

### Neighborhood Snapshot

The Deer Park neighborhood is located in the central Louisville Metro area, in Eastern Louisville inside the Watterson Expressway between Bardstown Road and Newburg Road. The boundary to the north is Eastern Parkway, to the west is Newburg Road, east is Bardstown Road and a combination of Richmond Road and Douglass Blvd is the south boundary. Surrounding neighborhoods are Belknap, Highlands-Douglass, Bonnycastle, Cherokee Triangle, and Tyler Park.

- History In 1890's developers began to subdivide the deer-filled wooded farmlands as the street car line was extended down Bardstown Road to
  Bonnycastle Ave. This primarily residential neighborhood, with commercial establishments lining the major thoroughfares, saw its last development originate
  in 1935. King's Daughters and Sons Home on Stevens Avenue has been caring for the ill and disabled since 1909.




**Housing Occupancy**

Median Home Value




#### Survey Highlights

The following results highlight responses from 91 residents who participated in the Neighborhood Assessment Survey. Of the survey participants, 25% have lived in the Deer Park

neighborhood for 1-4 years, 37% for 5-10 years and 36% for more than 10 years.

Participants ranged from 20 to more than 70 years of age.

- 3. It is close to where I work.


The following are the top three reasons that might make you consider moving away from the Deer Park neighborhood:

### Summary

#### Resident Survey and Public Workshop

Residents of the Deer Park neighborhood submitted responses to the Quality-of-Life Self-Assessment Survey, the major results of which are shown on the earlier "Survey Results" page of this snapshot. Additionally, an energetic and enthusiastic group of 9 neighbors came out in early spring to attend a resident workshop on March 8. The meeting brought together Deer Park residents, representatives of the Louisville Metro Department of Neighborhoods and planners and workshop facilitators from the Center For Neighborhoods.

The primary result of this public workshop and the residents' energies is the Action Matrix.\* In addition to being a "to-do" list of neighborhood improvement projects, this document outlines sustainable partnerships between Deer Park and all the identified entities, such as Louisville Metro agencies and private business organizations, who can continue to help each other realize their common goals of a healthy and prosperous neighborhood with an ever-improving quality of life.
