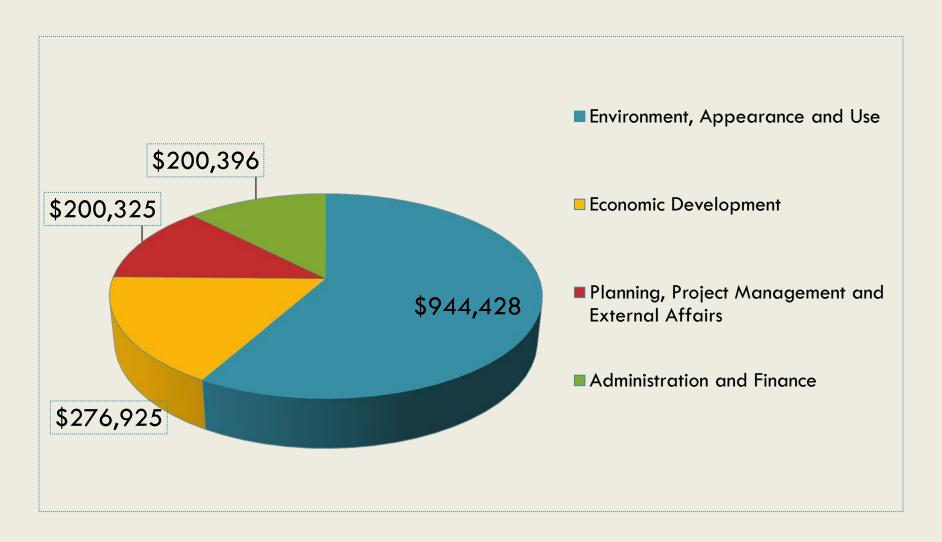

Physical Improvements & Safety

Some of the supplemental services provided by the BID include:

- 14 Ambassadors Over 27,000 staff hours of on-street services throughout the year
- 281,760 lbs. of trash collected from daily litter pickup throughout the BID
- 1,363 graffiti tags removed
- 487 block faces power washed
- 2,253 block faces of weed abatement
- Panhandling and homeless outreach
- Safety Escorts
- Snow removal at crosswalks

Special Beautification Projects

- 30 trees planted and maintained through MSD grants and private sector partnerships
- 150 flower pots planted and maintained
- 2,100 waterings per month during growing season
