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
LMDC FACT SHEET DATA FROM 2014

❖ In 2006, the US Department of Justice's Bureau of Justice Statistics issued an extensive report on mental illness in American jails and prisons. According to the findings contained in this report, 64 percent of all people incarcerated in a local jail have at least one mental health issue.

* Being poor with SMI, is a combination that results in high vulnerability to further poverty and homelessness. Some 200 thousand homeless in the United States have been identified as having a SMI. And according to the National Resource and Training Centre on Homeless and Mental Illness between 20 and 25 percent of America's homeless suffered from severe or persistent mental illnesses in 2003.


❖ Unfortunately, instead of decreasing, the number of mentally ill homeless in the U.S significantly increased during the last half of the 20th century (see graph). This increase can be directly attributed to America's psychiatric service policy changes away from mental hospitals toward community service. Although the theory behind this policy was well intended, disorganized and inefficient community services meant that many mentally ill were left without consistent care and as a result ended up as homeless or in jails/prisons.

As a result, many people are released from jail back into homelessness. These individuals face significant barriers as they re-enter society, and without supportive services, may cycle between jail and homelessness...


In Louisville Metro we refer to these individuals as "Familiar Faces".



Discharge Planning is designed for those Familiar Faces who frequent the jail and do not participate in ACT (Assertive Community Treatment).
