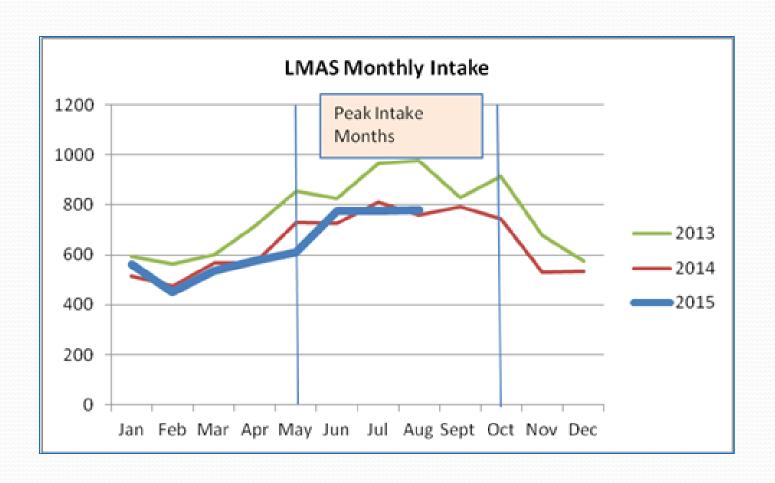

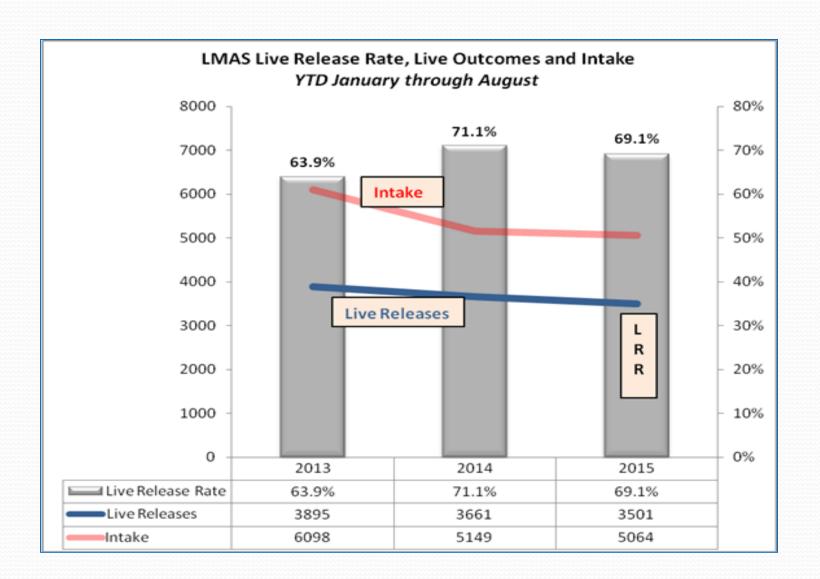

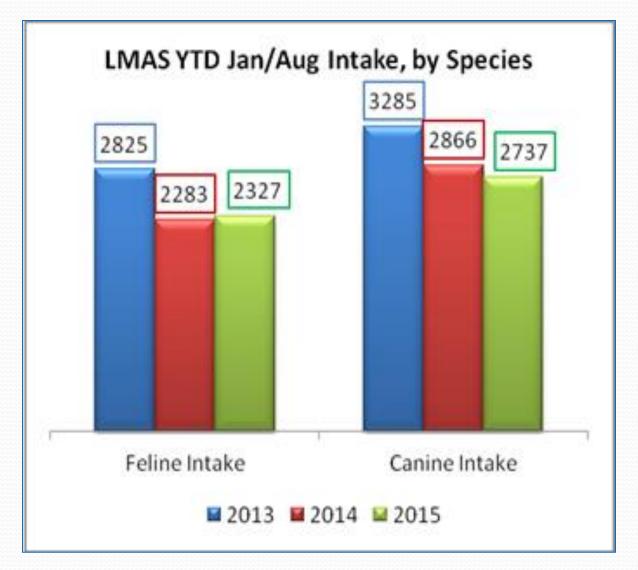

- And include sufficient space for the shelter operations as described in this document

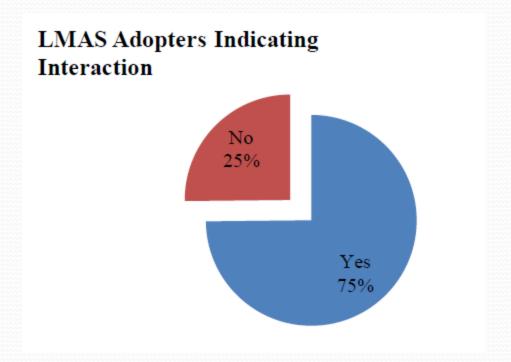
Population Management

 Capacity for Care – every shelter has a maximum capacity for care based on appropriate housing units, staffing, programs, total number of reclaims, adoptions, transfers

Behavioral Health and Well-being

 The structural and social environment, as well as opportunities for cognitive and physical activity are important for all animals

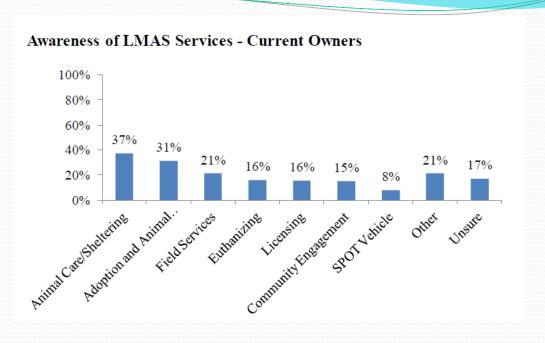

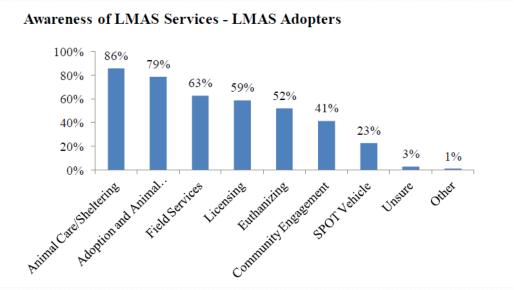

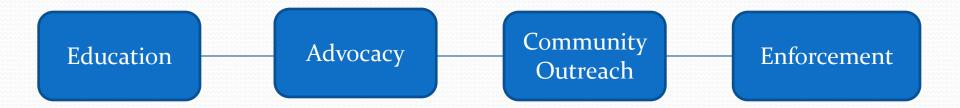


Why?

- Lack of understanding about LMAS
- Unsure of our ability to fulfill our mission = unaware of what we do
- Public condemns agency and yet lines up every day to surrender animals to our care – symptom of apathy
- It is a community issue = enhance education/awareness

LMAS has increased the LRR from 48% (2011) to 69% (Oct. 2015)



Reduction in animal intake through partnerships, owner retention programs and community engagement
