REQUESTS

- Change in zoning from R-5 Single Family Residential to R-6 Multi Family Residential
- Waiver from LDC Section 10.2.4 to waive the required 10' property perimeter Landscape Buffer Area
- Detailed District Development Plan with Binding Elements

CASE SUMMARY/BACKGROUND

The subject property is located on N Jane Street near its intersection with Frankfort Avenue. The property is rectangular in shape, and currently developed with a single-family residential structure, with a detached garage on the rear alley. The applicant is renovating the property, having demolished a dilapidated addition on the rear of the principal structure in order to reconstruct it on the same footprint with a two-story camelback-style addition. The applicant proposes a change in zoning to permit the redevelopment of the garage into one dwelling unit, with two in the principal structure. The surrounding properties are in single-family residential use, with commercial uses located across the railroad tracks to the south, and multi-family residential use located to the north across Sycamore Avenue.

STAFF FINDING

Staff finds that the proposal generally meets the guidelines of the Comprehensive Plan and requirements of the Land Development Code with the exception of the requested waiver. The waiver has been adequately justified and meets the standard of review.

TECHNICAL REVIEW

Land Development Code (Louisville Metro)

Plan 2040

MSD and Transportation Planning have provided preliminary approval of the proposal.

The site is within the study area for the Clifton Neighborhood Plan.

The site is within the Clifton Historic Preservation District. The applicant has received approval for the exterior work under case numbers 17COA1104, 17COA1184 and 18COA1004.

INTERESTED PARTY COMMENTS

Neighbors George Hoge and Charlotte Caldwell wrote a letter to the Land Development and Transportation Committee opposing the request, stating that the character of the neighborhood would be changed by the new zoning district and that parking is a challenge on N Jane Street.

STANDARD OF REVIEW FOR REZONING

Criteria for granting the proposed form district change/rezoning: KRS Chapter 100.213

- 1. <u>The proposed form district/rezoning change complies with the applicable guidelines and policies</u> Plan 2040; **OR**
- 2. The existing form district/zoning classification is inappropriate and the proposed classification is appropriate; **OR**
- 3. There have been major changes of an economic, physical, or social nature within the area involved which were not anticipated in Plan 2040 which have substantially altered the basic character of the area.

STAFF ANALYSIS FOR CHANGE IN ZONING

The site is located in the Traditional Neighborhood Form District

This form is characterized by predominantly residential uses, by a grid pattern of streets with sidewalks and often including alleys. Residential lots are predominantly narrow and often deep, but the neighborhood may contain sections of larger estate lots, and also sections of lots on which appropriately integrated higher density residential uses may be located. The higher density uses are encouraged to be located in centers or near parks and open spaces having sufficient carrying capacity. There is usually a significant range of housing opportunities, including multi-family dwellings. Traditional neighborhoods often have and are encouraged to have a significant proportion of public open space such as parks or greenways, and may contain civic uses as well as appropriately located and integrated neighborhood centers with a mixture of mostly neighborhood-serving land uses such as offices, shops, restaurants and services. Although many existing traditional neighborhoods are 50 to 120 years old, the Traditional Neighborhood Form may be used when establishing new developments and redevelopments. Revitalization and reinforcement of the Traditional Neighborhood Form will require particular emphasis on (a) preservation and renovation of existing buildings in stable neighborhoods (if the building design is consistent with the predominant building design in those neighborhoods), (b) in the case of new developments or redevelopments using traditional building scales and site layouts, (c) the preservation of the existing or establishing a new grid pattern of streets and alleys, and (d) preservation of or creation of new public open spaces.

Following is staff's analysis of the proposed rezoning and change in form district against the Goals, Objectives and Policies of Plan 2040.

The proposal will not change the lot pattern or street pattern of the neighborhood, and will serve to increase the provision of housing in the area. The increase in density will provide two additional units on the lot. The Traditional Neighborhood form district often features a mixture of land uses and zoning districts, creating an environment in which mixed-use and mixed-income neighborhoods can develop.

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The units proposed on the lot are relatively small and will fill a niche in rental types. The lot is relatively large for the neighborhood, being twice as wide as a typical lot, with a larger principal structure and larger garage than is typical for the neighborhood.

The proposed zoning district and site plan are generally in compliance with the plan elements of Plan 2040, and with the CHASE principles in the Comprehensive Plan.

All other agency comments should be addressed to demonstrate compliance with the remaining Goals, Objectives and Policies of Plan 2040.

A checklist is attached to the end of this staff report with a more detailed analysis. The Louisville Metro Planning Commission is charged with making a recommendation to the Louisville Metro Council regarding the appropriateness of this zoning map amendment. The Louisville Metro Council has zoning authority over the property in question.

STANDARD OF REVIEW AND STAFF ANALYSIS FOR WAIVER OF SECTION 10.2.4

(a) The waiver will not adversely affect adjacent property owners; and

STAFF: The waiver will not adversely affect adjacent property owners as the existing lot pattern is not proposed to be changed, and the increase in intensity on the lot is relatively small (2 additional units).

(b) The waiver will not violate specific guidelines of Plan 2040; and

STAFF: The waiver will not violate specific guidelines of Plan 2040 as Plan 2040 encourages the provision of appropriate transitions between uses that are significantly different in scale or intensity. The scale and intensity of the proposed use will be similar to the scale and intensity of adjacent uses.

(c) The extent of the waiver of the regulation is the minimum necessary to afford relief to the applicant; and

STAFF: The extent of the waiver of the regulation is the minimum necessary to afford relief to the applicant as there is insufficient space between the structures on the lot and the property line to provide the required LBA.

(d) Either:

(i) The applicant has incorporated other design measures that exceed the minimums of the district and compensate for non-compliance with the requirements to be waived (net beneficial effect); **OR**

(ii) The strict application of the provisions of the regulation would deprive the applicant of the reasonable use of the land or would create an <u>unnecessary hardship on the applicant</u>.

STAFF: The strict application of the provisions of the regulation would deprive the applicant of the reasonable use of the land or would create an unnecessary hardship on the applicant by requiring the applicant to move the structures on the lot to provide the required LBA, a requirement which is infeasible.

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STANDARD OF REVIEW AND STAFF ANALYSIS FOR DDDP

- (a) The conservation of natural resources on the property proposed for development, including: trees and other living vegetation, steep slopes, water courses, flood plains, soils, air quality, scenic views, and historic sites;
 - STAFF: There do not appear to be any environmental constraints on the subject site. The principal structure on the site is eligible to be listed on the National Register of Historic Places but is not listed. It is proposed to be preserved and utilized as a rental unit.
- (b) The provisions for safe and efficient vehicular and pedestrian transportation both within the development and the community;
 - STAFF: Provisions for safe and efficient vehicular and pedestrian transportation within and around the development and the community has been provided, and Metro Public Works has approved the preliminary development plan.
- (c) The provision of sufficient open space (scenic and recreational) to meet the needs of the proposed development;
 - STAFF: There are no open space requirements pertinent to the current proposal.
- (d) The provision of adequate drainage facilities on the subject site in order to prevent drainage problems from occurring on the subject site or within the community;
 - STAFF: The Metropolitan Sewer District has approved the preliminary development plan and will ensure the provision of adequate drainage facilities on the subject site in order to prevent drainage problems from occurring on the subject site or within the community.
- (e) The compatibility of the overall site design (location of buildings, parking lots, screening, landscaping) and land use or uses with the existing and projected future development of the area;
 - STAFF: The overall site design and land uses are compatible with the existing and future development of the area. The area is in the Traditional Neighborhood form district, which generally features a mixture of compatible zoning districts and land uses.
- (f) Conformance of the development plan with the Comprehensive Plan and Land Development
 Code. Revised plan certain development plans shall be evaluated for conformance with the nonresidential and mixed-use intent of the form districts and comprehensive plan.
 - STAFF: The development plan conforms to applicable guidelines and policies of the Comprehensive Plan and to requirements of the Land Development Code.

REQUIRED ACTIONS

- **RECOMMEND** that Metro Council **APPROVE** or **DENY** the **Change-in-Zoning** from R-5 to R-6
- APPROVE or DENY the Waiver
- APPROVE or DENY the Detailed District Development Plan with Binding Elements



4. **Proposed Binding Elements**

1. The development shall be in accordance with the approved district development plan, all applicable sections of the Land Development Code (LDC) and agreed upon binding elements unless amended pursuant to the Land Development Code. Any changes/additions/alterations of any binding element(s) shall be submitted to the Planning Commission or the Planning Commission's designee for review and approval; any changes/additions/alterations not so referred shall not be valid.

- 2. No outdoor advertising signs, small freestanding signs, pennants, balloons, or banners shall be permitted on the site.
- 3. Construction fencing shall be erected when off-site trees or tree canopy exists within 3' of a common property line. Fencing shall be in place prior to any grading or construction to protect the existing root systems from compaction. The fencing shall enclose the entire area beneath the tree canopy and shall remain in place until all construction is completed. No parking, material storage or construction activities are permitted within the protected area.
- 4. Before any permit (including but not limited to building, parking lot, change of use, site disturbance, alteration permit or demolition permit) is requested:
 - a. The development plan must receive full construction approval from Construction Review, Louisville Metro Public Works and the Metropolitan Sewer District.
 - b. The property owner/developer must obtain approval of a detailed plan for screening (buffering/landscaping) as described in Chapter 10 prior to requesting a building permit. Such plan shall be implemented prior to occupancy of the site and shall be maintained thereafter.
- 5. A certificate of occupancy must be received from the appropriate code enforcement department prior to occupancy of the structure or land for the proposed use. All binding elements requiring action and approval must be implemented prior to requesting issuance of the certificate of occupancy, unless specifically waived by the Planning Commission.
- 6. The residential character of the structure shall be maintained. Changes to the following items shall not be made without prior approval of the Planning Commission or its designee:
 - a. roof line
 - b. building material
 - c. porch
 - d. windows
- 7. The applicant, developer, or property owner shall provide copies of these binding elements to tenants, purchasers, contractors, subcontractors and other parties engaged in development of this site and shall advise them of the content of these binding elements. These binding elements shall run with the land and the owner of the property and occupant of the property shall at all times be responsible for compliance with these binding elements. At all times during development of the site, the applicant and developer, their heirs, successors; and assignees, contractors, subcontractors, and other parties engaged in development of the site, shall be responsible for compliance with these binding elements.

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
