- As a Level I Trauma Center, we know that no zip code in Jefferson County goes untouched by gun violence.
- UofL Hospital has been involved in violence reduction efforts since 2016. However, with the support of the Office of Safe and Healthy Neighborhoods, we expanded efforts in late 2018 and have modeled our program after Cure Violence.
- OSHN's leadership has provided the structure that allowed us and our external community
 partners to be on the same page and benefit from the synergy of a shared initiative.
- OSHN is also invaluable in facilitating connections to both local and national agencies.
- These local community connections directly benefit our patients, as they provide us a safe place
 to refer our patients once they leave the hospital. This community collaboration spearheaded
 by OSHN allows us to extend our impact past the hospital walls.
- Without the support from OSHN and Louisville Metro Government, we will not have the resources to provide wraparound support to our patients with the highest risk for re-injury.

Data:

- In 2018, 701 patients were treated with gunshot or stabbing injuries.
- So far in 2019, we have treated 109 patients for gunshot or stabbing injuries.
