TARC at a Glance





14.97 million boardings - FY14

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- 46,900 avg. weekday boardings – FY14
- 41 routes in five counties in two states
- 220 buses (32 hybrid buses) 10 all-electric ZeroBuses, 92 paratransit vehicles
- 631 team members





Jobs and Education

- 70 percent of trips for work or school
- TARC connects employers and employees 6.7 million times a year

Funding Sources

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Federal

- No long-term authorization bill
- Using every federal dollar we can for operating

State

- KY: \$1.17 million statewide for public transportation
- IN: \$1.2 million for TARC

Local

Mass Transit Trust Fund: \$45 million (.2 percent of occupational license fee)

Farebox

- \$1.75 Local one-way
- \$2.75 Express one-way
- Approximately 17% of total operating cost

Grant Funding



Nearly \$70 million since 2010 in grants for improvements. Some highlights:

- \$20 million, Bridges Project funding. (no match)
- \$8.7 million, 25 buses, FTA Ladders of Opportunity. FTA awarded 24 grants totaling \$100 million. They received 446 project proposals from 282 agencies requesting a total of \$1.4 billion.
- \$4.4 million, FTA Clean Fuels Program AND \$4.4 million federal funding authorized by Kentucky AND \$500,000, Metro Louisville, for 10 all-electric ZeroBus fleet and two onroute charging stations.
- \$3.3 million, FTA Low and No Emission Vehicles Program for five more all-electric ZeroBuses. Ten grants awarded 2/5/15 from 50 applications totaling \$200 million for \$55 million available.






70 new buses on the road; 30 more on the way

- 11 hybrid-electric, 28 clean diesel, 21 eTran commuter coaches, 10 allelectric ZeroBus
- 2016: 25 new clean diesel and five new ZeroBuses to join fleet
- TARC will still have more than 60 buses > 12 years/650,000 miles



Upgrading Service

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Upgrading Fare Collection

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- Electronic Fare Collection: 2015
 - Tap-and-go smartcard payment
 - New fare boxes on all buses
 - Reload fare value online
 - Fares are NOT increasing



Service and Ridership





 Demand increase overcrowding on major routes: 18, 23, 31, 40, 71

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- Recent requests service added to support increase in seasonal employment: Amazon, Riverport, UPS, Humana
- Employers provide financial support for additional service
