Council Member Butler.

COUNCILWOMAN BUTLER: Thank you for the point of personal privilege. Several of us participated in the White Coat program. And we shadowed the doctor for the day. And the doctor that I shadowed is here. He is a cardiologist here in town. And he said I would like to shadow you one day. So I said okay. He came down today, and it is appropriate because Councilwoman Woolridge will read that it is heart month. And he is a cardiologist. And then as I talked to him and my colleagues, I found out he grew up down the street from Councilman Mulvihill, and he knows Councilwoman Welch and her husband very well.

So we wanted to recognize the doctor day since it is heart healthy month, and we wanted to give you a certificate of appreciation for your dedication to heart health for all residents of Louisville.

So we wanted to do that.

>> Thank you very much.

[ APPLAUSE ]

>> Thank you for having me here. I'm trying to get some funding for people who cannot afford coronary calcium scanning, which I talked about on TV at the forum, picking up heart disease at an earlier age. I'm trying though get some money so that the family health centers can give this to people who need it who can't afford it. That's one quick thing.

The second thing I wanted to mention very briefly is that if any of the council members would like to have myself or one of the University of Louisville cardiology faculty come into your district to a church, give a small 15-minute talk about avoiding dropping over dead of a heart attack, things you can do, I would be happy to do that myself, and I have 23, 24 other partners who would be happy to do that.

The last thing that is interesting, next month at the University of Louisville we have the senior associate dean from Vanderbilt, the dean of diversity, Andre Churchwell, coming to give medical rounds at 8:00 in the morning, but if anyone in the council who would like to meet this distinguished person, the first African-American writer on the national banner, and his father was inducted into the Smithsonian hall of fame recently, very distinguished friend of mine who is at Vanderbilt will give a talk next month if anyone wants to join. Thank you for having me.

>> And you may also see the doctor because we does walk with a doc. On the weekends he does that.

COUNCILWOMAN AUBREY WELCH: I want to thank Dr. Sadlow personally. He saved my husband's life ten and a half years ago. Matt was 51 years old. He dropped his car off to get it fixed at Downtown Ford, was going to walk to the courthouse and couldn't make it and nearly dropped

over. He did finally get a ride to the courthouse, did his morning court, still having chest pain, and then went to Norton hospital. At that point he saw Dr. Sadlow, who was his cardiologist, by the way, because he did have high blood pressure. Because Dr. Sadlow knew of his dad's history, he skipped a couple things because all the tests came out pretty normal as far as the cardiac enzymes and things, no heart attack. But luckily Dr. Sadlow went on and did the cardiac cast. He had the 90% blockage in the widowmaker, 85%, 75%, three blockages. The next day he did the triple bypass. He didn't, but the other doctor did. But he found it. The other heart surgeons did the triple bypass.

But I want to thank you personally that I still have my Matt, who is a wonderful husband and father. He has done everything right. So no smoking, try not to eat those French fries and hamburgers and try to walk every day. Thank you so much.

PRESIDENT YATES: Doctor, thank you again for being here. And for any of the members that have not participated in wear the White Coat, I recommend it. It is very informative. It is a whole different look. I wear a couple different hats, and to see the doctors if that role the eye-opening.

Connie Marshall.

CONNNIE MARSHALL: My name is Connie Marshall. My website is www.justiceforallcitizens.com. Waste, fraud and corrupt officials in Kentucky.

May 24th, 2016, I contacted LG&E to get the telephone number of their damage department. I did not ask LG&E to come to my home because on at least three occasions they have come without ID. LG&E came with police. The police stated LG&E wanted them to come because I videotaped them. By law, I have a right to videotape on my property. I called LG&E and spoke with the manager and asked for the names of the LG&E rep with the police and he stated, I'm not telling you. Due to the fact that I tried to report LG&E to the police in 2012, as they were on my property without ID installing a recorder, the police refused to give me a report number, I was stomped by the police and my rights violated in court, it is clear that the relationship between LG&E and the police isn't --

January 20th, 2016, around 9:15 p.m. the police were banging on my door. They stated did you send e-mails to Malone Staffing? I said what e-mails? This is suspicious in that I just went to court that morning to put Malone Staffing back on the docket as they lied to unemployment. I did eventually get my unemployment. When I filed an open records request the e-mails from Malone Staffing did not exist. However in January 2017 the lieutenant said they did exist but they didn't have a copy. He stated contact Malone Staffing for a copy. Of course I didn't fall for that. I then ask him how they could accuse me of something if they do not have a copy of the evidence. He stated they could and that, quote, he was concerned about his little girl. I stated are you speaking of blank, I don't want to say her name, because the person that I worked under was young and bore the company name. The relationship between Malone Staffing and the police is suspect because they have worked as security in one of

their warehouse locations. This explains the false accusations placed on me when I took Malone Staffing to court.

July 7th, 2016, and July 10th, 2016. I posted two videos on YouTube regarding an LG&E manager violating my rights. I received a call from LG&E security saying the manager discovered a threatening e-mail stating that I was going to kill him. I told the security in telephone conversations the police before involved in the fabricated documents and to contact the FBI. But of course they contacted the police.

July 4th, 2016, I heard banging on my door and it was the police stating they had an MIW. I did not open my door. No. I filed open records through the court to get a copy of the MIW which expired but stated that I threatened to kill an LG&E manager. The detective's name on the report was Jeremy Liver, whom I have never met. This is an attempt at a setup by LG&E and Louisville Metro Police Department, as I have caught LG&E in their illegal acts and posted and reported them to several officials.

What is interesting is that I have received 30 death threats, sexual degradation, hate e-mails, numerous threatening telephone calls, someone tried to break into my home whom the police stated that I had sent, four fabricated pleadings filed in the court case, one accusing a federal judge of taking bribes, 130 pieces of mail in the prosector's name and LMPD's name in my home, assaulted by the police and nothing has been done. All of you you'll find on my website justiceforallcitizens.com and on YouTube. My e-mail is ConnieCmarshall@gmail.com I would like to hear from some of you.

MADAM CLERK: Cassia Herron.

CASSIA HERRON:good evening. My name is Cassia Herron and I am a resident of Shelby Park neighborhood. And I come to you tonight in support of our city coming up with some sort of sanctuary city status. In trying to prepare my thoughts for tonight, I was kind of all over the place, but I thought that thinking about sanctuary cities and thinking about our compassionate city, designation as a compassionate city, is a way to come at this. I looked at the compassionate city's website, and there was a lot that was there. And most of it was vague and it was ambiguous. And it is something that our mayor and I think many of you have been pushing, the compassionate city mantra.

So tonight you ask that you consider creating an ordinance that puts some teeth behind us being a compassionate city that also is in support with what many communities across the country are doing around sanctuary cities.

It is time that we have law enforcement that decriminalizes immigrants or immigrant status, people of color. There are many times when I ride through my community and neighborhood and there is a black or someone of color who is pulled over, maybe on foot, maybe in a car, and there are seven of eight police cars. And I have started documenting that and sending that stuff to the police department. But it is time that we, the citizens don't have to call our chief of police and say does it really make sense for you to have that many police officers, that much presence around a traffic stop when you are just going to give someone a ticket?

It is time for us to think about education and think about in addition a way that is safe and that students don't come to school having to think about their safety. That when we think about compassion we think

about communities that are struggling with environmental justice issues, that we just don't shrug our shoulders and say that it is a federal government issue but we start localizing these things and start prioritizing them. That's what I think about when I think about sanctuary cities, we are creating a community that is safe and inviting for everybody.

Thinking about a food system that is safe and affordable and accessible to everybody, and it goes way beyond bourbonism, a term we created to support industries that pollute our communities. And we think about an investment culture that redistributes funds in a way that everybody, immigrants, people who live here, anyone, is able to invest in their communities.

I urge you to think about and to support the folks who are coming to talk to you soon, if they have not come to speak with you already, about sanctuary ordinances in our city that make it safe and affordable and improve the quality of life for all residents of Louisville. Thank you.

MADAM CLERK: Chris Hartman.

CHRIS HARTMAN: President Yates, members of the Metro Council, thank you for your time tonight. I'm Chris Hartman. I proudly call District six my home. And this is only the second time I have ever addressed this council as my eight years as director of the fairness campaign.

Fortunately, Louisville's gotten it right for a long time on almost all the fairness campaign's issues. I spend most of my time in other city halls across our commonwealth, Frankfort, Bowling Green, even

tiny Appalachian Vicco. But I come before you tonight because our country is in crisis. And I come before you tonight because I know this will be a difficult vote for some of you. I know that there are political and arguably practical reasons that many may not wish to make Louisville a sanctuary city.

Ultimately, folks won't wish to attract the ire of our general assembly as they whisk our commonwealth along a warpath against civil rights, reproductive freedom, our universities and the city of Louisville itself.

But now is not the time to play things safe or close to the cuff. Not when real people are suffering the very real fear and uncertainty of our deluded and deranged despot in chief racist Muslim ban.

I come tonight on behalf of every immigrant who fears for their safety, including the thousands of LGBTQ immigrants and their families, many of whom have fled countries where they can be fined or jailed or killed because of who they are or woman they love.

I come before you on behalf of our beautifully diverse LGBTQ families, many of which include adopted children from other countries who now fret about whether or not they are, quote, legal and whether or not their families can be torn apart.

These fears are absurd not because they are unjustified, but because how the hell did we get here in 2017? Now is not the time to be timid or complacent or fear Frankfort.

Now is the time to be courageous. Now is the time to stretch out our arms wider than we ever have before to embrace and welcome every single person and family regardless of their color, creed, national

origin, sexual orientation, gender identity, disability status, or their documentation. They will not come for one of us without coming through all of us.

MADAM CLERK: Sarah Nunez.

SARAH NUNEZ: Thank you, council members. My name is Sarah Nunez. I live in District 15 in Councilwoman Butler's district. I'm here today as a member of MI GENTE Louisville, a member of the St. Joseph association, homeowner and engaged community member. I come before you tonight because our families are being torn apart by the current immigration system. New executive orders from the federal government do not make our realities any better. Immigrant advocates, lawyers, and activists have received several recent reports of current instances where ICE is being more aggressive than usual due to these executive orders. They are separating families, and it is only going to get worse. I'm part of a mixed immigration status family. So my father is 65 years old with many health problems. He is also my mother's caretaker. He has not lived in his home country for over 40 years, yet a mistake he made when he was a younger man is affecting his ability to live a full and healthy life with us, his family, at home. I come before you tonight because there are many more families like mine in this community, and we are vulnerable.

Many of us are not in the position to speak to you as I am today. The people who we are representing are people who are often left out of the political process, the board rooms, and the community meetings. A sanctuary city resolution is all we have to hold on to as we face these executive orders and harsh policies from this new administration. So please take the time to hear from us, from all of us, and give us policies

that support Louisville as a truly welcoming and compassionate city. Give us policies that will provide us some protection from these harsh environments. Give us policies that address the spectrum of all immigrants, refugees, the working class, queer, Muslim, black, and undocumented families of Louisville. Give us policies that will help support police and community relationship efforts in our city instead of hurting them.

Give us policies that will make all our communities safer and more courageous. We are asking for policies that will safeguard all of our rights, freedoms, and lives. We need your leadership to make Louisville welcome and safe for everyone. Thank you.

MADAM CLERK: Jessa Warner.

JESSA WARNER: Good evening. My name is Jessa Warner. And I'm in Barbara Sexton Smith's district. Member of the Baptist community at liberty, a member of CLOUT.

And during CLOUT's listening process this fall we heard nearly 500 stories from people who are facing difficult housing situations, and that is why we are here again to ask you to fund the affordable housing trust fund with an annual allocation of \$10 million.

Last January I spoke at Metro Council and shared my own story about struggling to find decently maintained affordable housing in a safe neighborhood. But tonight I'm here to speak to you because my heart is heavy with all the memories of all the different veterans and their families that I have helped who are and who have been homeless. For the past years I have been a case manager at a local non-profit housing program helping veterans find permanent and affordable housing. And I work

with veterans who need a second chance, veterans who have never asked for help before who often urge me to help someone else whose situation is maybe worse than theirs, and veterans who finally reach out because they don't want their can I see to sleep in a car or it is too cold for them to sleep in one themselves. It is my job for them to help them find a home they can afford but it is hard to do because the pickings are slim. It is everyone's right to live in a neighborhood that is safe where there isn't drug deals going down in the parking lot, where there are gunfights in the backyard. It is everyone's right to live in a house where the stove isn't broken for weeks on end and the landlord is negligent and won't fix it. It is not acceptable for people to live in places where there are cock roaches, and smells like urine, and somehow passes a Section 8 test.

These are the apartments I'm trying to put my veterans in, and these what the people are spending a precious \$550 to \$700 a month on, and that is unacceptable. I wouldn't want to live there. Would you? No one should have to. If there was more affordable housing in Louisville, there would be competition and a reason for landlords to have higher standards, a reason to be accountable for their properties. And I'm dismayed that the situation can only get worse when 3,100 federally funded subsidized units will expire in the next few years and landlords can charge more for the sub par apartment and is they can make them unaffordable for the 65,000 Louisville residents who already desperately need them.

Please don't let this situation get worse. We need for affordable housing. That is why we are here to ask you to fund the affordable housing trust fund with an annual allocation of \$10 million.

Please help people like me and our veterans who are making very hard housing choices each day. Thank you.

MADAM CLERK: Evelyn Clark.

EVELYN CLARK: Good evening. My name is Evelyn Clark and I live in David James' district. I attend Bethel Baptist church, a member of CLOUT. I am here tonight to ask you to fund the affordable housing trust fund with an annual allocation of \$10 million starting with a \$10 million budget allocation this year.

I am just one face of Louisville's affordable housing crisis. I am a USAR United States Army reserves veteran retired after 20 years of service. During my service which consisted of training and preparedness to protect my country, I gained so many personal experiences, traveling and enjoyment even though on two occasions it got real with the pending war, activation to war.

While I served I worked full-time and earned my BA. I am now retired. Today it truly breaks my heart to see that our veterans are without basic needs such as adequate housing, medical treatment, etc. I know there are many who served less time than I did, so they are without a retirement check, but they experienced war, death, and could share tales of horrible conditions they had to endure for us that resulted in homelessness, joblessness, mental illness, and many other problems that many times involve their families.

In my case I purchased a home through the assistance of new directions, which afforded me many benefits such as low interest, paid closing costs, etc. After 30 years, I am still in my home but I know the expense of upkeep to include installing telephone service,

air-conditioning, replacement of concrete, toilet, sinks, faucets, and right now I need a new bathtub, and it is draining my income. It leaves no money to adequately save and retirement is a reduced income. If we say it is our government's responsibility, well, we are the government. Affordable housing can make it possible for us to get resources to them and their families.

We have a community of veterans who are in need on many levels. If 2015 Louisville committed to end veteran homelessness by finding permanent for the 360 known homeless veterans in our city. This is a wonderful initiative, but the 360 veterans living on the streets are the tip of the iceberg. Thousands of veterans like me have a roof over their head but are struggling to afford housing upkeep or are unable to save for assisted living. And we know the situation will only get worse as 3,100 federally subsidized units expire in the next few years.

That is why we are here to ask you fund the Louisville affordable housing trust fund with an annual allocation of \$10 million. Support people like me who are making very hard choices. Thank you.

a half now, and I appreciate y'all's support. It has been changed by

several people and made to where it is a pretty good resolution. I have had a lot of support from a lot of people, and I sure hope we can get this passed tonight. Thank you for supporting it. Let's try it and see if we can get online to get us an expansion team.

PRESIDENT YATES: Thank you, Councilman Johnson.

Councilman Engel.

COUNCILMAN ENGEL: Thank you, Mr. President. I want to speak to this and explain my vote. I want to applaud Councilman Johnson for his persistence for so many years. You may not agree with the councilman on everything, but you have to agree that he has been passionate behind this particular project and issue. That's not the reason I'm going to support that, but I am going to support this. I took a raw poll from an interesting group of young men at St. X High School about a week ago. I was speaking to a classroom. And this issue came up from one of them, and I said I want to take a poll with you gentlemen here today. I want how many of you would support an NBA arena in our community? And I tell you it was 90% plus raised our hand. But then I said in the event there was an issue with the funding and/or the support of that NBA team and it would potentially impact your wallet, how many of you would support the NBA team? Their hands kind of went down a little bit.

But that's not what we are talking about here, folks. This is not, and I want to explain to my constituents, my support for this resolution is not supporting taxpayer dollars. We don't have skin in the game right now with this legislation. It is merely a resolution. So, Mr. President, I just wanted to explain my vote. I will be supporting this, and I look forward to the dialogue of thinking big in Louisville,

just like you did, Mr. President, today at the committee on committees. You brought a think-big project, an aquarium idea. And so I'm signing on to this, and I appreciate Jay Bruce Miller taking time in my office today. For 30 minutes he could talk facts and figures, and it could go for another hour and a half. This guy understands this thing. So just wanted to let you folks know that I'm going to support this. Thank you.

I learned something the other day. When we get together and we talk, it is surprising how much you can learn. COUNCILWOMAN FLOOD: Thank you, Mr. President. This neighborhood plan was started in March of 2016 and it was initiated by Councilwoman Butler, and at this time I would like to yield the floor to Councilwoman Butler, who worked very hard on this.

PRESIDENT YATES: Councilwoman Butler, the floor is yours.

COUNCILWOMAN BUTLER: Thank you. This plan came about after there was an advisory group. They had several neighborhood meetings that were very well-attended. And this is going to help this neighborhood, which is just south of Churchill Downs near U of L as we go forward and look for monies and dollars and federal grants. It will help us with that. This is a neighborhood with some great housing stock, has the ability if you live there to get anywhere in town pretty quickly because you are right on the Waterston.

And it should be a destination place for people that want to bring up their families. So we are hoping to kick this off and this plan was the first part of that.

> So I ask for your support. PRESIDENT YATES: Thank you, Councilwoman. Is there any other discussion?

PRESIDENT YATES: Back to you, councilwoman.

PRESIDENT YATES: May I have a motion and second for approval?

PRESIDENT YATES: Properly seconded and first. We are getting too redundant.

Councilwoman, the floor is yours.

COUNCILWOMAN FLOOD: Maybe we are going to have to break up the zoning.

This is an area-wide rezoning for Portland neighborhood. This is the last piece of a long and tedious rezoning portion. I wanted to note that there was one address that was left out at the owner's request, and that was 2820 Duncan Street, which is not in the area-wide rezoning. And I would like to yield the floor to Councilwoman Cheri Bryant-Hamilton, because this has been years and a lot of work done by her office to accomplish this.

PRESIDENT YATES: Councilwoman Hamilton, would you like the floor?

PRESIDENT YATES: Properly moved and seconded. The ordinance is before us.

Councilwoman Flood.

COUNCILWOMAN FLOOD: Thank you, Mr. President. This as it states is an area-wide change in zoning for the Jacobs project, and this is in Councilwoman Butler's district, and I'm sure she would like to address the council.

PRESIDENT YATES: The floor is yours.

COUNCILWOMAN BUTLER: Thank you. This is the result of a neighborhood plan in the neighborhood that is across from Oakdale, the one we just approved. This went on for several months as well. We had advisory committees. They did their weekend community meetings and they were well-attended as well. Then when it came up to the zoning changes, that meeting was very well-attended. No one objects to this. This is keeping the business on the main thoroughfares rather than in the middle of the neighborhoods.

And then it is also putting the zoning on these properties which have been in place for some time, so they have already been a neighborhood pub for several decades, so what we are doing is taking them out of the grandfather stage and putting them up into C-1 so they are in compliance with zoning.

So we are doing that, and as you may have seen on the news this past week, the Jacobs neighborhood got an infusion. We are going to take a

large school, and it is a little over a \$12 million apartment, and then senior apartments. This is all enhancing this. A lot of good things are happening in this neighborhood, and I encourage you support.

PRESIDENT YATES: Thank you, Councilwoman, for your work and leadership.

Is there any further discussion?

Hearing none, this is an ordinance requiring a roll call vote. Would the clerk please open the voting?

Without objection, the voting is closing.

Councilwoman Leet.

The voting is closed.

MADAM CLERK: There are 24 yes votes and two members not voting. PRESIDENT YATES: The ordinance passes.

Madam Clerk, a reading of item 54.

MADAM CLERK: AN ORDINANCE CHANGING THE ZONING FROM R-4 RESIDENTIAL SINGLE FAMILY TO C-1 COMMERCIAL ON PROPERTY LOCATED AT 6300 GREENWOOD ROAD CONTAINING 4.67 ACRES AND BEING IN LOUISVILLE METRO (CASE NO. 16ZONE1033).

PRESIDENT YATES: The ordinance is before us. Councilwoman Flood.

COUNCILWOMAN FLOOD: Thank you, Mr. President. This change of zoning is to allow a shopping center to be built with two restaurants with drive-throughs. It is also next to a mixed development area. There will be egress and ingress off the access road and at greenwood road, and this is

in councilman Rick Blackwell's district, and he may wish to address the council.

PRESIDENT YATES: Councilman Blackwell, would you like the floor?

COUNCILMAN BLACKWELL: It is a plan that early on they got neighbors on board to talk about the issues with greenwood and what they would be bringing, some of the possible tenants in the area. So they worked through some of the issues with traffic and so on and the residents are in favor as well. It will be a good they think for greenwood road and the area.

PRESIDENT YATES: Thank you, Council Member. Appreciate your work.

Is there any further discussion on this project?

This is an ordinance requiring a roll call vote. If the clerk would please open the voting.

Without objection, the voting is closing. The voting is closed. MADAM CLERK: There are 24 yes votes, two members not voting. PRESIDENT YATES: The ordinance passes.

Madam Clerk, a reading of item 55.

MADAM CLERK: AN ALLEY CLOSURE ORDINANCE OF APORTION OF A 10' ALLEY NORTH OF E. WASHINGTON STREET AND SOUTHWEST OF BUCHANAN STREET AND BEING IN LOUISVILLE METRO (CASE NO. 16STREETS1019).

Read in full.

PRESIDENT YATES: May I have a motion and second, please.

>> So moved.

>> Second.

PRESIDENT YATES: Properly moved and seconded. The ordinance is before us.

Last one, Councilwoman Flood.

COUNCILWOMAN FLOOD: Thank you, Mr. President, I'm not sure the reason why we are bringing the alley over. It usually goes on Consent Calendar. They are normally 100% of the property owners that abut these areas agree to this, but I'll give you the quick information of what I have and my understanding.

This is a ten-foot alley that begins at east Washington street and terminates at Buchanan. The reason for this closure, there was a minor subdivision plat to take the three lots that are existing now and make them two lots.

The staff received no comments or inquiries from any interested party. It is also associated with cases for a variance which had to have prior BOZA approval and also 16 minor plat, a minor plat change for the change of lots.

Also the metro health department, metro public works, the fire department also approved the closure of this little piece of alleyway. So I'm not sure what we are doing here.

PRESIDENT YATES: Thank you for that thorough explanation. Is there any further discussion? Hearing none, this is an ordinance requiring a roll call vote. If the clerk would please open the voting.

> Without objection, the voting is closing. The voting is closed. MADAM CLERK: There are 24 yes votes and two members not voting. PRESIDENT YATES: The ordinance passes. Madam Clerk, a reading of item 56, please.

MADAM CLERK: AN ORDINANCE CHANGING THE ZONING FROM R-4 AND R-5 RESIDENTIAL SINGLE FAMILY TO R-5A RESIDENTIAL MULTI-FAMILY ON PROPERTY LOCATED AT 11404, 11312 AND 11314 TAYLORSVILLE ROAD CONTAINING 29.071 ACRES AND BEING IN LOUISVILLE METRO (CASE NO. 16ZONE1020).

Read in full.

PRESIDENT YATES: May I have a motion and second for approval? >> So moved.

>> Second.

PRESIDENT YATES: Properly moved and seconded. The ordinance is before us. Last one, Councilwoman Flood.

COUNCILWOMAN FLOOD: Thank you, Mr. President. This change in zoning is to allow a 347-unit apartment complex to be built there. Two stories and three stories. 61% of the lot is treed at the present time. They are going to save 15% of the existing trees. It allows 12 dwelling units per acre which is slightly under what the density approved for this is. And if you may notice in the record it would have been unanimous but there was an abstention by a brand new member to the Planning Commission who did not make the first meeting, so there were two night meetings held on this. There was an approved turning lane. There are two areas for egress and ingress, but also I think the reason we are here tonight too is to let Councilman Benson, I believe he had been working on an amendment on a substreet, and I haven't been copies of that, so I would like to yield the floor to Councilman Benson.

> PRESIDENT YATES: Thank you, Councilwoman. Councilman Benson, the floor is yours.

COUNCILMAN BENSON: Thank you, Mr. President, madam chair. We have added a binding element for this. And one of the problems that I have had in my district, and most of our city's kind of developed out, but we don't have connectivity. Sometimes when we are developing property, we are having all this property and the roads are the same so the traffic just builds up and builds up and people just can't get around. And so in this situation we have come up with a situation possibly at the bottom of this property the people who have the apartment will give us access to the bottom of the land at the bottom of the property if we secure a road on the right side and the property on the left that would connect Chenowith Run Road to Taylorsville Road. And Sarah Martin has the amendment, and if she would read it and I will explain a little bit more.

SARAH MARTIN: The proposed amendment reads applicant/developer shall request of DPDS, metro public works, and transportation planning (Planning Commission to the extent its regulations require) that the approved detail district development plan in parentheses DDDP, end of parentheses, associated with the rezoning be revised to include reservation on its property of a future road corridor as shown on the attached exhibit to this ordinance amendment. If the approved DDDP as revised hereby is not approved as contemplated above, then the applicant/developer shall be under no continued obligation to include this future road corridor on its approved plans.

On the other hand, if it is approved as contemplated above, then the reservation shall continue until such time as a dedication of same is requested by metro public works, at which time -- be dedicated or until five years from date hereof, whichever shall first occur.

PRESIDENT YATES: Councilman, just to keep it clear, that would be the floor amendment?

>> Yes, sir.

PRESIDENT YATES: May I have a motion and second for the floor amendment?

>> I'll make a motion.

PRESIDENT YATES: And we will keep the discussion open.

>> To me we can't really get involved in zoning cases, and one of the things that I have a little bit of trouble with, and also it is getting clear to the people if planning, design, and public works, that we should be looking at our properties from above and find out if we are developing big parcels of land how can we make connector roads? Not roads that go from one subdivision to another and people are traveling through the neighborhood to get to someplace, that is not good. We need 35 miles an hour roads. And so by this amendment we have a right of way at the bottom of the property, and there is a curb right beside it that has a 1,000 foot driveway that they might donate that to the public, that we will now be able to connect that and with 1,000 feet to the left be able to go to Chenowith Run Road.

Then we would have a road that went from Chenowith Run Road, Taylorsville Road, take the pressure off Taylorsville Road and Chenowith run and Blankenbaker road, how can you get a really accurate traffic count if it is sitting still if traffic isn't moving, I don't know how you count a car. That is the way it is if the area. We have been told it is not going to be any worse than it was. And my view, that is not acceptable. Every time we have something, we should try to make it better. And so this

is a way that possibly -- and this piece of property and future properties that we are going to start trying to make a grid that makes our communities, makes the area I'm in, and I hope we can do this for every area, make transportation move. Because that is one of our problems in our community. If you want to live here, you like amenities but you want to be able to get to them. You don't want to sit in traffic. So I need y'all's approval of this binding element for this zoning case. Thank you.

PRESIDENT YATES: Thank you, Councilman, for that detailed explanation.

Councilman Brent Ackerson.

COUNCILMAN ACKERSON: Thank you, Mr. President. I sat on planning and zoning when we heard this, and the concern is the traffic problem. Taylorsville Road is already a bottleneck there. And what the councilman is talking about requiring a second or third entrance on Chenowith.

>> And Taylorsville Road.

COUNCILMAN ACKERSON: What I'm hearing is, A, this is not such a good idea because of the traffic congestion we have. But the alternative road could alleviate that. But what we have just heard, essentially, in my opinion, is in five years they are going to try to make it happen but if not the requirement goes away. What doesn't make sense to me is if we as a body are sitting here saying the congestion is too much already, that all of a sudden we don't have a guarantee really for a secondary road to handle this congestion. So it just seems without having the guarantee that we are making a poor decision here that has long-term ramifications to further complicate already a terrible congestion area. I think that we have a bigger responsibility than that. I don't have an alternative

suggestion here, but based upon the fact of hearing this is a problem, the congestion's a problem, my deduction is this development is a bad idea for this location at the moment. And until they guarantee it, I can't support that tonight. And I hope that we will think about these decisions we are making and if they are potentially bad, we will get guaranteed up front rather than playing the if-come.

Thank you, Mr. President.

PRESIDENT YATES: Thank you, Councilman. Is there any further discussion? Seeing none and hearing none, this is an ordinance requiring a roll call vote. Would the clerk please -- we do have the amendment. It has been motioned and seconded. It is before us. All those in favor of the floor amendment respond by saying aye. Opposed? The ayes have it. No discussion, please open the voting, Madam Clerk.

Without objection, the voting is closing. The voting is closed.

MADAM CLERK: There are 19 yes votes, five no votes, two members not voting. The no votes are Councilwoman Fowler, Councilwoman Parker, Councilman Benson, Councilman Peden, and Councilman Ackerson.

PRESIDENT YATES: The ordinance passes. The amended ordinance passes.
