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

Community Form, Goal 2, Policy 5.

Locate retail commercial development in activity centers where it can be demonstrated that sufficient population exists or is anticipated to support it.

#### FINDINGS OF FACT FOR DENIAL

#### Case Number 20-ZONE-0034

#### 11800, 11806, 11900, 11908 East Orell Road and 11705 Dixie Highway

The applicant proposes to re-zone the above properties from R-4 single-family residential to C-1 commercial, demolish the existing residential and other buildings and construct a convenience store and fueling station. For the reasons below, this proposal does not comply with the applicable Plan Elements of the Plan 2040 Comprehensive Plan. The existing zoning classification given to the property is appropriate. The proposed zoning classification is inappropriate and not in agreement with the 2040 Comprehensive Plan. There have been no major changes of an economic, physical or social nature which have altered the basic character of the area of the property.

#### **Community Form**

The proposal does not comply with the intent and applicable policies of the Community Form Plan Elements of the 2040 Comprehensive Plan. The new development is not compatible with the scale and site design of nearby existing development, as evidenced by the many objections from the nearby public. The proposal constitutes a non-residential expansion into an existing residential area. It will have negative impacts such as displacement of residents, loss of affordable housing units, increased traffic on a local road, and increased lighting and noise in a residential area. There is no adequate buffer or transition between lower density residential and non-residential usage. While the site abuts Dixie Highway on one side, it abuts a local road on the other.

Plan 2040 defines an "activity center" as: "An area of concentrated, mixed-use activity that often has a residential component." Plan 2040 also defines a "neighborhood center" as "Mixture of neighborhood- serving land uses such as offices, shops, restaurants and services ..." This single commercial building cannot be considered an activity center or a neighborhood center. It is merely an isolated commercial use, an example, if allowed, of spot zoning. It is not located in or near an activity center. It is not compatible with adjacent uses. There is no proposal for any residential on the site (even though C-1 zoning would permit that), thus the proposal is not a mixed-use proposal. The plan proposes to demolish the existing residential structures instead of any possible rehabilitation or continued use.

The proposal violates Goal 1, Policy 2.1 because it is incompatible with surrounding uses. It violates Goal 1, policy 3.1.8 because the depth of the new Suburban marketplace Corridors form district invades a residential neighborhood and because the new form district boundary is not within an existing corridor and has great potential for disruption of an established residential neighborhood. It violates Goal 1, Policy 6 because it had adverse impacts relating to traffic, lighting, noise, odor explosion, displacement of residents, and loss of affordable housing. It violates Goal 1, Policy 9 because does not provide an appropriate

transition between uses that are substantially different in scale and intensity. It violates Goal 1, Policy 10 because it does not provide an adequate buffer between uses substantially different in intensity. It violates goal 1, Policy 12 because it does not minimize adverse impacts from noise, lights and other potential impacts. It violates Goal 1, Policy 16 because it does not protect human health from noxious odors, gases, particulates and emissions. It violates goal 1, Policy 17 because it does not protect Flowervale from heavy truck traffic. It violates Goal 1, Policy 18 because it does not provide any noise barrier. It violates Goal 1, Policy 19 because it does not mitigate adverse impacts of lighting on nearby residences and on the night sky. It violates Goal 1 Policy 21 because it does not locate hazardous or flammable or explosive materials away from the residential area. It violates Goal 2, Policy 5 because it does not locate a retail development in an activity center and because the retail would merely duplicate other similar retail establishments in the neighborhood, resulting in an inadequate population to support it. This neighborhood just does not need another convenience store and fueling station.

#### Mobility

The proposal does not comply with Goal 1, Policy 1. (1.4) because it does not provide sidewalks on E. Orell Road. It violates Goal 3, Policy 4.3 because its 24-hour operation would be disruptive of the nearby residential properties.

#### **Economic Development**

The proposal does not comply with the intent and applicable policies of the Economic Development Plan Elements of the 2040 Comprehensive Plan. It violates Goal 1, Policy 3 because the proposed commercial use is located partially on a major arterial street but also on a local road. It is at a location where nuisances and activities of the proposed use will adversely affect adjacent residential uses. It violates Goal 2, Objective b because it does not protect the economic value of neighborhoods.

# Livability

The proposal does not comply with the intent and applicable policies of the Livability Plan Elements of the 2040 Comprehensive Plan. The proposal does not consider the impact of the proposed development on air quality.

#### Housing

The proposal does not comply with the policies of the Housing Plan Elements described in Goal 2, Policy 1; Goal 2, Policy 2; and Goal 3, Policy 3.. While C-1 zoning does permit higher density housing options that would support aging in place, this proposal not only does not propose any such housing, it proposes to demolish the residential units currently on the site. The plan does not propose any housing which includes affordable housing. In fact, it proposes demolishing the affordable housing on the site currently and displacing the current residents. It does not encourage the use of vacant property for new housing.

I am unsure what the status of this application process is, but feel compelled to weigh in **for the record** about the previous Planning & Zoning Commission meeting regarding this case.

First, I and others who have participated in numerous online meetings during the Co-vid crisis, remain concerned that Metro meetings conducted via Web-Ex puts the public at an even greater disadvantage than usual. Under normal conditions, it is NEVER an even playing field for ordinary citizens protecting their neighborhoods from projects that could negatively affect their investment and quality of life long-term. Unless one is a development attorney, a planning staff member, commissioner or a community advocate who attends such meetings on a frequent basis, Planning & Zoning Commission meetings can seem surreal and scary.

Unfortunately, the March 1st meeting regarding this case was even more so. From my vantage point on-line, from beginning to end, the sound quality went from bad to worse. At first, the echo factor in a spacious hall, exacerbated by social distancing was just off-putting; but, soon the "noise" over-rode almost anything said onsite. Consequently, the only person I heard with reasonable clarity was the applicant's attorney, Cliff Ashburner. After that, the ambient sound worsened dramatically; so, it was definitely a good call to suspend the meeting.

I am not sure how many were online like myself, but some of the commissioners who were-- mentioned they couldn't hear <u>long before</u> Ms. Parker and those onsite realized how difficult it was. We applaud the Commission for respecting the neighborhood's desire for an evening meeting that the community could more easily access, in person. We hope, in a continued effort to accommodate the community we all serve, the neighborhood is allowed to repeat its testimony at tomorrow's meeting.

I plan to be present tomorrow, but will not attempt to speak again--to allow our Valley Station neighbors who went unheard or were poorly understood--time to have their say.

However, in closing, we must again state our support for the community and all who <u>oppose</u> this project. Our land use laws are designed to protect the many from the few who will profit from a development certain to disrupt the peace, comfort and safety of their neighbors. Whatever compromises RaceTrac may now agree to, their prior refusal to make minor changes, in deference to the neighborhood's modest requests, informs us how they will be as neighbors.

Since RaceTrac's proposed site will compel us once again to deviate from the protections our codes provide, nor does RaceTrac fulfill our community's more compelling needs, we urge the Planning & Zoning Commission to deny this application.

- 3) Study shows Benzene and other pollutants as far as 328 feet away from gas station. Recommend gas pump be 500 feet from nearest house or school or work
- 4) Federal Housing Administration (FHA) insured mortgages are not available for properties located within 300 feet of tanks capable of storing 1,000 gallons or more of gasoline or other flammable-explosive materials. This restriction appears in Section 2-2M of the HUD Handbook Valuation Analysis for Single Family One- to Four- Unit Dwellings.
- 5) Is RaceTrac Needed? Per CED standard, we have enough gas station/convenient stores in 2.5 mile radius to accommodate the current population
- 6) Is proposed location Good or Bad for store/station:
  - a) At least 500 feet from the nearest home; or
  - b) Buffered so the store cannot be seen or heard from the nearest home;
  - c) To preserve public health a minimum if 500 feet from homes and 1,000 feet from schools;
  - d) Not within view of historic resources;
- e) At least 500 feet from wells, springs, streams, reservoirs or other highly sensitive ground or surface water resources:
  - f) Accessible by foot and bike as well as cars;
  - g) Convenience stores should be located at least a 10-minute walk (0.5 miles) from schools;
  - h) Located in a downtown or neighborhood commercial area;
  - i) Well lit, but not to the point of causing light trespass into nearby homes;
  - j) In an area with many passersby and few escape routes for criminals; and
- k) In an area where the market can accommodate a new store without putting existing ones out of business.
- 7) Zoning change justified? It is difficult to envision a situation where a convenience stores and gas station would be a compatible use in or adjacent to a residential area. This is why most zoning ordinances restrict these uses to commercially-zoned properties.
- 8) Health research The research indicates that the most reliable way to protect public health and safety from benzene and other harmful emissions is to guide new gas stations to sites where they will be at least 500 feet from residentially zoned properties, schools, and other locations where people live, learn or work.

- 1) Discourage non-residential expansion into existing residential areas unless applicant can demonstrate that any adverse impact on residential uses will be mitigated. Evaluation of impacts may include, but not be limited to, displacement of residents, loss of affordable housing units..."
- 2) The built environment supports the natural environment by considering air, water, and soil quality"
- 3) Improves quality of life for all citizens by encouraging green practices in development and redevelopment of buildings, transportation, and infrastructure" ... "harmonious with the natural environment
- 4) Growth and development patterns are implemented to foster health and prosperity for all neighborhoods.
- 5) Livability- Ensure equitable health and safety outcomes for all.
- 6) All neighborhoods are provided equal environmental protection.
- 7) Strengthen and expand programs that reduce the risk from environmental hazards in residential neighborhoods including lead removal and abatement.

- 8) Clean air, water, and soil to promote healthy environment.

Ensure that parking, loading, and delivery is adequate and convenient for motorists and does not negatively impact nearby residents or pedestrians.
- 11) "Consider impacts on human health, quality of life"... "Special attention should be paid to air and water quality when residences, schools, parks, or vulnerable populations will be impacted."
- 12) Mitigate adverse impacts of traffic from proposed development on nearby existing communities.
- 13) Mitigate adverse impacts of lighting from proposed development on nearby properties, and on the night sky

We all know what has happened to our country since covid. Still, we were told an in-person meeting not hybrid with all

all the planning panel.

I do not know who picked the meeting site but a gym is not usually have the best audio quality.

We were told the decision would be made that night. It didn't seem like anyone of the panel was willing to come up

any suggestions. Only after the break when we were told: Next meeting date March 18. No one can speak EXCEPT

Cliff from Race Trac could finish his rebuttal. We could all come to the meeting place, but no one can speak. The time

is 1pm.

Most of the citizens in the room are working moms and dads that cannot just take time off to listen in. We have been

doing that all along. After the meeting we found out why everything was cut short and without any discussion. Seems

like some of the planning panel was UPSET THEY WERE ONLY MAKING 5cents an hour. They never mentioned the

Now Rac Trac has 18 days to investigate all the information presented at the meeting. Already when Cliff was presenting

other fueling stations close to neighborhoods. He said more than once they were located in the EAST END. Take

NONE OF THESE FUELING STATIONS HAD SEMI FUELING.

NO WAY CAN YOU CAN TRULY THINK THIS IS THE RIGHT THING TO DO. AT LEAST ALLOW OUR ATTORNEY TO REBUTTAL AFTER THE FUELING STATION HAS HAD 18 DAYS TO PREPARE.

enough room.

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
Dante,

I am writing in regards to the embarrassing display of a fair public hearing held on Monday, March 1<sup>st</sup>. The entire hearing was calamitous from the beginning. We were forced to start 30 minutes late because all three thermometers were malfunctioning, causing numerous community members to leave because they could no longer stand in the cold. The heat was also not turned on in the gymnasium and it was extremely uncomfortable and cold throughout the four hour long hearing.

In terms of the hearing itself, it was one of the most poorly planned major community events I have ever attended. This is not a small or insignificant public hearing, this is a major decision for our community, one that will have an enormous impact on our lives if this goes through, especially my family that live on E. Orell Rd.

At the absolute bare minimum, all of those in attendance should be able to clearly see any visual presentations and audibly hear the speakers for both the applicant and the opposition, however, this was not the case. I sat directly behind the microphone in the second row and I could barely see what was on the projector during Cliff's presentation. It was extremely blurry and the screen looked like an out of focus camera lens. I created a presentation and struggled to read the content from my own slides from the blurry screen. There was no way anyone sitting behind me could see anything on the screen.

When it was my turn to speak I was met by a laptop sitting on top of two boxes of Dixie Cold Cups. I am at a loss at how a public hearing of this magnitude does not have a podium for speakers to place their notes during a presentation. I had to lay my notes on the keyboard of a laptop horizontal to the ground. It was very difficult to read my notes and efficiently turn my pages as I spoke. You can see from the below picture just how small the projector was and how laughable the microphone and podium set up really was for our hearing.



Also, the acoustics and sound quality of the facility were horrendous. When a speaker on the zoom call spoke, a loud ear piercing echo would ring throughout the gymnasium, making it impossible to hear what was being said. This was extremely significant in this hearing in regards to our requested concessions, which were repeatedly denied by RaceTrac. Our request for a large sound wall or earth berm to block the noise was denied due to a Noise Assessment performed by a sound engineer. Ironically, it was the sound engineer who had the worst audio of anyone on the zoom call, of which no one in the room, not even Cliff, could make out anything he was saying. His designated time to speak was a complete waste of time as no one could hear anything he was saying. However, his assessment plays a significant role in the outcomes of this hearing.

Perhaps the most disappointing and appalling part of the hearing was the ending. Because we went over our allotted time by five minutes, Cliff was given a total of 20 minutes. I timed his rebuttal from my phone and know he was right around the 15 minute mark of his allotted 20 minutes. Why all of a sudden was there a technical issue of which no one could suddenly hear? We sat in a metal chair for four hours and with 5 minutes left, the hearing decision was postponed two and a half weeks later! This is completely UNACCEPTABLE and tips the scale of balance in favor of Cliff and RaceTrac. He now has two and a half weeks to listen to the meeting and carefully craft and perfect his rebuttal. How is this fair to the people of this community? We have a RIGHT to due process for a fair public hearing and the ending raises legitimate concerns of foul play.

Me, my wife, and 4 and 1 year old daughters are in a panic scrambling to figure out what we are going to do if this unneeded gas station that provides ZERO value to our community goes through. With five minutes left, this hearing should have been completed on Monday night plain and simple! Instead, the outcome has been delayed another two and a half weeks! We signed a petition to have this hearing held and completed in person at night! The meeting on March 18<sup>th</sup> will be virtual 1:00pm during the day. This does not honor what we and our community are rightfully owed.

Can you please confirm that Cliff will not have a full 20 minutes to provide his rebuttal and will only be allotted the remaining time he had left on Monday night?

We are residents of Winding Brook subdivision and attended the in-person hearing on Monday, March 1st. The meeting was a major disappointment and we left feeling our voices and concerns were not heard or validated.

Many of our residents worked countless hours petitioning for the evening In-person hearing, fundraising to retain a lawyer, and diligently gathered information on the dangers of a huge truck fueling center being built 250 feet from our residential homes.

There were numerous glitches that occurred throughout the evening, that involved the set up within the facility. We found the proceedings to be unprofessional, and lacking a sense of urgency regarding the negative impact this Race Trac will have on our community.

#### These concerns include:

- 1) The meeting was delayed 30 min for "battery dead" thermometers which forced many people to wait in the cold and some to leave before it even began.
- 2) A makeshift podium was made of two styrofoam cup boxes with a computer placed on top and a microphone stand nearby. Speakers had no where to place notes/materials while presenting.
- 3) The screen provided was inadequate for the size of the venue and social distancing. It was impossible to see anything unless you were seated directly in front of the screen.
- 4) The acoustics and sound quality were horrible.
- 5) The conclusion of the zoning hearing was both alarming and disturbing. Why would you allow a meeting to continue for more than four hours and then abruptly reschedule with only five minutes remaining of Mr. Ashbumer's rebuttal? 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#### Dante & Cindy--

I'd like to address what happened on Monday, March 1st during the in-person meeting. There are many aspects to this meeting that are reprehensible and honestly, frankly, illegal and ignored our right to due process.

First, the process by which people had the temperature taken at the door was abysmal. My wife and kids waited in line outside for 30 minutes for a simple temperature check. The process wasn't smooth and no redundancy plan was in place for something as simple as low batteries. This detoured many concerned citizens from coming and having their voice heard.

Second, the facility itself was a major disappointment on many levels. The temperature inside the room was in the upper 50's. That's well outside the range of acceptability for us to sit in for 4+ hours. At no point during my 4 hours inside the facility did the heat ever turn on. Keep in mind, it's winter. I sat in my quality down coat (made by Patagonia) the entire time and was shivering. Also, the facility acoustics were horrendous. I'll address this more later, but the room echoed so much it was impossible to hear anything.

Third, the manor in which we were subjected to present and make public comments was unacceptable. A computer was placed on top of two boxes of styrofoam cups with a microphone in your face. There was no reasonable place for a speaker to put their notes to read from and reference. This is not acceptable and honestly a form of oppressing the voices of people. You all should no better.

Fourth, the screen provided was absolutely inadequate. I sat directly in front of the screen in the second row. I could not read it. I could not read the names of the commissioners to even know who was speaking. I have 20/20 vision. The lumens and the projector chosen for this event is designed for a small office presentation. Not for a gym with people socially distanced. A public hearing is about me being able to connect with the people in power. The screen made this impossible.

Fifth, the sound quality (which ultimately brought the meeting to a close), was abysmal and made voices unrecognizable. At no point could I ever truly understand what was being said by anyone on the video teleconference call. The point of a public hearing is for me to hear public comments and for the public/government to hear my comments. This simple right was denied.

Sixth, if this meeting goes into record as to occuring we will be faced with filing a suit against the Metro board because you did not provide acceptable accommodations for our voices to be heard.

You all should be ashamed of yourself for the meeting you put together. This is a travesty of due process. You have denied your citizens of a basic American right-that our voice gets to be heard. If you do move forward and accept that meeting, be warned a lawsuit will be filed about this travesty.

I encourage you to do the right thing. It may be difficult. But you must do the right thing.

#### Dante,

I want to thank everyone for the effort to honor our petition for an in-person meeting. It was very difficult to hear anything over the audio except for those in the room. The projector was so hard to see. At times it seemed as if it was a computer screen from across the room. I hope that our case will be given more attention since we feel as if our voices were not carried out as a unity on both sides of the issue.

We are residents at 6324 Winding Stream Drive. I lie behind the houses on E. Orell. From my kitchen table I will see semi-trucks & cars. I love to see the mature trees. My husband & I have money invested in hiring Steve Porter. We are very disappointed that Racetrak would not agree to any of our proposals. Last night I left the meeting worried that going into retirement our equity could be completely diminished. I knew the value had went down when I heard a resident on that street had passed last year. The house sold very low. On into our neighborhood two houses sold lower than comps. One new neighbor said they would not have bought the house had they known. During the meeting we learned a homeless camp was set up over the winter in our easement. I use to love this county but I no longer have the love I use to have.

Our section of Dixie leading into West Point has no traffic barriers. The Dixie Hwy project has undergone concrete barriers from Saint Andrews traveling into Shively North Bound. There have been cross over accidents down that stretch heading towards Hwy 44. A crossover accident involving a semi could be devasting especially if one is carrying fuel. Christie's restaurant has had tremendous issues with truckers parking over night as well the parking lot where the old Target used to be across from Phelps Hardware. Cindi Fowler has been called multiple times regarding their disregard for parking at the old Target. The number of truckers on the road is extreme during this pandemic. Dixie Hwy is the worst road in the state of Kentucky as far as fatalities. Many call it Dixie Die Way. Horrible isn't it. Last night one of the speakers family was killed on Dixie by a stolen vehicle going the wrong way. She was only 17. The girls father and our neighbor are cousins. Racetrak did not have adiquate comparisons regarding other fuel stations. There is no room around the land for trucks to turn around. There are several curbs in Winding Brook as well as Flowervale and another curb towards Medora Elementary School if they get turned around. New truckers always try to push the envelope and take routes that could get them stuck. Cliff the attorney mentioned the rail crossing across E Orell. It is a slow service run no fast moving trains. This project would involve tearing down two beautiful farm houses. Many of us settled here because we loved the beauty. We always assumed a fast food place could go into the corner. My husband & I have raised kids here and fear no one would buy from us to raise their kids because of this. We all walk to Dairy Queen in the winter its buy one get one free if it snows. We go in the dark sometimes. We hoped for another small restaurant to go in so we could walk somewhere else. There are so many deteriorated buildings down Dixie and empty gas stations where others have left. Why does our city never develop used up spaces. Properties are discarded like yesterdays newspapers.

Many businesses have had to hire off duty police officers to handle the extreme amount of homelessness camps & theft as well as drug use. WalMart about three or four years ago at least had to spend months clearing out a camp behind the valley station store. They are a major retailer who had to go through extremes to have them removed. The store was so bad during that time. There currently is a homeless camp on the online ramp onto Gene Snyder. This is state owned so locals are waiting on them to have removal in place. Racetrak never talked about security. Police officers want pay not free beverages. I shop at Kroger in Valley Station & they have had to hire LMPD because employees took matters into their own hands. I know an employee who was suspended because they tried to stop a purse snatching and when the exited the building he got into trouble. His job was saved but the employees said enough was enough. I know someone who works at Kroger Corporate and the Shively Kroger store that closed experienced over 2 million dollars in theft the last year they were open. Will Racetrak hire police or just offer beverages. There have been overdoses at many gas stations. Will the attendant inside run off the homeless, stop a theft & outside drinking, or save someone from an overdose? I'm concerned this could end up in a class action lawsuit because of property loss and disregard for safety. Racetrak has offered no compensation for the property loss to middle class residents of this neighborhood. E. Orell residents could lose their shirt if mortgage companies get wind of this. People cannot owe more than a property is worth. A truck fueling station belongs off major interstate like I65. Dixie is a highway not a major interstate. Too many residents. No truck fueling should be allowed. We hired Steve because Cliff would never answer our calls. He ignored us at every turn during this past year. We had to seek counsel because our voices were not heard. Our dream of home ownership is all we have. If we lose our homes value, what do we work towards?

To provide a lack of voice to constituents is demeaning toward the residents and humiliating for those responsible for conducting this meeting.

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Good afternoon.

My name is Melody Burns and I live in the Winding Brook subdivision. My address is 11605 Winding Stream Way and my house faces Flowervale Lane. I have lived here since August 2008.

I wanted to share a major safety concern I have regarding an entrance/exit onto Flowervale as it relates to emergency vehicles. At least once a day, and sometimes multiple times a day, emergency vehicles turn off of Dixie onto Flowervale. This is the only access to hundreds of homes without having to back track to Valley Station Road. The entrance/exit is not only a concern for large truck access, but for any vehicle access.

I wonder if you have visited this location in person. I believe you have seen photos, videos and drawings, but these mediums do not capture how narrow and compact this area is or how short of a distance it is from Dixie to where the entrance/exit would be. All of the left turn traffic lights on Dixie have been changed to flashing yellow, so people turn very fast off of Dixie onto Flowervale. If someone were turning out of RaceTrac at the same time, it would a very dangerous. There is a hill and it is very difficult to see when cars are coming down Flowervale towards Dixie. It is already difficult enough with the entrance/exit to Dairy Queen. Having to also look for cars coming out of this structure at the same time would be nearly impossible. With cars coming out of this structure, out of Dairy Queen, coming down Flowervale towards Dixie, and turning onto Flowervale from Dixie, this could make for a very dangerous situation.

Also, in front of my house, on Flowervale, there is a very sharp curve where multiple accidents have happened in the 12 years since I have lived here, at least one of them fatal. The most recent accidents were last Thursday, 1/28/21, which was a single car accident. Then on Sunday, 1/31/21, there was a head-on accident involving two cars. In each of these accidents, the police came and the cars had to be towed off. An ambulance also came on Sunday. The last thing that is needed is additional traffic in this area where cars and trucks are making a right turn out of RaceTrac to then turn around and go back to Dixie.

Even worse would be for cars and semis to use our subdivision as a turn-around. We are a small subdivision with no outlet and no thru streets. Children ride their bikes and many neighbors walk and jog around the subdivision, including me on my daily walk with my dog.

I obviously am against this structure even being built, literally in our front yards, for so many reasons including noise, theft, drugs, etc. However, if it is built the very least that can be done is eliminate the entrance/exit on Flowervale. This has the potential to be a life and death matter for my children (who drive), my neighbors and me.

I am a resident that lives on East Orell Road. Steve Porter is representing our neighborhood in this case. We are needing these concessions that he had proposed to be met. What we are asking for is listed below.

- 1. The proposed green space on the eastern portion of the property which is not being developed as a fuel center and convenience store shall remain R-4 zoning and shall be landscaped and maintained by the owner.
- 2. On the entire eastern edge of the portion of the property which is to be developed (not along E. Orell Rd.), a ten-foot tall masonry wall shall be constructed and maintained.
- 3. Permanent overhead barriers, 12.5 feet high, shall be placed at the Flowervale entrance/exit and at the driveway leading from the large-truck filling area to the regular customer area.
  - 4. No vehicles shall park and idle on the property for longer than fifteen minutes at any time of day.
  - 5. The entire operation shall be closed between the hours of 12:00 midnight and 6:00 AM.
  - 6. Lighting:
- a) All exterior lighting, whether freestanding or attached to any structure, shall be fully shielded, shall utilize flat or hidden lenses, and shall be pointed directly to the ground.
  - b) No LED or metal halide lighting shall have a correlated color temperature (CCT) exceeding 3000 degrees Kelvin.
  - c) No parking lot light fixtures shall be more than fourteen feet high, measured from ground level.
  - 7. Signage:
    - a) No lighted signage, attached or freestanding, shall be visible from residences on E. Orell Rd.
    - b) All freestanding signage shall not exceed six feet in height, measured from ground level.
    - c) No changing image or moving signs shall be permitted except signs displaying gas prices only.

The rationales for the above binding elements are as follows:

1. If the entire property is rezoned C-1, that will allow commercial uses on E. Orell Rd. directly across the street from existing single-family residences. Those potential uses could be very detrimental to the residents along E. Orell rd.

- 2. A visual and sound barrier is needed along the edge of the development to protect residents from disturbing sound, light, exhaust, debris and trespass. A small fence along E. Orell Rd. does not accomplish this.
- 3. Overhead barriers are needed to prevent tractor trailer trucks (typically 13.5 to 14 feet tall) from entering and exiting on Flowervale and from interfering with other customers at the convenience store. This limit will not interfere with any emergency vehicles (typically under 12.5 feet tall).
  - 4. Restrictions on idling are necessary to prevent dangerous fumes and obnoxious noise.
  - 5. Restricting hours of operation will reduce nighttime disturbance to nearby residents.
  - 6. Lighting restrictions will protect nearby residents as well as motorists on Dixie Highway.
  - 7. Signage restrictions will protect nearby residents as well as motorists on Dixie Highway.

The masonry wall is crucial to those of us that live on East Orell Road. We will not be able to sit in our living room in our home without seeing and hearing semi's and other vehicles pulling in and out all day and night. We are also concerned with how much light will be projected towards our houses as we have bedrooms on the front of our home. It is heartbreaking to have a fueling station be built right in front of our homes that we have invested in, but if it is going to happen, we need for these concessions to be met in order for us to be able to continue to live in our homes.

It looks like the RaceTrac proposal will be scheduled for a public hearing. As you know, I represent the residential neighbors adjacent to this property. We have attempted to obtain some concessions from the developer that might make the proposal less problematic for the neighborhood. However, we have been denied every one of our suggestions.

As you prepare your staff report, we request that you include the following binding elements in your report:

- 1. The proposed green space on the eastern portion of the property which is not being developed as a fuel center and convenience store shall remain R-4 zoning and shall be landscaped and maintained by the owner.
- 2. On the entire eastern edge of the portion of the property which is to be developed (not along E. Orell Rd.), a ten-foot tall masonry wall shall be constructed and maintained.
- 3. Permanent overhead barriers, 12.5 feet high, shall be placed at the Flowervale entrance/exit and at the driveway leading from the large-truck filling area to the regular customer area.
  - 4. No vehicles shall park and idle on the property for longer than fifteen minutes at any time of day.
  - 5. The entire operation shall be closed between the hours of 12:00 midnight and 6:00 AM.
  - 6. Lighting:
- a) All exterior lighting, whether freestanding or attached to any structure, shall be fully shielded, shall utilize flat or hidden lenses, and shall be pointed directly to the ground.
  - b) No LED or metal halide lighting shall have a correlated color temperature (CCT) exceeding 3000 degrees Kelvin.
  - c) No parking lot light fixtures shall be more than fourteen feet high, measured from ground level.
  - 7. Signage:
    - a) No lighted signage, attached or freestanding, shall be visible from residences on E. Orell Rd.
    - b) All freestanding signage shall not exceed six feet in height, measured from ground level.
    - c) No changing image or moving signs shall be permitted except signs displaying gas prices only.

The rationales for the above binding elements are as follows:

- 1. If the entire property is rezoned C-1, that will allow commercial uses on E. Orell Rd. directly across the street from existing single-family residences. Those potential uses could be very detrimental to the residents along E. Orell rd.
- 2. A visual and sound barrier is needed along the edge of the development to protect residents from disturbing sound, light, exhaust, debris and trespass. A small fence along E. Orell Rd. does not accomplish this.
- 3. Overhead barriers are needed to prevent tractor trailer trucks (typically 13.5 to 14 feet tall) from entering and exiting on Flowervale and from interfering with other customers at the convenience store. This limit will not interfere with any emergency vehicles (typically under 12.5 feet tall).
  - 4. Restrictions on idling are necessary to prevent dangerous fumes and obnoxious noise.
  - 5. Restricting hours of operation will reduce nighttime disturbance to nearby residents.
  - 6. Lighting restrictions will protect nearby residents as well as motorists on Dixie Highway.
  - 7. Signage restrictions will protect nearby residents as well as motorists on Dixie Highway.

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#### Steve:

I've had the chance to discuss your concerns with the team at RaceTrac and have the following response to your suggested changes.

- 1. RaceTrac will not amend the zoning line at this time.
- 2. RaceTrac is proposing an 8' solid fence and landscaping near Orell. RaceTrac hired a sound engineer with extensive experience designing sound walls. Based on the fact that the major source of noise in the area is from Dixie Highway, not the proposed use, a sound wall will not mitigate the major source of noise anywhere on the rear of the RaceTrac facility. The proposed fence will be opaque and provide a good visual buffer.
- 3. I don't understand how the difference between grading the site to get to a given elevation gradually or abruptly would impact your clients. RaceTrac would prefer to grade the site gradually.
- 4. The requested barriers are not necessary. The way the site is configured, RaceTrac does not believe it is possible for a full sized truck/trailer to use the customer parking area, nor is it possible for the truck to maneuver into it. If you have information that differs from that, please let me know. I also believe that the barriers you describe could impact emergency vehicles.
- 5. The proposed RaceTrac, being a corporate-owned store, will operate as other RaceTrac stores do, including with regard to hours of operation. The store will be open 24 hours per day.
- 6. RaceTrac cannot agree to eliminate idling completely but there is already signage included at the pumps advising drivers to turn their vehicles off.
- 7. We can agree to comply with the LDC regarding lighting but cannot agree to the height or color limitations. On signage, we will not have an LED screen-style sign (changing image) but the sign will have numbers that change as fuel prices fluctuate. We cannot agree to the height limitation, as our canopy is 18'. We can discuss the location of the sign and the location's impact on visibility.

Feel free to give me a call once you've reviewed these responses. I'll see you Thursday. I believe our team would prefer the dates of 2/8 or 2/9 for the public hearing.

Needless to say, my clients in the Winding Brook S/D are very concerned about the noise, lights, traffic and safety issues that this proposal brings to their neighborhood. Your answer raises some questions:

- 1. I think it is important to know how the grade change will be handled. A retaining wall could be part of a method to protect the residents on E. Orell.
- 2. Along the same line, there is no reason for the green space to be rezoned C-1. Retaining R-4 zoning on the unused green space provides some protection and peace of mind for the neighbors.
  - 3. Just because maneuvering a truck through the customer fueling area does not mean they won't try.
- 4. We need a firmer commitment on operating hours. Having the truck fuel station operating 24 hours presents problems all night long for nearby residents.
- 5. The sound study that was performed assumed a wall on the edge of E. Orell. The problem with that study is that sounds goes up. By the time it gets to a wall at that location, it would be above the wall. Such a wall, if located closer to the operation, might stop more sound and light and provide a safety barrier also.

My clients suggest the following changes:

- 1. The proposed green space on the eastern portion of the property should remain R-4 and be landscaped and maintained by RaceTrac.
- 2. An eight-foot tall masonry (or double-sided wood wall with sound insulation) should be constructed along the edge of the line separating the green space and the operational land. Such a wall will provide protection for the nearby residents from light, sound, exhaust, debris and trespass. I might add it provides trespass protection for RaceTrac also.
  - 3. A retaining wall should separate the truck filling area and the green space.
- 4. Permanent overhead barriers, 12 feet high, should be placed at the Flowervale entrance/exit and at the driveway leading from the truck area to the regular customer area.
  - 5. Specific hours of operation need to be in binding elements.
  - 6. No vehicles may park and idle on the premises.
  - 7. Lighting and signage binding elements should be added as attached to this e-mail.

By a copy of this e-mail, we are asking staff to include these requirements in the next staff report before the public hearing. If we are unable to reach agreement, my clients will oppose the rezoning unless there is some effort to address these issues as we have suggested. Thanks for your consideration.

The Planning Commission listens to, and takes into consideration the concerns of, the members of the public who choose to speak at the Commission hearing or who write in prior to the hearing. In the process, the Planning Commission creates the public record that is used by Metro Council to make the final decision.

I cannot speculate as to what Metro Council will do on this case, as I have seen Metro Council both approve and deny rezoning requests. Although the Planning Commission and the Council will be provided with written testimony if someone chooses to provide it prior to the hearing, it is better to attend and speak at the public hearing, as the Commissioners cannot ask questions of a letter if they have any.

My name is Melody Burns and I have lived in the Winding Brook subdivision for 12 years at the following address:

11605 Winding Stream Way Louisville, KY 40272

I have the following concerns with the RaceTrac structure that is proposed on the corner of Dixie Highway and Flowervale Lane:

- 1. I would love to sign a petition in opposition to this structure if I am provided one. I am an only parent with two children. As is the case with most individuals, my home is my largest investment. The structure would surely drastically reduce the property values of the homes on E Orell, which would, in turn, lower the value of my home since they are part of my subdivision. I cannot afford to take such a loss on my property.
- 2. I will be signing a petition for an in-person hearing to be held after 6:00 pm. Many cannot attend during the day. Also, I am in opposition to a virtual meeting. I attended the online hearing on 7/9/2020 and the Webex meeting kept freezing up and not responding. I wanted to send a message in the chat box, but was unable to due to the Webex not responding and locking up. Luckily, I could still hear the conversation, however, I was not able to share my concerns. If a virtual only meeting is held, others will experience this same issue and will not be able to have their concerns heard or be able to participate in the meeting.
- 3. I have a concern with an entrance/exit to this structure on Flowervale Lane. There is a hill and it is very difficult to see when cars are coming down Flowervale towards Dixie. It is already difficult enough with the entrance/exit to Dairy Queen. Having to also look for cars coming out of this structure at the same time would be nearly impossible. In addition, the proposed entrance/exit on the Flowervale side is very close to Dixie Highway. With the light to turn left onto Flowervale from Dixie Highway flashing yellow, cars turn very fast onto Flowervale. With cars coming out of this structure, out of Dairy Queen, coming down Flowervale towards Dixie, and turning onto Flowervale from Dixie, this could make for a very dangerous situation. Also, the entrance/exit to this structure will be cut into a hill, so visibility will be even worse.

I also have the same concerns as others with noise, lighting, traffic, heightened crime, etc. My daughter works at Meijer on Dixie Highway and the drug and theft problems are very high. The number of drug addicts shooting up in their bathrooms is beyond ridiculous. They had to shorten their hours of operation, as did other businesses in the area, to try and curb this problem. I am a resident that lives on East Orell Road. Steve Porter is representing our neighborhood in this case. We are needing these concessions that he had proposed to be met. What we are asking for is listed below.

- 1. The proposed green space on the eastern portion of the property which is not being developed as a fuel center and convenience store shall remain R-4 zoning and shall be landscaped and maintained by the owner.
- 2. On the entire eastern edge of the portion of the property which is to be developed (not along E. Orell Rd.), a ten-foot tall masonry wall shall be constructed and maintained.
- 3. Permanent overhead barriers, 12.5 feet high, shall be placed at the Flowervale entrance/exit and at the driveway leading from the large-truck filling area to the regular customer area.
  - 4. No vehicles shall park and idle on the property for longer than fifteen minutes at any time of day.
  - 5. The entire operation shall be closed between the hours of 12:00 midnight and 6:00 AM.
  - 6. Lighting:
- a) All exterior lighting, whether freestanding or attached to any structure, shall be fully shielded, shall utilize flat or hidden lenses, and shall be pointed directly to the ground.
  - b) No LED or metal halide lighting shall have a correlated color temperature (CCT) exceeding 3000 degrees Kelvin.
  - c) No parking lot light fixtures shall be more than fourteen feet high, measured from ground level.
  - 7. Signage:
    - a) No lighted signage, attached or freestanding, shall be visible from residences on E. Orell Rd.
    - b) All freestanding signage shall not exceed six feet in height, measured from ground level.
    - c) No changing image or moving signs shall be permitted except signs displaying gas prices only.

The rationales for the above binding elements are as follows:

1. If the entire property is rezoned C-1, that will allow commercial uses on E. Orell Rd. directly across the street from existing single-family residences. Those potential uses could be very detrimental to the residents along E. Orell rd.

- 2. A visual and sound barrier is needed along the edge of the development to protect residents from disturbing sound, light, exhaust, debris and trespass. A small fence along E. Orell Rd. does not accomplish this.
- 3. Overhead barriers are needed to prevent tractor trailer trucks (typically 13.5 to 14 feet tall) from entering and exiting on Flowervale and from interfering with other customers at the convenience store. This limit will not interfere with any emergency vehicles (typically under 12.5 feet tall).
  - 4. Restrictions on idling are necessary to prevent dangerous fumes and obnoxious noise.
  - 5. Restricting hours of operation will reduce nighttime disturbance to nearby residents.
  - 6. Lighting restrictions will protect nearby residents as well as motorists on Dixie Highway.
  - 7. Signage restrictions will protect nearby residents as well as motorists on Dixie Highway.

The masonry wall is crucial to those of us that live on East Orell Road. We will not be able to sit in our living room in our home without seeing and hearing semi's and other vehicles pulling in and out all day and night. We are also concerned with how much light will be projected towards our houses as we have bedrooms on the front of our home. It is heartbreaking to have a fueling station be built right in front of our homes that we have invested in, but if it is going to happen, we need for these concessions to be met in order for us to be able to continue to live in our homes.

My name is Sally Smith. I live at 11913 East Orell Rd. and this project is being proposed right outside my front door. I purchased my home in 2012 after the death of my husband. I chose it specifically because of the quiet dead end street. Aside from being my sanctuary, it is all that I have. I am 56, make a very modest income, and have very little retirement. I count on the equity in this house to survive after retirement. I will most definitely lose most, if not all of it if this zoning change happens. As will my neighbors on E. Orell. This I know. I have been selling property in this area for almost 25 years, and understand values very well. We have one resident who has already withdrawn her home from the market after losing 2 potential buyers because of the proposed truck refueling center.

Race Trac is calling this a "filling station" similar to the Thorton's across the street. It is not.

This is a sprawling 5 acre truck refueling station, open for 24 hours a day will be the view from our front porches. Lights and diesel engines all day and all night just feet from our doors.

Safety is another issue. The intersection at Flowervale and Dixie is already crowded and unsafe. There have been numerous accidents at this location. I'm writing in regards to the proposed change in Zoning on Case # 20-Zone-0034 at the property 11800-11908 E Orel Road and 11705-11707 Dixie Highway.

I believe changing this Zoning from a residential to commercial is a horrible idea for several reasons. The property backs right up to a neighborhood along with an access road into personal property and homes/driveways. Not to mention that intersection is already VERY BUSY with normal day to day traffic without adding a commercial property (gas station/truck stop) to that corner intersection. I encourage you all to pull all the accident reports, as there are already tons at the Flowervale and Dixie Highway light/intersection.

Dear Ms. St. Germain:

I attended the public meeting held at the Southwest Public Library Wednesday, March 4, 2020, regarding the possible construction of a Race Trac gas station at the corner of Dixie and Flowervale. I live in the subdivision that backs up to this proposed site and I have several serious concerns with this idea.

- 1. The corner of Dixie and Flowervale is site for numerous accidents each week just with the amount of current traffic. As the matter of fact, there was a serious accident this morning.
- 2. This construction will have a major negative impact on the value of our homes.
- 3. There is already an entrance from Dairy Queen onto Flowervale and having an entrance to a gas station across form that entrance so close to Dixie isn't prudent.
- 4. Entrances proposed for the gas station off Dixie are too close in proximity to the corner and the light. This will tie up traffic for anyone heading north when someone heading south wants to enter the gas station. Vehicles will need to cross two lanes to turn into a gas station. We will see the same issues that have been encountered up to the north on Dixie with vehicles "sneaking" across when traffic slows or stops for the light and blocking lanes. This has been a big deal with the Re-do of Dixie Highway and allowing these entrances will just create something that is being done away with at the other end of Dixie.
- 5. This will bring crime to our side of the street with drug addicts looking for a place to "hideout".

7. Flowervale is not wide enough for more traffic.

- 8. Orell is a dead-end street and the families from our Homeowner's Association who live along that street will have to contend with more traffic. Now, their kids play and ride their bikes in the street, this will have to stop. We don't have a centralized playground.
- 9. There are some who cut through our neighborhood on foot from a trailer park that is southeast of our subdivision. We may encounter increase in this foot traffic.
- 10. There are other sites on Dixie, as well as the Greenbelt, that would be more suited for this type of business.

I beg of you, please consider the residents in this area before you make any decisions on this rezoning and construction of this gas station. We have too much at stake with the investments in our homes to lose that.

There was a bad accident there less than two weeks ago where we heard someone was cut out of a car. You add semis to the mix by a neighborhood that pays good taxes in this community with higher home value because of the builder and his pride for this community. Have you drove into our neighborhood and seen the kids play. Please know they ride their bikes and walk down E. Orell all the time.
