YouthAlert! (YA!) Violence Prevention/Health Community Outreach Program (VPHP), YouthAlert! (YA!) Model Youth Mentoring Initiative (MYMI). July 1, 2015 to June 30, 2016.

YouthAlert! (YA!) Violence Prevention/Health Community Outreach Program's purpose is to reduce youth violence and improve the overall health of Kentucky youth. The program brings community speakers from the 35 hours of video from our six YouthAlert! (YA!) Violence Prevention Event & Forum to students. It also helps kids connect to local and national support and intervention services. The program continues out-of-school with our YouthAlert! (YA!) Model Youth Mentoring Initiative (MYMI). YouthAlert! (YA!) creates YouthAlert! (YA!) Model Youth who will set the peer standard in their school and community, mentor other youths, and assist in the presentation of YouthAlert! (YA!) Programs.

YouthAlert! (YA!) Violence Prevention/Health Program begins with its own three-hour, three day, Introduction Presentation performed by YouthAlert (YA!) personnel. This Introduction Presentation consists of video slides, narration, YouthAlert! (YA!) Live Speakers, Event Video Speakers, Live Narration, PSA Videos, Question, Answer and Discussion Periods, In-Class Worksheets, In-Class Surveys, and more. It touches on all subjects of youth violence prevention and healthily lifestyles for youth. 94 percent of youth and 100 percent of hosts surveyed this last school year in Kentucky thought this program would stop someone from doing violence. This information is from our formative assessments which 3,371 Youth Surveys and 38 Public School Host Surveys this last school year as of June 8, 2015.

Our next step in our strategic plan is to reach more youth in Jefferson County, Kentucky and in the Jefferson County Public Schools (JCPS) this up-coming 2015/2016 school year. JCPS schools open on Monday, August 3, 2015 and school starts for students on Wednesday, August 12, 2015.

YouthAlert! (YA!) Violence Prevention/Health Program subjects include, Domestic Violence, Dating Violence, Bullying, Suicide/Self Harm, Gang

Violence, Sexual Violence, School Violence, Child Abuse, Neglect, Elder Abuse, Safe Surroundings, and more. Over half of the program deals with the subject of youth violence prevention. The remaining sessions cover all other youth health advocacy and prevention topics including, Mental Health, Social Health, Physical Health, Substance Abuse, Unintentional Injuries, Diet, Poverty and Consumerism and more.

One-hundred percent of the NDF Request will be for direct programming in Jefferson County, Kentucky. For the \$130,000 Request, \$5,000 from each honorable Louisville Metro Council Members, we hope to reach 26,000 youth in Jefferson County (ages 10 to 24) with our program within one year, July 1, 2015 to June 30, 2016. The locations will be in-school, out-of-school, justice and state facilities inside Jefferson County, Kentucky. YouthAlert! (YA!) has performed its programming directly to over 3,000 youth in the last 12 months. Most of them in Jefferson County, Kentucky. Council members may designate to our organization where their funds should be used.

\$125,000 Program Budget Breakdown for Louisville, Kentucky:

Reach 25,000 youth in Louisville, Kentucky with our class-size, multi-day, YouthAlert! (YA!) Violence Prevention/Health Community Program.

That would be approximately 100 multi-day, class-size, presentations during the course of 12 months in Louisville, Kentucky. Last school year YouthAlert! (YA!) did approximately 40 presentations during the school year. These 100 multi-day, class-size, presentations would be to approximately 250 youth per presentation, which would be approximately 7 classes per day with 37 youth per class.

Average cost would be approximately \$5.00 per youth for reaching 25,000 youth in Louisville, Kentucky, class-size, multi-day, over the course of 12 months.

B: Describe specifically how the funding will be spent including identification of funding to sub grantee (s):

NDF would be used for direct programming to youth only. The program has been already developed over two and onehalf years so funding would be used exclusively presenting, and performing, the programming directly to

youth ages 10 to 24 years of age. Extra attention during these sessions is given to male youths and minorities.

Budget Item A: There are no Personnel or Payroll Costs Including Benefits expenses used in this NDF request.

Budget Item C: Office Supplies are the costs, including printing costs, to administer the YouthAlert! (YA!) Violence Prevention/Health Community Outreach Program only not for the YouthAlert! (YA!) organization itself. YouthAlert! (YA!) has discounts and sales tax-exempt status with Office Depot and will purchase the majority of its office operational supplies for its programming thought Office Depot. YouthAlert! (YA!) is not charge a sales tax due to its nonprofit status.

Budget Item D: Telephone costs will predominately be mobile phone/cell phone costs on a separate YouthAlert! (YA!) account for easy tracking and analysis.

Budget Item E: There are no travel or entertainments expenses used in this NDF request.

Budget Item H: Program Materials include a very great deal of paper handouts and instruction manuals given to all involved in the program, including presenters, trainers, student, youth teachers school administrators, community organizers, mentors, volunteers and much more. Program material costs also include all the technology used for the program including the cost of our free mobile phone app to the program web site and many more technical related avenues designed to reach youth where they prefer to get the programming information at any given time.

YouthAlert! (YA!) goal is a ten percent reduction in all violence with youth who have gone though our program.

We measure with formative and summative assessments with the addition of school and public statistics. Over 94% of youth, 100% of educators, surveyed in a formative assessment after this program said it would help stop someone from doing violence.

YouthAlert! (YA!) Violence Prevention/Health Program follows a lesson plan that is aligned with the National Health Education Standards (NHES), which is followed by the Kentucky Core Academic Standards (June 2010). The progress is measured though schools Program Review Assessment as well as student health grades. It is also EILA approved by the State of Kentucky for Professional Development hours to educators. The program is also overseen by a very active YouthAlert! (YA!) Advisory Board.

YouthAlert! (YA!) Violence Prevention/Health Community Outreach Program matches the National PTA's Resolution on Violence Prevention.

"Resolved, that the National PTA, though its constituent organizations, encourage the Department of Defense Education Activity, local school boards and other school governance bodies to incorporate a violence prevention component into existing courses of study that is age appropriate in a K-12 curriculum."

YouthAlert! (YA!) Violence Prevention/Health Program mirrors the recommendations of both of the Louisville, Kentucky's Violence Prevention Workgroup, the Lexington, Kentucky's Commission for Youth Development and Public Safety and the State of Kentucky Department of Juvenile Justice's Prevention Principles.

"The Violence Prevention Work Group's recommendations are Louisville schools to implement violence prevention programs for children in pre-kindergarten to grade 12, more diversity training for teachers and intervention programs for young people who commit their first crimes." (Louisville, KY, October 2012)

"To plan for effective delinquency prevention and early intervention, the family, school and community as a whole must be involved in addressing the problems. DJJ's key principles for preventing and reducing juvenile delinquency are: To promote prevention strategies and programs." (Kentucky Department of Juvenile Justice January 2013)

YouthAlert! Blueprint was recommended to us by the Centers for Diseases Control and Prevention (CDC) when meeting with them in Atlanta, Georgia. Our final goal is to be considered a "Model Program" by CSPV when the completed study is submitted to them. CSPV currently only has six programs that touch on the subject of violence that are considered "Model Programs".

Violence Prevention Education works:

"Over the past few decades, social scientists have made great strides in uncovering the causes and correlates of youth violence. Numerous programs have demonstrated their effectiveness in reducing risk factors for serious violence. Our review of the scientific literature supports the main conclusion of this report: that as a Nation, we possess knowledge and have translated that knowledge into programs that are unequivocally effective in preventing much serious youth violence. (Office of the U.S. Surgeon General, 2001)

"Universal school-based programs to reduce or prevent violent behavior are delivered to all children in classrooms in a grade or in a school. Similarly, programs targeted to schools in high-risk areas are delivered to all children in a grade or school in those high-risk areas. During 2004--2006, the Task Force on Community Preventive Services conducted a systematic review of published scientific evidence concerning the effectiveness of these programs. The results of this review provide strong evidence that universal school-based programs decrease rates of violence and aggressive behavior among school-aged children. Program effects were demonstrated at all grade levels." (National Center for Injury Prevention and Control, CDC, National Institute of Justice, NIJ, et al, 2007)





YouthAlert! (YA!) Youth Survey Analysis: Out of 10,000 individual responses, 2000 youth surveys, there were 420 total "No" answers, 2.1 percent, which meets our goal of keeping this number under 10 percent. 95.6 percent of those surveyed, 1,913 of 2000, learned something new. 98 percent of youth surveyed, 1,960 of 2000, agreed with something in the Introduction Presentation. The most important question, Question Number Five, 94 percent of the youths surveyed, 1,881 of the 2000, thought the 3-hour, 3-day, Introduction Presentation would help stop someone from doing violence, even if just a little, with over half, 65.2 percent, answering "Yes". Classes were approximately 60 percent male and 40 percent female. Minorities represented approximately 65 percent of the classes and non-minorities 35 percent. Note: approximately 50 percent of Middle Schools received only a 2-day, 2-hour presentation.





YouthAlert! (YA!) Violence Prevention/Health Community Outreach Program (VPHP), YouthAlert! (YA!) Model Youth Mentoring Initiative (MYMI). July 1, 2015 to June 30, 2016.

YouthAlert! (YA!) Violence Prevention/Health Community Outreach Program's purpose is to reduce youth violence and improve the overall health of Kentucky youth. The program brings community speakers from the 35 hours of video from our six YouthAlert! (YA!) Violence Prevention Event & Forum to students. It also helps kids connect to local and national support and intervention services. The program continues out-of-school with our YouthAlert! (YA!) Model Youth Mentoring Initiative (MYMI). YouthAlert! (YA!) creates YouthAlert! (YA!) Model Youth who will set the peer standard in their school and community, mentor other youths, and assist in the presentation of YouthAlert! (YA!) Programs.

YouthAlert! (YA!) Violence Prevention/Health Program begins with its own three-hour, three day, Introduction Presentation performed by YouthAlert (YA!) personnel. This Introduction Presentation consists of video slides, narration, YouthAlert! (YA!) Live Speakers, Event Video Speakers, Live Narration, PSA Videos, Question, Answer and Discussion Periods, In-Class Worksheets, In-Class Surveys, and more. It touches on all subjects of youth violence prevention and healthily lifestyles for youth. 94 percent of youth and 100 percent of hosts surveyed this last school year in Kentucky thought this program would stop someone from doing violence. This information is from our formative assessments which 3,371 Youth Surveys and 38 Public School Host Surveys this last school year as of June 8, 2015.

Our next step in our strategic plan is to reach *more* youth in Jefferson County, Kentucky and in the Jefferson County Public Schools (JCPS) this up-coming 2015/2016 school year. JCPS schools open on Monday, August 3, 2015 and school starts for students on Wednesday, August 12, 2015.

YouthAlert! (YA!) Violence Prevention/Health Program subjects include, Domestic Violence, Dating Violence, Bullying, Suicide/Self Harm, Gang Violence, Sexual Violence, School Violence, Child Abuse, Neglect, Elder Abuse, Safe Surroundings, and more. Over half of the program deals with the subject of youth violence prevention. The remaining sessions cover all other youth health advocacy and prevention topics including, Mental Health, Social Health, Physical Health, Substance Abuse, Unintentional Injuries, Diet, Poverty and Consumerism and more.

One-hundred percent of the NDF Request will be for direct programming in Jefferson County, Kentucky. For the \$130,000 Request, \$5,000 from each honorable Louisville Metro Council Members, we hope to reach 26,000 youth in Jefferson County (ages 10 to 24) with our program within one year, July 1, 2015 to June 30, 2016. The locations will be in-school, out-of-school, justice and state facilities inside Jefferson County, Kentucky. YouthAlert! (YA!) has performed

its programming directly to over 3,000 youth in the last 12 months. Most of them in Jefferson County, Kentucky. Council members may designate to our organization where their funds should be used.

\$125,000 Program Budget Breakdown for Louisville, Kentucky:

Reach 25,000 youth in Louisville, Kentucky with our class-size, multi-day, YouthAlert! (YA!) Violence Prevention/Health Community Program.

That would be approximately 100 multi-day, class-size, presentations during the course of 12 months in Louisville, Kentucky. Last school year YouthAlert! (YA!) did approximately 40 presentations during the school year.

These 100 multi-day, class-size, presentations would be to approximately 250 youth per presentation, which would be approximately 7 classes per day with 37 youth per class.

Average cost would be approximately \$5.00 per youth for reaching 25,000 youth in Louisville, Kentucky, class-size, multi-day, over the course of 12 months.

B: Describe specifically how the funding will be spent including identification of funding to sub grantee (s):

NDF would be used for direct programming to youth only. The program has been already developed over two and one-half years so funding would be used exclusively presenting, and performing, the programming directly to youth ages 10 to 24 years of age. Extra attention during these sessions is given to male youths and minorities.

Budget Item A: There are no Personnel or Payroll Costs Including Benefits expenses used in this NDF request.

Budget Item C: Office Supplies are the costs, including printing costs, to administer the YouthAlert! (YA!) Violence Prevention/Health Community Outreach Program only not for the YouthAlert! (YA!) organization itself. YouthAlert! (YA!) has discounts and sales tax-exempt status with Office Depot and will purchase the majority of its office operational supplies for its programming thought Office Depot. YouthAlert! (YA!) is not charge a sales tax due to its nonprofit status.

Budget Item D: Telephone costs will predominately be mobile phone/cell phone costs on a separate YouthAlert! (YA!) account for easy tracking and analysis.

Budget Item E: There are no travel or entertainments expenses used in this NDF request.

Budget Item H: Program Materials include a very great deal of paper handouts and instruction manuals given to all involved in the program, including presenters, trainers, student, youth teachers school administrators, community organizers, mentors, volunteers and much more. Program material costs also include all the technology used for the program including the cost of our free mobile phone app to the program web site and many more technical related avenues designed to reach youth where they prefer to get the programming information at any given time.

Budget Item I: YouthAlert! (YA!) Model Youth Mentoring Initiative See Section 5 at the end of Addendum.

Budget Item J: Small equipment is for equipment used at the actual presentation. Programs at a great many different locations and many different settings and variety of small equipment, and their accessories, is needed to perform and record the presentations correctly. Equipment includes: projectors, laptops, video screens, video cameras, etc.

E: Describe the program's benefits to those being served (measurable outcomes). Include the programs process for collecting data and the indicators that will be tracked to measure the benefits to those being served:

YouthAlert! (YA!) goal is a ten percent reduction in all violence with youth who have gone though our program.

We measure with formative and summative assessments with the addition of school and public statistics. Over 94% of youth, 100% of educators, surveyed in a formative assessment after this program said it would help stop someone from doing violence.

YouthAlert! (YA!) Violence Prevention/Health Program follows a lesson plan that is aligned with the National Health Education Standards (NHES), which is followed by the Kentucky Core Academic Standards (June 2010). The progress is measured though schools Program Review Assessment as well as student health grades. It is also EILA approved by the State of Kentucky for Professional Development hours to educators. The program is also overseen by a very active YouthAlert! (YA!) Advisory Board.

YouthAlert! (YA!) Violence Prevention/Health Community Outreach Program matches the National PTA's Resolution on Violence Prevention.

"Resolved, that the National PTA, though its constituent organizations, encourage the Department of Defense Education Activity, local school boards and other school governance bodies to incorporate a violence prevention component into existing courses of study that is age appropriate in a K-12 curriculum."

YouthAlert! (YA!) Violence Prevention/Health Program mirrors the recommendations of both of the Louisville, Kentucky's Violence Prevention Workgroup, the Lexington, Kentucky's Commission for Youth Development and Public Safety and the State of Kentucky Department of Juvenile Justice's Prevention Principles.

"The Violence Prevention Work Group's recommendations are Louisville schools to implement violence prevention programs for children in pre-kindergarten to grade 12, more diversity training for teachers and intervention programs for young people who commit their first crimes." (Louisville, KY, October 2012)

"To plan for effective delinquency prevention and early intervention, the family, school and community as a whole must be involved in addressing the problems. DJJ's key principles for preventing and reducing juvenile delinquency are: To promote prevention strategies and programs." (Kentucky Department of Juvenile Justice January 2013)

YouthAlert! (YA!) will be implementing an evidence-based study called "Blueprints for Violence Prevention developed by the Center for the Study and Prevention of Violence (CSPV) at the University of Colorado-Boulder and supported by the Office of Juvenile Justice and Delinquency Prevention, U.S. Department of Justice (USDOJ). This CSPV Blueprint was recommended to us by the Centers for Diseases Control and Prevention (CDC) when meeting with them in Atlanta, Georgia. Our final goal is to be considered a "Model Program" by CSPV when the completed study is submitted to them. CSPV currently only has six programs that touch on the subject of violence that are considered "Model Programs".

Violence Prevention Education works:

"Over the past few decades, social scientists have made great strides in uncovering the causes and correlates of youth violence. Numerous programs have demonstrated their effectiveness in reducing risk factors for serious violence. Our review of the scientific literature supports the main conclusion of this report: that as a Nation, we possess knowledge and have translated that knowledge into programs that are unequivocally effective in preventing much serious youth violence. (Office of the U.S. Surgeon General, 2001)

"Universal school-based programs to reduce or prevent violent behavior are delivered to all children in classrooms in a grade or in a school. Similarly, programs targeted to schools in high-risk areas are delivered to all children in a grade or school in those high-risk areas. During 2004-2006, the Task Force on Community Preventive Services conducted a systematic review of published scientific evidence concerning the effectiveness of these programs. The results of this review provide strong evidence that universal school-based programs decrease rates of violence and aggressive behavior among school-aged children. Program effects were demonstrated at all grade levels." (National Center for Injury Prevention and Control, CDC, National Institute of Justice, NIJ, et al, 2007)
