunition casings have been found in the sand in the arena. Equestrian jumps and equipment have been vandalized. One of the stable doors has been broken into at least twice. Park users are reporting to us that prostitution solicitation is also occurring in this area of the park. Dirt bike riders are terrorizing hikers and equestrians on the trail, recently causing a child to be thrown to the ground by her horse when it was frightened by a group of dirt bike riders. These activities have reached a critical level since the LMPD Mounted Unit moved from the stable, but the lack of care of the facilities

and grounds surely creates an environment where those engaging in illegal and inappropriate behaviors feel more comfortable using this area.

Completion of this project will rejuvenate the appearance of the Equestrian Area so it no longer looks abandoned. This will discourage illegal activity and help the community and park users feel safer. Some years ago, when the equestrian facilities at Iroquois Park were in better condition, there were horse shows, clinics and other events held regularly by youth 4-H groups, trainers and the community. As the facility fell into disrepair and the lights were removed from the arena, its use declined too, as equestrians looked for better maintained options that seemed safer. Today ETA is working to reclaim the facilities for youth programs such as riding instruction and public events to encourage more users to return to this area, including instructors who help youth learn how to ride and prepare for shows and by youth and adult equestrians in the community who are improving their skills and/or practicing for competitions.

PROJECT START AND END DATES: This major project involves multiple contractors being hired and multiple purchases of materials/items. ETA estimates the project will start within 2 to 4 weeks of receipt of NDF funds and be completed within 6 to 8 months of the start date. The start/end dates are an estimate and may need to be extended depending on contractor lead times, procurement procedures, agency participation, etc.

ETA will work with Louisville Parks and Recreation and Olmsted Parks Conservancy to determine the most appropriate way to proceed with the project. We are willing to take the lead on any elements of the project listed below. We will ensure that the work is done in a timely way and in a manner that is acceptable to Louisville Parks and Recreation, Olmsted Parks Conservancy and Equine Trail Advocates.

DESCRIPTION OF PROJECT ELEMENTS:

- 1. Stable Roof Replacement. The roof on the stable is already beyond repair and has a large hole in it. The roof needs to be torn off and replaced to keep the interior of the barn from being further damaged by rain and snow that enters through the roof. New gutters, gutter boards and downspouts are also needed. The estimated cost is $\frac{$47,85}{60,000}$. Attached estimates show the basic cost in the range of \$50,000, but these estimates do not include unknown costs of replacing wood decking, bonding requirements, as well as other unknown factors that will likely drive up the cost from the basic estimate. Funding requested is $\frac{$47,785}{60,000}$.
- 2. Arena and Round Pen Fence Replacement. ETA volunteers made repairs to the arena and round pen in the spring of 2021; however, those were only temporary repairs. The wood fencing has reached the point where it is no longer cost effective to repair because there are so many missing, warped and weather-damaged boards. The new fence will need to be painted to protect it from the weather and extend the life of the fence. The estimated cost is \$17,579.
- 3. Training Bridge. The wooden, rocking bridge that equestrians use for training horses to safely negotiate trail obstacles has been part of the arena for years, but it must be replaced. It is rotted, broken and no longer safe to use. ETA has repaired this bridge several times; however, the main boards of the bridge have now deteriorated so badly it can no longer be repaired and is a safety hazard. The estimated cost is \$900 for labor and materials; however, ETA will provide the labor (\$646) and tools to construct the new training bridge, leaving only the materials to be funded at a cost of \$237.

- 4. Mounting Blocks. For safety and accessibility to the trail and arena, equestrian mounting blocks are needed at Iroquois Park—1 large mounting block (4-step) at the trailhead and 2 or 3 smaller ones (3-step) along the trail. Many equestrians need/use an elevated aid to safely mount their horse. Since there is not a mounting block at the equestrian trail head (nor anywhere else) at Iroquois Park, many riders use the picnic table near the arena to get on their horse at the trailhead. That is not the intended purpose of the picnic table and when people are sitting at the table it is not available for mounting. Two or three smaller mounting blocks are also needed along the main trail for the safety of riders who may need to dismount to adjust equipment, retrieve a dropped item or assist another rider. If a rider needs to dismount, they have no elevated aid to help them reach their stirrups to remount. Therefore, riders search for a fallen log or other random item along the trail to stand on to reach the stirrups. Use of such items can cause injuries due to slips and falls, especially if it is wet. The estimated cost is \$705.
- 5. Bleachers. A set of bleachers is needed near the arena at the Equestrian Area of Iroquois Park. Except for one small picnic table, there is no seating anywhere near the arena or at the equestrian trailhead. When parents/guardians bring children to practice in the arena, or when events are held, there is no place for spectators to sit and watch the activities going on in the arena. If they bring a folding chair, their line of sight is blocked by the board fencing. A set of bleachers would provide elevated seating so spectators can see over the fence. The estimated cost is \$2,181.

The total estimated cost of these repairs and improvements is: \$80,702. \$68,487.

If the stable roof and other repairs are made, the stable and whole Equestrian Area could have a new life as a facility for short-term, one to three- day events such as organized trail rides, clinics, and competitions. Louisville Parks and Recreation could charge a reasonable fee for use of the facility and that would help pay for expenses such as utilities and routine maintenance. The facility has restrooms, shade and shelter which are important amenities for such events.

ETA conducts trail competitions, fundraisers and similar events that raise money to help fund the improvements described above. The use of the stable makes those events more successful. We believe other organizations such as 4-H, Scouts working on Horsemanship badges, and other equestrian groups that have used the facility in the past would return and welcome the equestrian facilities for their short-term programs as well. In addition, to weekend events the stable could provide a home base for somewhat longer-term programs such as youth day camps, similar to the one ETA held there in 2021, as well as riding instruction programs that could be on-going throughout the year.

We are not asking for money to paint the exterior of the stable in this grant, but this is an upcoming need and ETA will be considering options for addressing this project in the near future.

E. Describe the program's benefits to those being served (measurable outcomes). Include the program's process for collecting data and the indicators that will be tracked to measure the benefits to those being served:

This grant will be used primarily to correct the deferred maintenance of facilities in the Equestrian Area of Iroquois Park, specifically the stable roof, the arena and the round pen. If these repairs are not done in the near future, these facilities will become beyond repair and will be assets lost to the equestrian community. Iroquois Park is the only public park/location in all of the Louisville Metro area that has

equestrian facilities of any type for the public to use. Many equestrians use the facilities to exercise and train their horses, practice prior to shows, hone their equestrian skills, and to help youth learn to ride and compete on their horses.

The groups that will benefit from this project include the neighborhood communities, hikers, joggers, local high school track teams, law enforcement officials/groups and equestrians who live near or use the Main Trail and/or Equestrian Area. ETA has been approached by multiple people from these groups who have said they no longer feel safe using these park areas. They voiced concern that the deterioration of the facilities and run down appearance make the Equestrian Area look abandoned, which they fear will attract drug users/dealers and vandals and generally cause an increase in crime in the area. Their concerns are being validated. Hikers and riders have observed drug use on the trails. Discarded drug paraphernalia has been seen in the area. We would also like to work with Louisville Parks and Recreation and/or Olmsted Parks Conservancy to determine a method of tracking public use of the equestrian area at Iroquois Park before and after repairs/improvements are made.

Articles of Incorporation OF

Equine Trail Advocates, Inc.

A Non-Profit Corporation Organized Under the Laws of the Commonwealth of Kentucky

The undersigned incorporator, a natural person 18 years of age or older, in order to form a corporate entity adopts the following articles of incorporation.

ARTICLE I: NAME/REGISTERED OFFICE

The name of this non-profit corporation shall be Equine Trail Advocates, 14411 Pauleys Gap Road, Louisville, KY 40272-1539.

ARTICLE II: PURPOSE

Mission: To protect and expand equine trails that enrich the health of people, horses, land and the economy of Louisville and surrounding counties.

Vision: A connected, well maintained equine trail system that supports recreational and competitive horseback riding in Louisville and surrounding counties.

Goals:

EDUCATION: Raise awareness of equestrian recreational and competitive trail riding as a sport that improves health and brings individuals and families together for outdoor fun and fitness. Promote the long history of horses in the Louisville area and improve access to horses for all people who want to learn more about them.

COLLABORATION: Develop relationships with land managers, user groups, equestrians, corporations and others, and form partnerships to ensure continuous and responsible use and maintenance of equine and all trails on public and private land.

ACCESS: Improve access to public and private land and trail systems including fair and reasonable access to the Louisville Loop. Increase connectivity between existing and future equestrian trails.

ARTICLE III: EXEMPTION REQUIREMENTS

At all times the organization shall operate under these conditions restricting the operations and activities of the corporation:

1. The corporation shall not afford pecuniary gain, incidentally or otherwise to its members. No part of the net earnings of this corporation shall inure to the benefit of any member of the corporation, except

that reasonable compensation may be paid for services rendered to or for the corporation affecting one or more of its purposes. Such net earnings, if any, of this corporation shall be used to carry out the nonprofit corporate purposes set forth in Article II above.

- 2. No substantial part of the activities of the corporation shall constitute the carrying on of propaganda or otherwise attempting to influence legislation, or any initiative or referendum before the public, and the corporation shall not participate in, or intervene in (including by publication or distribution of statements), any political campaign on behalf of, or in opposition to, any candidate for public office.
- 3. Notwithstanding any other provision of these articles, the corporation shall not carry on any other activities not permitted to be carried on by a corporation exempt from federal income tax under Section 501(c)(3) of the Internal Revenue Code of 1986, as now enacted or hereafter amended.

ARTICLE IV: DURATION The duration of the corporate existence shall be perpetual.

ARTICLE V: BOARD OF DIRECTORS

The corporation shall have members. The management of the affairs of the corporation shall be vested in a Board of Directors, as defined in the corporation's bylaws. No Director shall have any right, title, or interest in or to any property of the corporation. The number of Directors constituting the founding Board of Directors is seven (7), their names and addresses being as follows:

- Terri Burch, Director 6005 Ridge Road, Shepherdsville, KY 40165
- Elizabeth Rappaport, Director 315 Franck Avenue, Louisville, KY 40206
- Roxana Reed, Director 3722 Taylorsville Road, Shelbyville, KY 40065

Members of the founding Board of Directors shall serve up to three consecutive two-year terms. The Board shall consist of no less than seven (7) Directors. Directors shall be elected based on the process outlined in the approved Bylaws. Directors of this corporation are un-paid volunteers dedicated to achieving the mission of this organization.

ARTICLE VI: PERSONAL LIABILITY

No Officer or Director of this corporation shall be personally liable for the debts or obligations of this corporation of any nature whatsoever, nor shall any of the property of the Officer, or Directors be subject to the payment of the debts or obligations of this corporation. Directors, Officers, employees and all others acting on behalf of the non-profit corporation and vested with such responsibilities by the Directors are entitled to indemnification for any civil liability incurred by that person arising out of his or

her service on behalf of the nonprofit, other than proceedings brought by or in the name of the nonprofit (e.g., a derivative suit), if

- (1) the person conducted himself or herself in good faith, and
- (2) the person reasonably believed that (a) when acting in an official capacity, the conduct was in the best interests of the nonprofit, and (b) in all other cases, his or her conduct was at least not opposed to the nonprofit's best interests.

ARTICLE VII: DISSOLUTION

- 1. At the time of dissolution of the corporation, the Board of Directors shall, after paying or making provisions for the payment of all debts, obligations, liabilities, costs and expenses of the corporation, dispose of all of the assets of the corporation. In no case shall a disposition be made which would not qualify as a charitable contribution under Section 170(c)(1) or (2) of the Internal Revenue Code of 1986, as now enacted or hereafter amended, in such manner as the Board of Directors shall determine.
- 2. All intellectual property, including but not limited to patents, trademarks, copyrights and other items that may be considered intellectual property, developed or created by the non-profit shall be the sole property of the non-profit. Such intellectual property may be licensed and utilized in furtherance of the mission of the non-profit. Upon dissolution all such items constituting intellectual property that was developed or created by the non-profit shall be distributed in accordance with Article VII Section 1. Intellectual property in existence prior to the formation of the non-profit and owned and brought for research purposes to the non-profit by any of the directors shall remain the property of that director and be retained upon dissolution. All intellectual property in existence prior to the formation of the non-profit corporation shall be individually listed and catalogued to ensure proper distribution upon dissolution. 3. Royalties derived, obtained or in existence prior to the formation of the non-profit shall remain the property and financial interest solely of the Director or individual obtaining, deriving or generating the royalty beyond the dissolution of the non-profit and do not transfer or become the property or interest of any other Director, individual or other entity obtaining a transfer of the remaining assets of the non-profit.

ARTICLE VIII: CONFLICT OF INTERESTS

1. For purposes of this provision, the term "interest" shall include personal interest, interest as director, officer, member, stockholder, shareholder, partner, manager, trustee or beneficiary of any concern and having an immediate family member who holds such an interest in any concern. The term "concern" shall mean any corporation, association, trust, partnership, limited liability entity, firm, person or other entity other than the organization. No director or officer of the organization shall be disqualified from holding any office in the organization by reason of any interest in any concern. A director or officer of the organization shall not be disqualified from dealing, either as vendor, purchaser or otherwise, or contracting or entering into any other transaction with the organization or with any entity of which the organization is an affiliate. No transaction of the organization shall be voidable by reason of the fact that

any director or officer of the organization has an interest in the concern with which such transaction is entered into, provided:

- a. The interest of such officer or director is fully disclosed to the board of directors.
- b. No interested officer or director may vote or lobby on the matter or be counted in determining the existence of a quorum at the meeting at which such transaction may be authorized.
- c. Such transaction is duly approved by the board of directors who are not so interested or connected and as determined by them to be in the best interests of the organization.
- d. Payments to the interested officer or director are reasonable and do not exceed fair market value.
- 2. There are no expectations of services, favors, or financial gain created by any lease or sub-lease relationship entered into by the non-profit corporation with any other entity, organization or corporation regardless of any common directorial interests. Such contractual relationship does not and will not create any expectation of gain, services, materials or any other financial interest or remuneration as a result of the non-profit corporation taking a subordinate lease position.
- 3. The minutes of meetings at which such votes are taken shall record such disclosure, abstention, recusal, and rationale for approval.

ARTICLE IX: AMENDMENTS

Materials Needed to Build Horse Bridge

- $2-4\times4\times10$ posts
- $\sim 16 2 \times 4$'s (can't remember which) (stud length)
- Box of nails or screws
- Hammer or cordless drill.
- Hand saw or circular saw

Plans for Building a Horse Bridge

Materials Consideration

You need enough 2×4 's or 2×6 's to span the length of the 4×4 's at whatever width you desire. If you want a 4' wide bridge you'll need more boards than if you want a 3' wide bridge.


If you are making the bridge 4' wide you can cut a 2x4x8 in half to get 2 4' pieces, or you could get a 2x4x12 and cut it into thirds. At 4' width you probably want a third 4'x4' going down the middle of the bridge for stability.

You could use pressure treated lumber. We didn't and 7 years later it is still holding up fine. But we keep the bridge in a sand arena with good drainage AND it is setup as a teeter bridge so the whole bottom surface isn't in contact with the ground, just one edge or another.

Construction

Disclaimer: These photos show how our bridge was built. It doesn't mean this configuration will be safe or work for you. Our bridge was built by a general contractor for us. If you are not a handy person, considering printing this article and having somebody build your bridge for you.

1. Lay out your four x four's. Tack one 2 x 4 to each end forming a box.










I'm forwarding the e-mail below in support of the NDF from ETA. It is from SGT Savage, the Commander of the LMPD Mounted Patrol Unit, who has committed to patrolling Iroquois Park at least twice a month. He further states that if the stable was "fixed up enough" (i.e. the roof replaced) for them to use it to give their horses a break at lunch, they would use the park/stable as a sub-station. Increasing police presence in the park would help deter crime (e.g. drugs, prostitution, and ATV's and dirt bikes on the trails), make the area safer for surrounding neighborhoods and establish a specific user of the stable in addition to public users.

I hope this is helpful. Please let me know if there is anything more I can do or provide as the NDF moves forward in the process.

Young riders bring zest to horse show

The southernmost section of Iroquois Park became a bit of the Wild West yesterday, and the only thing missing was a

fullscale cavalry charge.

The occasion was "the first annual" youth horse show sponsored by the River City Horsemen's Association at the park horse arena just off Palatka Road.

And although the horsemen's associ-ation was running things, the afternoon belonged to the youngsters, who can-tered, paraded and galloped on every shape and size of horse from the subcompact pony on up,

The obvious favorites of the crowd were such events as the cloverleaf barrel race, in which the youngsters were timed in circling three barrels set up in one end of the arena, with pole-bending, a wild slalom on horseback


Jim Dillon, one of the organizers of the show, explained it was set up for two purposes: To aid the Kentuckiana Chil-dren's Center, and to provide a "youth-

And, said Dillon, both aims might be combined in a project being planned for the near future

Dillon said that the association hopes to be able to build a stable and paddock at the center which, with two ponies that have been donated, will enable the handicapped children there to learn about horses and horseback-riding firsthand.

ORDINANCE NO. 206, SERIES 2022

AN ORDINANCE APPROPRIATING \$10,000 \$12,000 \$19,500 FROM NEIGHBORHOOD DEVELOPMENT FUNDS IN THE FOLLOWING MANNER: \$10,000 FROM DISTRICT 15; \$1,500 FROM DISTRICT 25; AND \$1,000 EACH FROM DISTRICTS 10, AND 13, 14, 21, AND 24; \$500 EACH FROM DISTRICTS 2, 3, 16, 19, AND 22; \$250 EACH FROM DISTRICTS 8 AND 17; THROUGH THE OFFICE OF MANAGEMENT AND BUDGET TO EQUINE TRAIL ADVOCATES, INC. FOR REPAIR COSTS AT THE IROQUOIS PARK EQUINE AREA (AS AMENDED).

SPONSORED BY: COUNCIL MEMBERS TRIPLETT, MULVIHILL, FOX, HOLTON STEWART, FOWLER, GEORGE, FLOOD, SHANKLIN, DORSEY, REED, PIAGENTINI, ENGEL, CHAMBERS ARMSTRONG, AND WINKLER

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE LEGISLATIVE COUNCIL OF THE LOUISVILLE/JEFFERSON COUNTY METRO GOVERNMENT (THE "COUNCIL") AS FOLLOWS:

SECTION I: The sum of \$10,000 \$12,000 \$19,500 is hereby appropriated from Neighborhood Development Funds in the following manner: \$10,000 from District 15; \$1,500 from District 25; and \$1,000 each from Districts 10, and 13, 14, 21, and 24; \$500 each from Districts 2, 3, 16, 19, and 22; \$250 each from Districts 8 and 17; through the Office of Management and Budget, to Equine Trail Advocates, Inc. for repair costs at the Iroquois Park Equine Area.

SECTION II: The Council has determined the funds requested in this Ordinance will be expended for a public purpose.

SECTION III: This grant is subject to the Council's Policies and Procedures as adopted and effective at the date of passage of this Ordinance.

SECTION IV: This Ordinance shall take effect upon its passage and approval or otherwise becoming law.
